The Military Group held their second meeting on February 16th, 2015 and we had many from the initial meeting, plus two new faces. Welcome Jack & Dave! Several people from the first meeting could not attend this meeting although they are very interested in this pro-

ject.





Troy Pitcher volunteered to be the chairperson/leader of the group. He is a past-commander of the American Legion Post 42 and we welcome his help and leadership!

Sherry gave a computer demonstration on how we can find and index information from scanned documents and pdf files. She also showed how easy it is to scan with a portable scanner.

Bill brought in some information about the Grand Ledge VFW and library, and he will be working with them to identify items that can be scanned for the project.

Sherry will work on a list, using some of our existing genealogy records, of veterans whom we have records. We want to work toward a master list of the various war times.

Several people volunteered to do research to find websites with military information for us to use to add to our list.



We have an email group to provide communication and anyone may request to be added to this group by

We now have the room reserved for a meeting on the third Monday of each month at 7:00pm at the 1885 Eaton County Courthouse, downtown Charlotte. The room will be open by 6:30pm.



Special Projects

We have special projects we work on from time to time. One of them is the Probate Packet Scanning Project, which has been reported on. This is a very long-term project and we will report on the progress each month.

Two other projects we are working on is the Charlotte Library Scanning project and the Rural School project. The rural school project belongs to the Eaton County Historical Commission and we have helped them with this and we will end up with a rich source of information when it is completed.

Charlotte Library Scanning Project

The Charlotte Library Scanning project is back in full swing! We are scanning the Boyd Preston index card collection and we have more than half of these scanned. The images of these index cards are available on our Charlotte Library page on the website at <u>www.miegs.org/</u> <u>CharlotteLibrary.shtml</u>. The upcoming dates scheduled to scan are *Mar 11th & 25th* and Apr 22nd, from 6:30pm to 8:00pm. We have discovered some of these cards contain military information and we will be using these for the Military Project.

We will evaluate where we are in April and schedule more sessions if needed to complete the project. When the Boyd Preston collection is completed, we will determine what we scan next, which will most likely be photographs.

Eaton County Historical Commission Rural School Project

Materials are still being brought in to scan. The Historical Commission members writing the stories are busy working to get these stories ready. It is still too early to tell if we will make the target date of Easter time for the completed book.

From the ECGS standpoint, Sherry is working on the data and images that will be included on the DVD, which will be included with the book. The DVD will contain several Name indexes and many school and class photo images. Work continues to complete DVD.

Since school information is very valuable for genealogy research, we will always welcome school materials to scan!

The project is the "Muriel Links Obituaries" which are approximately 85,000 Obituaries clipped from Grand Rapids Newspapers covering the period 1930-1970 and pasted onto cards that are kept at the Grand Rapids Public Library. A Query - From Marcy Cousino



I received a letter from a fellow from Brockville, Ontario who purchased an old diary/journal written by Hiram Hutchings from 1878 to 1890. The gentleman was looking for photographs and any descendants or historical societies that would be interested in a transcription. I scrambled around the genealogy library and learned a few things about Hiram Hutchings.

Hiram was born in New Troy, PA on September 9, 1806. He lost his mother at age 4 and at age 7 he was "bound out" for 10 years. When he be-

came free at age 17, he apparently had nothing but the clothes on his back. He had not been trained in a trade, except farming perhaps. He married and started a family and eventually they settled in Eaton County, Michigan in 1843. Hiram purchased land in Chester Township on Wheaton and Bollock Road.

In 1859, Eaton County had to address its' obligation to provide for the poor. Hiram stepped up to be one of the supervisors of the poor. He served in that office from 1860 to 1876. Property adjoining his property on Wheaton Road became the County Poor Farm. Today the buildings of the County Poor Farm no longer exist, but the house built by Hiram Hutchings is still there. It is the first house North of Bollock Road on the West side of Wheaton Road. It appears the house has had several additions over the years, but I could see a fieldstone basement wall on a small section toward the back of the house.

Hiram Hutchings was an active member of the Universalist Church. Perhaps his faith motivated him to so actively help the poor. Perhaps it was personal experience that gave him the drive to serve.

The Universalist Church is a very liberal church. In Charlotte it started sometime around the Civil War. The congregation was able to build a beautiful little church. It survived until just after the turn of the century when loss of members and income brought the congregation to an end. I found the little church on the corner of Lovett and Oliver Streets. The beautiful little church is now home to The Church of The Nazarene.

Luckily for me, one of Hiram Hutching's descendants, Carroll Briggs, had contributed some genealogy to our collection. I was able to put the two gentlemen into contact with each other and we now have an electronic transcription of Hiram Hutching's diary for family history scholars to enjoy. The work has been indexed.

Of course, I still wanted to know how the diary end up so far away from Eaton County. I found the answer in Eaton County Pioneer Records, Volume 2, page 72. It states: Hiram Hutchings died at Gainsville, N.Y., March 16, 1891, aged 84 years. An old pioneer resident of Chester where he has lived until the last few years. Has held the office of overseer of the poor for several years and filled many offices of trust in the township.

Hiram went to New York to live with a daughter in his last years and that is where the journal stopped. Probably in more recent history, it was part of an estate sale when the significance of the journal had lost its' meaning. I think it is really great that it has come back to where it had started.

A Helpful Website

We had an email from a retired social studies teacher who works with the youth department of his library. In their work, they found a very helpful website and wrote to us to share it, and now we can share it here!

We're covering family history at the moment; your page has been a big help! We've referenced it quite a bit!

History of the Verplank School

The first school house was built on the banks of Narrow Lake in the year of 1853. A log shanty was built by Uncle Jerry Thomas, who lived there for a few years, and then returned to the East. It was then remodeled for a school house. The furniture consisted of one broken chair, a few boards nailed together for a teacher's desk, and two benches made of white-wood slabs with holes bored through each for legs to be driven in. The benches were the children's seats. They also had a writing desk built of rough lumber. The first teacher was Mrs. Wm. Soule.

This log shanty was used until they moved a shanty from Mr. Carrier's farm onto the corner where the Carrier cemetery is now located. Mrs. Soule and Miss Olive Farran taught the first few years. This school house was used until they built the frame school house, just east of the present brick one. The material for the building was mostly donated. The lumber that was used was white-wood and ash, finished with black cherry. The logs were cut and drawn from the surrounding woods at Dutton's saw mill at Duttonville, now Brookfield Center.

The new school house was built in the late winter so they could have a sufficient summer school. The interior was not finished until sometime later. The window sashes and paneled doors were all made by hand. Nearly all of the work was donated. The furniture consisted of benches made from rough slabs turned with the smooth side up. Holes were bored in ends for legs to be driven in. One good lady donated a sewing chair with the rockers broken off for the teacher
