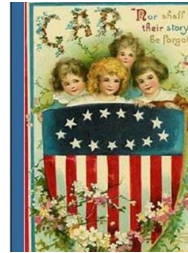
**OFFICER & COMMITTEE REPORTS****President:** Bill Haines.

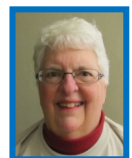

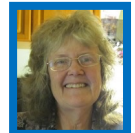


### ECGS MEMBERS STEVE & JOANN DE PEEL

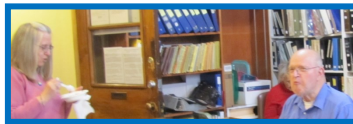

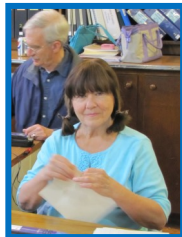
We welcome Jim & Jo back! They have returned from Arizona and we were so happy to have them join us!

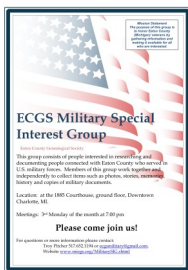


## Eaton County Military Special Interest Group

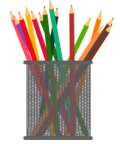

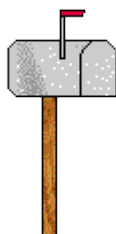
## ECGS Bus Trip To Allen County Library

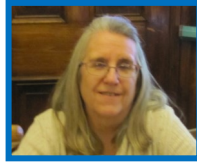

## Family Search Eaton County Probates Online

# Thanks Sue!

LDS has Eaton Co. Old probate file images on their Family Search website dating to 1900. I have been playing around with using the index that was filmed and then trying to find the actual file in the list of probates filmed.

In the filmed probate index, the box after name under "file number" or the last number on the same line as name is the actual file number of probate and if there are TWO file numbers in that box it's the TOP number that is probate file number. (I went to court-house and got that information from court clerks)

So look for the person index and then go over to number under file number box. Once you have the file number then leave index and look first at the years in probate images and the numbers after years are the probate file numbers. It can take a bit of looking to go through the many pages of images, but you can jump ahead and guess about where it will be and then I jump ahead or back 100 pages at a time, then 10 or so pages, then one at a time until you find probate file number and name.

If you find the person's file is not the right person you are looking for in those images even though the numbered file is right, go back to probate images then scroll down to the probate files with no years and the numbers behind them are also file numbers. So you might be looking in two different places for the probate file you are seeking, but basically remember you are looking for the file number in all those images.

I hope this helps, because the index is really confusing to use with images LDS filmed and put on Family Search.

Remember-Index>file number>years and numbers are file numbers>no years and numbers are file numbers.

## Michigan Secret Marriages

### More from Sue Thompson!

Detroit Free Press, 26 Sept 1887 page 2- "No More Secret Marriages- The Elopement season will close permanently at 12 o'clock tonight". In body of article it states, "Heretofore it has been comparatively an easy matter ...to quietly slip off to the justice or parson and in secrecy assume the matrimonial yoke". The rest of the article went on to explain that a new law was in effect to have two licenses to be taken to the person who would marry them and they would keep one license and the other license had to be taken back to county clerks to register the marriage and open to the public. Also the license would have several questions to be supplied on the form such as, age, color, place of residence, place of birth, occupation, and parent's names and if married before and how many times.

Ah, but the interesting part of the article was the statement "No More Secret Marriages".

Jump ahead 10 years to another article in the Detroit Free Press, 16 Sept 1896, page 3- "Licenses Were Suppressed- Curiosity Over Two Secret Marriages in Bay City". In this article it states, "Two marriage licenses were suppressed by the deputy county clerk today at the request of the parties. In answer to a question, the deputy said it was customary to suppress marriage licenses from the public when the request was made. Ah, again interesting that is was CUSTOMARY to keep secret marriage licenses from the public. Customary yes, but not legal.

Jump ahead a few months to 18 February 1897 a bill was introduced in the Michigan House of Representatives #477-1079 called, "A bill to provide for the protection of the reputation and good name of certain persons". This was approved and then sent on to Senate and it was approved 31 May 1897 and made law.

This bill outlines how to make a legal secret marriage in Michigan. There will be one license issued for the marriage couple and the couple will be married by a probate judge after giving good reason why it should be secret. After the marriage the probate judge will put the license in a private closed file in the county court files not open to the public, just like a closed adoption. The judge will also send a duplicate of the secret marriage record to the Secretary of State and it too will be held in a closed private file. Later the law was revised and the marriage couple would also get and keep a signed license to prove if necessary their marriage. Michigan and California are the only two states that have such a secret marriage law that is still in effect to this day.

So up to this new law made in 1897, it was a custom to hide the fact of a marriage if the person marrying a couple was requested to do so for a good reason in Michigan. I thought this very interesting as I have not been able to find several marriages in Eaton County and I know the couples lived before and after in the county. I even went to all the surrounding counties trying to find the marriages, but could not, but when I was explaining my problem to the Ingham county clerk, she mentioned this Michigan secret marriage law. So thus my research into this law and yes, the conclusion that my couples indeed had reason to have a secret marriages and must have found someone to accommodate them.

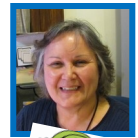
Of course the law has be tweaked a bit since 1897, so just Google Michigan secret marriage law to see it in full both in 1897 and the law now.

So, maybe this custom and law is why you can't find that marriage record for your relatives in Michigan.

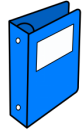

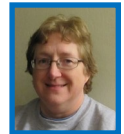

Marcy found a great deal of information to send to her.

Gary worked on a query from Janet DeSimone, who requested additional information about Gardner Niles and his wife Percy/Persis (Porter) Hartwell Niles. She found Gardner Niles in our Cemetery database listing on the website in Union/Partlow/Johnson cemetery. We sent her a photo of the headstone. She is hoping to find where Percy/Persis is buried, and we do not have a record for her and cannot answer this for Janet.

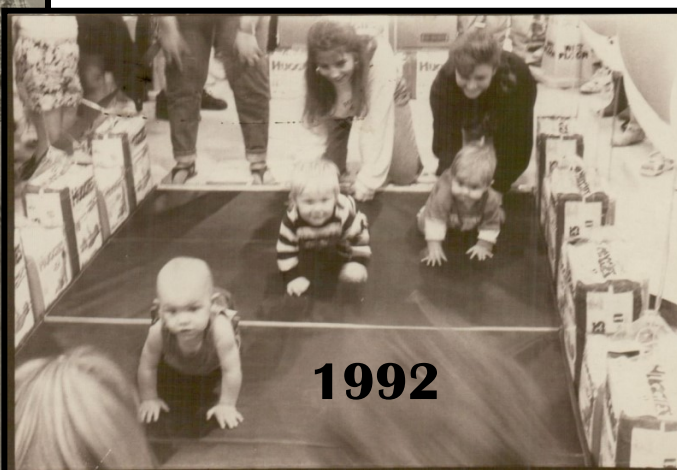
**The Eaton County School Database now takes over!**

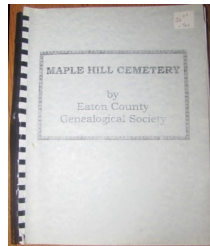


## Eaton County Genealogical Society- Publishing Committee

Following are photos of a few of our existing publications. Many of these could be updated because we have new material.

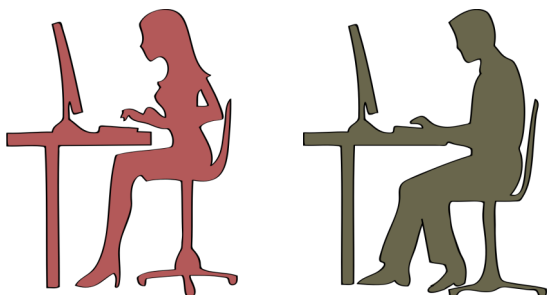
