#### MEMBERSHIP OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD

Elected officers of the Society (All voting members): President, Vice President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Membership Secretary, Treasurer, Trustees (3).

**DUTIES OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD:** Supervise the affairs of the Society. Determine time and place of Board and General meetings. Approve plans of work submitted by committees and make recommendations to the membership. Review the budget requests and develop a proposed budget which shall be submitted to the membership for adoption at the November meeting of each year. Review other business that comes before the Board.

<u>DUTIES OF THE PRESIDENT</u>: Chair Board and General monthly meetings. Prepare meeting agendas. Call for motions and votes as needed. Recommend appointments of chairpersons to committees to Executive Board. Be an alternate signatory on society bank accounts. Perform other ad-hoc duties that may arise.

**DUTIES OF THE VICE PRESIDENT:** Fulfill the duties of the President if the President is unable to do so. Provide general meeting programs, including speakers as needed. Notify Webmaster and Publicity Chairperson of general meeting details to publicize the meetings. Track speaker costs and notify Treasurer when payment is needed. Be prepared for substitute meeting program, such as a dvd movie in case a speaker cancels at the last minute.

<u>DUTIES OF THE RECORDING SECRETARY</u>: Maintain and preserve the records of the Society. Record business proceedings of Board and General meetings. Provide copies to society and to Webmaster for posting on the Members Section page.

**DUTIES OF THE CORRESPONDING SECRETARY:** Communicate with other groups and individuals with similar genealogical interests. Maintain the Post Office Box Key. Be responsible for obtaining the mail from the Post Office Box, and distribute it to the proper persons on a weekly basis. Respond to communications as necessary. Process queries received and provide up to  $\frac{1}{2}$  hour of research. Send thank you notes to monetary gift donations over \$10.00.

<u>DUTIES OF THE MEMBERSHIP SECRETARY</u>: Maintain a list of active and past members of the Society. Record membership dues received and mail out membership cards including the password to the website Members Section. ### ECGS New ScanSnap Scanner

ECGS received a grant from the Eaton County Historical Commission to purchase a new scanner that scans larger size documents and books. It has the ability to remove some of the skewing from the middle of the book scans.



This is one of the court books in the ECGS Library and it is quite large. There is a regular 8 1/2' by 11" paper on top of the cover to show how large it



This particular book allows the pages to be removed and we can scan the individual pages separately with the ScanSnap.

In this case, because the pages are so large, I have placed the scanner on top of a book to get it high enough to scan the entire page.





The top part of the scanner moves outward to cover the area of the black pad included with the scanner. (See the light in the picture to the left that shows this scan is about half completed.)

I lay each page on the black pad and press the scan button on the scanner. It takes a couple of seconds to scan. The scanner is connected to my laptop and the ScanSnap software processes the scans. I prefer to scan as jpg files, although they can be scanned as pdf files. The scanner does not always recognize the orientation of the document is scans, which is why I like to scan to jpg files, then rotate the image if necessary. I



can save the jpg files as a pdf file if I wish. Since these are very large pages, I scan at the



highest resolution and the file sizes are large. These scans will be saved to an external drive in the ECGS Library.

The picture to the left is the resulting scan saved to the computer. While this image has been reduced in size and is not readable, the actual image is very readable when zoomed out.

If anyone is interested in trying to scan a book, please contact us at <u>ecgsboard@gmail.com</u>. We have regular size books that are easier to scan than these large ones and I can provide training.
