

**A CONTEST: 24 RELATIVES, BUT ONLY 6 GRAVES**

(The following genealogical puzzle comes from a curious epitaph printed in the *Old Virginia Gazette* in 1748. The tombstone upon which it appears was located near Arlington, Virginia.)

**TOMBSTONE INSCRIPTION**

Here Lies:

2 grandmothers with their 2 grand-daughters;  
2 husbands with their 2 wives;  
2 fathers with their 2 daughters;  
2 mothers with their 2 sons;  
2 maidens with their 2 mothers;  
2 sisters with their 2 brothers;

Yet but 6 corpses in all lie buried here,  
All born legitimate, from incest clear.




Here is the answer to last month's puzzle!

**THE PUZZLE**

This puzzle was taken from a tombstone near Arlington, Virginia, which claims 24 relatives are buried there, but only 6 corpses, "all born legitimate, from incest clear."

The epitaph was first printed in 1748 in the *Old Virginia Gazette*.

The 24 relationships specified on the tombstone epitaph appear below with the answer.

**THE ANSWER****THE SIX GRAVES:**

Mother (a) has son (c);  
Mother (b) has son (d);  
Son (c) is married to mother (b); this is her second marriage;  
Son (d) weds mother (a); this is her second marriage;  
Each married couple has a single daughter (cb) and (ad).

**THE 24 RELATIVES:**

Two grandmothers and two granddaughters.  
(a) & (b) (cb) & (ad)

Two husbands and two wives.  
(c) & (d) (a) & (b)

Two fathers and two daughters.  
(c) & (d) (cb) & (ad)

Two mothers and two sons.  
(a) & (b) (c) & (d)

Two maidens and two mothers.  
(cb) & (ad) (a) & (b)

Two sisters with two brothers.  
(cb) is a sister to brother (d)  
(ad) is a sister to brother (c)

(The above relationships are possible because both mothers (a) & (b) were married twice, with their sons born to their first husbands. Had these two mothers been sisters, there would be even more relationships among these six people, since the dimension of aunts, uncles, nieces and nephews would be added.)

If anyone is still wrestling with the puzzle, it's time to stop!

## **LIBRARY OF MICHIGAN EXPANDS HOURS AND SERVICES BEGINNING JANUARY 9, 2016**

December 14, 2015

LANSING – The Library of Michigan will expand its hours and services to better serve Michigan citizens and state government.

Beginning January 9, 2016, the main library will be open every Saturday (excluding certain state holidays) from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. During open hours, library users can access the largest collection of Michigan newspapers anywhere, as well as an in-depth collection of Michigan specific periodicals, books, government documents, maps and audiovisual materials.

In addition, public internet access will be available, offering online subscription databases related to education, public health, newspapers and family history. Staff will be available on the second floor to assist with research questions and locating materials.

“We are expanding services and upgrading equipment to answer an increased demand for access to the library’s unique collections and the knowledge and expertise our staff has to offer to anyone needing information,” said State Librarian Randy Riley.

The increase in open hours accompanies the acquisition of a suite of versatile digital microfilm scanners, new public computers with added features, and a centralized printing system that will enhance the visitor’s experience.

The State Law Library will continue to be available only during the Library’s weekday schedule, Monday through Friday, 10:00 am to 5:00 pm. After a hiatus of five years, the library also will resume circulating materials to the public at large in January 2016.





## Vault 1 Shelving Units

The family of Laura Ranville donated a generous amount of money in her memory. We used this donation to build additional shelving units in vault 1. See more information about Laura on the next page.




She was preceded in death by her parents and her brother, Leonard Scott Plummer of Muskegon.

She was an amateur genealogist, unearthing long-lost family stories and even tracing her family history back to the Mayflower.







## The Eaton County School Database Project

## Our Family Genealogies Section


Our research library contains a valuable section known as *Family Genealogies*. As time permits, we will scan the *Family Genealogies* and post excerpts from them in the newsletter.
