Most of these folks are buried in Roxand Township.

The society spent about \$3,500 in 2015 for two laptops and one copy machine along with the maintenance agreement for the copy machine. The society has paid for all of these items without spending a dime from either of our savings accounts. paypal or our CD. In fact, the 2015 bake sale had a net profit of \$1479.51 (yet another all time high) helped a great deal toward the purchase of our new laptops! A big thank you to all who helped to make this fund raiser such a success!!!!

As of year end we still had \$1770 or so still in our checking account. Over 2 thousand has been deposited in January and February of this year already. We have paid our \$600 lease payment for the entire year in January. In May we will have a bill of about \$600 for insurance and we have a monthly telephone/internet bill of about \$95. Starting in September we have two fundraisers (Frontier Days Bake Sale and the Bus Trip) so we will be rebuilding our checking account balance just in time for additional bills coming due in the fourth quarter....but I think our checking account is in good shape!

A big thank you goes out to each and every one of you that support ECGS whether with your membership, the many volunteers we have that work in the room, all of those who do research for folks or work on their own research. Many thanks to those volunteers who work on the probate packets, the take-home projects as well as volunteers who snip obituaries and make up books for researchers to use. We appreciate it even if you just stop to chat, have a pop and eat some snacks or come to the general meetings to hear our speakers and enjoy some time together. 
items.

## Eaton County Military Special Interest Group


While we have not resumed Military SIG meetings, we are still very interested in honoring our veterans and collecting and sharing that information.

## Eaton County Gets Own Flag

Eaton County has its own flag, for the first time in history, and it has the Olivet Girl Scout troop to thank. The new flag was presented to a recent board of supervisors meeting and accepted by Olivet's Robert Cole, chairman of the board. Headed by Mrs. Robert Swan Troop 81 of the Olivet Scouts made the flag for the county.

In addition to the large flag, each supervisor was given a smaller model for each township, city and village hall in the county.

Mrs. Swan told the board she first checked to find out if the county ever had an official flag. She found it did not.

The girls began searching the county's history for appropriate symbols.

They found the county has always had farming and industry, The troop decided to symbolize these two areas in green and white.

The flag's background is split diagonally by the two colors — green symbolizing farming and white symbolizing industry.

In the upper right hand section against the white background, a red maple leaf symbolized the industry the county was most noted for in early days - maple syrup production,

Against the green background in the lower left is a sheaf of grain, symbolizing farming,

Mr. Cole expressed appreciation to the Girl Scouts on behalf of the board, and the supervisors unanimously voted to make the flag the tentative official flag for the

## Mulliken Cookbook

#### CHOP SUEY

1-1/2 quarts sliced raw onions

1 pint diced celery

1-1/2 pounds diced raw lean pork

1/2 pound or 2 cups shredded cooked chicken, if desired

1/2 cup brown sugar

2 tablespoons flour

1/2 bottle of La Choy or Oriental Show You Sauce

1 can Chinese vegetables (water chestnuts and bamboo sprouts) (can omit)

Cook celery and onions until they start to cook clear but are not soft. Saute the diced pork in hot fat until real brown, then combine with the vegetables. Add seasonings and sauce, stir flour in to thicken. Add bean sprouts and Chinese vegetables last and serve hot with steamed rice. Do not overcook. The vegetables should be slightly crisp. Serves 6.

## A Change to How Probate Packet Files are Saved


When probate packets are scanned, they are saved as individual image files on tiny sd cards in the scanners. I take all of these sd cards home and these are the steps I take for each of the sd cards I have.

- Create a directory (folder) with the name of the probate packet.
- Look at each of the images and rotate to the correct way if necessary. (We sometimes need to scan them sideways or upside down.)
- Delete bad scans.
- Move all of the images for the probate packet into the directory.

When the sd card is completed, I copy the directories onto a flash drive into a directory I created for the week's probate packets work. When all of the sd cards are completed I used to take these steps for each directory (probate packet file).

- Using software, combine all of the images into a pdf file, then move the pdf file into the probate packet's work directory.
- Bring up the most recent Excel copy of the Probate Packets. Save it in the probate packet's work directory using the current date as the file name. Update the File names for each probate packet. When done with this, verify the links work.
- Copy the pdf files to the ECGS external drive and upload them to ECGS Cloud.

In February 2016, I discontinued the creating of pdf files due to time constraints. Instead of looking at one pdf file, you will now see a directory of images. While this may not seem like a big time-save, it really is, especially because I no longer rotate the images.

Miss Swain has shared some wonderful photos with us from her years of teaching Munson School. I (Sherry Copenhaver) talked with her in June of 2013 representing the Eaton County Genealogical Society, working on the Eaton County Historical Commission rural school project. We had a very enjoyable chat on her front porch on a beautiful summer day. She has such fond memories of Munson school, which was her first teaching job when she came to Michigan from Minnesota.



She has photos of various school events, such as Christmas programs, students in their Halloween costumes, students playing outside in the summer and in the winter and going on field trips. It is obvious she enjoyed teaching 'her kids' at this school with the note of 'Munson School, the world's best' on the back of this picture and this note in her photo album.



She taught this rural one-room school for 11 years, then went on to teach in Froebel school, Grammar School, and Galewood School in Charlotte.

She states the country school was the most fun to teach. There were many more rules to follow in the public schools. The following photo shows this where she wrote 'You can only do this in a country school'.

# Keeny

## From the Desk of Iva M. (Keeny) Brown Jackson, Michigan

In the early fall of 1984, after I had finished my husband's genealogy chart, my oldest granddaughter asked me to do mine.

Never having seen any of the first, second or third generation of the Keeny family, I didn't know where to start. I had been told that there was a written record made once, but no one in my generation seems to be able to find one. So I will start from scratch to do this one.

I'm now the oldest living one of nine of the fifth generation; as of this writing there are eight generations.

I've been gathering information from a lot of sources, until now the first day of March, 1986, will try to put it all in chronological order on paper. I have found in my research of records several contradictions in birth and death, dates, but will record them as stated.



(1) Russell, born 12 June 1895, died 23 Dec. 1980 (85 years) Overseas World War I veteran, retired factory worker. Married Lenore Wight ca divorced, no children. Russell married Loretta Foxx ca. She died 19 Nov. 1982. One child: Judy, born 4 July, 1913; three children:

(1) Burinda (2) Holly (3) Rex Chaflin

Leslie Keeny, second born son of Guy L. and Ella Keeny. Born 2 Aug. 1897 died 6 Oct. 1982, 85 years, 2 mos. 4 days. He was a World War I veteran. A postal service worker, started as a horse and buggy carrier. Married *ca* June 1921, June Carpenter, born *ca* 1898. Three children:



One night in 1910 my father came upstairs and woke my brother and I, saying, "I want you to see something you'll never see again." We went to the west window and saw "Halley's Comet." It was such a sight, so bright I've never forgotten it. My father was right and he was wrong. I'm still here in 1986, but haven't yet seen the Comet. I'll still look this spring. My brother won't see it.

In my research I've run across a lot of names and dates of the Keeny family, but don't know where to put them. Perhaps they belong in some of our grandfather's brothers. I've heard my parents speak about some of them. But I've noticed that there has been a lot of heart trouble that's been the cause of many deaths.

I've lived through the horse and buggy days, the early automobile age, the mechanical age, through two world wars, the Viet Nam war, went to the World's Fair in 1933 and 1934 and now into the Space age. What next?

I've written this in first person story form with dates and pictures, with what

I've written this in first person story form with dates and pictures, with what information I was able to get from records, obituaties and what cousins have sent to me. Hopefully I've not made too many mistakes.

To each one who receives a copy, write your own corrections and additions and own personal memories.

I've enjoyed writing these charts. It's brought back so many memories, some good, some bad. Yes, I've shed a tear now and then but I feel like it was worth it. I could have added a lot m ore but its not my life story. English wasn't my major in school, so don't no one expect a perfect report.
