### Eaton County History Newspaper Project By Marcy Cousino

.ECHNP currently has 33 reels of Eaton County newspaper microfilm digitized. At last check, Mr. Tryniski still just has the first 13 Charlotte papers on his

site, but give him time, he will get to it! ECGS has all 33 reels on the genealogy library computers ready to be searched. These are 13 Charlotte/Eaton County papers, 8 Bellevue Gazettes, 8 Olivet Optics, 2 Vermontville papers and 2 Eaton Rapids Journals.

Sue Thompson has been evaluating all county microfilm. Very soon she will have exact numbers on how many reels are usable and how many will need to be purchased at \$50/reel from the Library of Michigan.

Marcy Cousino is busy working on a grant from Capital Region Community Foundation. With some luck ECHNP will receive some money from here!

Bellevue Historical Society met with Sherry Copenhaver and Marcy Cousino to learn how to search the newspapers. They purchased a 2 Gigabite external hard drive to receive their copies. After Sherry explained the basics of searching the newspapers, it was time to practice. Ruth Avery volunteered to give it a try. She searched the surname Martens in the 8 reels of Bellevue newspapers. First she found how a fellow named Martens voted on funding the building of a "drain". The next article she chose was about the 1908 murder in Detroit of the daughter of Bert Martens, a Bellevue native. The poor girl's assailant pulled her from her bed and shot her twice. Her sister, also living in Detroit, called the father in Bellevue to give the bad news. The story went on from there in great detail! Ruth, who knows the Marten family genealogy well, made the comment that she would have to figure out who the girl was. (The name was given, but it was an odd one, so it slipped my mind...) So here is an example of how easy it is to find interesting family information by searching the newspapers!

ECHNP plans to send in the rest of the Bellevue Gazette for digitization, 10 at a time. Since Bellevue Historical Society gave such a generous donation, we would like to get their microfilm digitized now that we have sent in samples from everyone we could get samples from. Bellevue Historical Society is lending us their set of The Bellevue Gazette for the project. It is in excellent condition since it has had little use. Their microfilm reader is broken. This set of microfilm was given to the historical society by the owner of The Bellevue Gazette, Nancy Jones. Nancy fully supports this digitization project.







## The Photo Group P.206

Rod Weaver has been working with ECGS recently to scan and restore some of the photographs in our collection. A sample of his work comes from Photo Group P.206 which includes several photos taken in downtown Charlotte. The three women shown are standing in front of the Miss Kinne Millinery shop that was located at 214 S. Cochran, which is currently the Eaton Pub & Grill location. The Main Street scene is a postcard from the 1920's with the photo taken from the 200 block of S. Cochran looking North. And the bottom picture is the Foster & White Block as seen in 1893. It shows a dry goods store to the left at 222 S. Cochran, Geo W. DeWitt Furniture & Undertaking in the center at 220 S. Cochran and a grocery store to the right at 218 S. Cochran. More pictures will be shown in future newsletters as Rod scans more photographs.



7/16/1943: This picture of the Foster & White blocks was taken around fifty years ago. The driveway at the south led to a feed barn and was located where the Munger Hardware is now located. Chas. Foster conducted a general store, groceries, dry goods, clothing, etc. in the store at the south. Foster is the one standing at the entrance to store. Geo. DeWitt had a furniture and undertaking establishment in the next store. Peter Kauffman is the one sitting in the chair next to the small boy. Sam Robinson, who worked for DeWitt, is sitting on the "rough box," and the grocery just north was run by Prince & Ward. In the store to the north- not shown in the picture- Peter Hults had a meat market. Tim.




## Our Hidden Super-Scanner, Mike!

We have an incredible hidden volunteer in our midst and have had for many months now and it's time to give him some recognition. Mike Wood has been scanning and indexing a large variety of materials for us in his home and these become available in our Index System and on our External Drive. The Eaton County Historical Commission awarded



us a grant for a ScanSnap scanner to scan larger books and papers and he has become very adept at using this scanner and has scanned many of our large court books. He lives right here in Charlotte, and can get the materials back and forth easily.

He likes to scan at home because he can watch ty while he scans. He has built himself guite a handy rolling work table, where he stores the items he is working on one side, and the items he has completed on the other side. He moves it to the computer and hooks it up to "ET" (as we call the scanner) when he is ready to use the scanner. If the pages of a book need to have some glass to make them smoother, he has some of that stored in the back of his work table too!






## Anita

ALICIA.

Alicia

This name is derived from the same root as Alice, and representing an attempt at greater euphony. The curious part of it is that the name, in its original form, is really not that of a woman at all, but of a man. It is derived from the Anglo-Saxon Adeligis, of which the feminine form was Adelgisa, but was not frequently given to Instead it was sacred to the sons women. of the house, principally among the no-The name itself means noble, in bility. both its masculine and feminine forms.

The name is purely English, having, however, a slight Teutonic flavor. An argument is put forward by some experts that the name is derived from the Frankish Adalhert or Adelchen, meaning "daugh-Alix or Alisa in Lombardy was natter." uralized in England when Alix la Belle married Henry I.

The name, originally masculine, according to the best authorities, however, represents Adelgis and not Adelgisa, making the proper feminine form Aliza. #### ANITA.

The lovely Spanish favorite Anita has won almost as prominent a place among the feminine names of our country as the equally exotic Juanita which followed the song of that title. Anita, however, is much more redolent of North America than its prototype. For Anita, signifying grace, has an origin parallel with Anne.

About the time that the mother of Samuel was recorded in Biblical chronicles as the original Hannah, the etymological way was being paved for the entrance of Anita through the gateway of Spain. Byzantium. that kingdom of royal splendor, paid homage to a St. Anne who is thought to be a flare-back to the great Roman deity, Anna Perrennia, goddess of the circling year. Greek damsels soon made it their favorite name.

The daughter of Emperor Basil, calling herself Anna married the Grand Prince of Muscovy and carried the name into Russia, where it was subjected to the Slavic influence and issued forth in various forms of diminutives and endearments, one being the pretty Amar, which still has vogue The susceptiblity of the pame to there. the influence of all tongues probably brought it to the attention of solf-syllabled Spain, who adopted it, cut off the 'r' and changed the 'm' to 'n' for euphony's sake, making the charming Ana, which has great popularity there. But Spain no sooner adopts a name than it must have a diminutive, after the latin fashion-hence Anita.

Italy took Anita and called her Ninetta, which was later subjected to a diminutive process and issued forth as Nanna.

Anita's talismanic gem is the cat's eye, which has greater mystic qualities than that of any other jewel. It has the power of hypnotism and is said to be a charm against evil spirits. It is a sacred stone in India where its dazzling white light shot with brilliant green imbues it with uncanny powers. Thursday is Anita's lucky day and 6 her lucky number. The poinsetta is her flower.
