## The Mary Lucy Kellogg Award

The Mary Lucy Kellogg award was presented to Ralph Hillman of the Midland Genealogical Society. Ralph was the 22<sup>nd</sup> recipient of this award. He Ralph has a degree in chemical engineering and worked for Dow Chemical Co. for many years. Ralph is quite an accomplished genealogist, becoming a Certified Genealogist in 1986, authoring articles in major journals and publishing two books. His ancestors came to America in 1637.

The Lucy Mary Kellogg award was established in 1992 by the Michigan Genealogical Council to honor Lucy Mary Kellogg as the founding member and, an eminent Michigan genealogist. Her accomplishments on the state and national levels were recognized in 1991 as the first woman and the first from the Midwest area to be named to the National Genealogy Hall of Fame.

To be nominated for this award a candidate must be a member in good standing of a member society of the Michigan Genealogical Council, resided in the state of Michigan for a minimum of five years, and must have met four or more of the following criteria:

Furthered the aims and the accomplishments of Michigan Genealogical Council. Served in a position of leadership in a Michigan genealogical or historical organization.

Been involved in a major research project.

Authored or contributed to a notable publication.

Made a significant contribution to the genealogical or historical benefit of his/ her community.

Made a significant contribution to the Michigan community.

Furthered the knowledge of genealogy through educational practices.

The Award consists of a certificate for the recipient and \$50.00 each in his/her name to the Archives of Michigan, Library of Michigan, and a library or genealogical society of his/her choice.



Our annual bus trip to the Allen County Public Library (ACPL) was held 4 November 2017. If you have never been on one of our bus trips, you don't know what you are missing. Those who have been on one of our tours already are usually the first to register. Always great to see so many returnees and to also have some join us who have not been there before.

The ACPL Genealogy Center is a unique and valuable resource for the Northeastern Indiana community and the entire genealogical community at large. They have one of the largest research collections available including records from around the world. The library specializes in Canadian, British Isles, African-American and American Indian research. Its collection comprises 588,645 microfilms and microfiches, 55,804 volumes of family history books, 206,366 volumes of local history books, 28,575 microfilm reels of historical newspapers, thousands of maps and gazetteers, and more.

Their staff specializes in genealogy and is always available to help. Researchers can take advantage of access to librarians with years of training in research methods and various subjects.

We had a delightful dinner at the Cracker Barrel before returning home. It is always great to hear some of the success stories of the day.

### Civil War hits Eaton County Family Hard

## Lucinda Huff Ploof (Per Find A Grave)

- Birth 11 Jul 1806 Pennsylvania, USA
- **Death** 22 Jul 1894

Lucinda Huff Ploof wife of Francis Ploof. Lucinda was born in Coldchester Pa., July 11, 1806.

She lived in Chester until 1870, then moved to Charlotte where she buried her only daughter Susan Knapp, husband Francis and youngest son.

Her father and grandfather were patriots and soldiers and her husband a veteran of the war of 1812 and the civil war.

In 1860 her second son died of consumption. His only regret was that he could not have fought for the union. Four of the five left went as volunteers to the Civil war. One came home to die, two fill southern graves, only John, the eldest, returned to go in a short time to Nebraska. Throughout the war she was an untiring correspondent and many a boy in blue treasured mother Ploof's words written in those trying times.

After the return of her husband Francis from the Civil War ,he was unable to earn much of a living due to wounds from the fighting. Old age was spent in extreme poverty and Lucinda's clothing became ragged. When she came into possession of some cloth she soon sewed herself a fine new dress, which she proudly wore to a Sunday affair. On the way home, she and Francis happened on a house fire. The owner's wife was standing outside, wearing only a petticoat, all of her clothing was burning in the house. Without a thought, Lucinda removed her new dress, the only beautiful possession she had and gave it to the woman. She was well remembered in the family tradition for her sweet disposition and kindness.

Lucinda died July 22, 1894.

## Civil War hits Eaton County Family Hard

Continued

Francis Ploof and sons John, Dewitt, Francis A., and Charles all served, each in a different unit.

Only two of the five survived the war.



The father <u>Francis (1793-1883)</u> served with the 12<sup>th</sup> Michigan Infantry and returned blind for the rest of his life. He served in the War of 1812 as well. He is buried in Maple Hill, Charlotte.

<u>John W. (1833-1913)</u> served with Co. G of the 12th MI Infantry and was the only son to survive the war and shortly after returning home to Eaton County, he removed out West to rear a family and live out his life in Nebraska. He is buried in Hillcrest Cemetery in Decatur, Burt County, Nebraska.

<u>Charles (1838–1862)</u>, being severely ill, was furloughed home to die from Company M, 2<sup>nd</sup> Michigan Cavalry in October 1861 from Missouri. He died of consumption at home in Vermontville in 1862.

Son <u>Francis Allen aka Allen Francis (1841-1862)</u> of the 6<sup>th</sup> Michigan succumbed to disease in the swamps near Baton Rouge, Louisiana.

<u>Dewitt Clinton (1846-1864)</u>, while serving with the  $7^{th}$  Michigan Cavalry, was badly wounded and captured and died as a Confederate prisoner in Virginia. His body was never recovered.

The 1860 census shows John W. living in Chester Township and the rest of the family living in Vermontville, Eaton County, Michigan.
