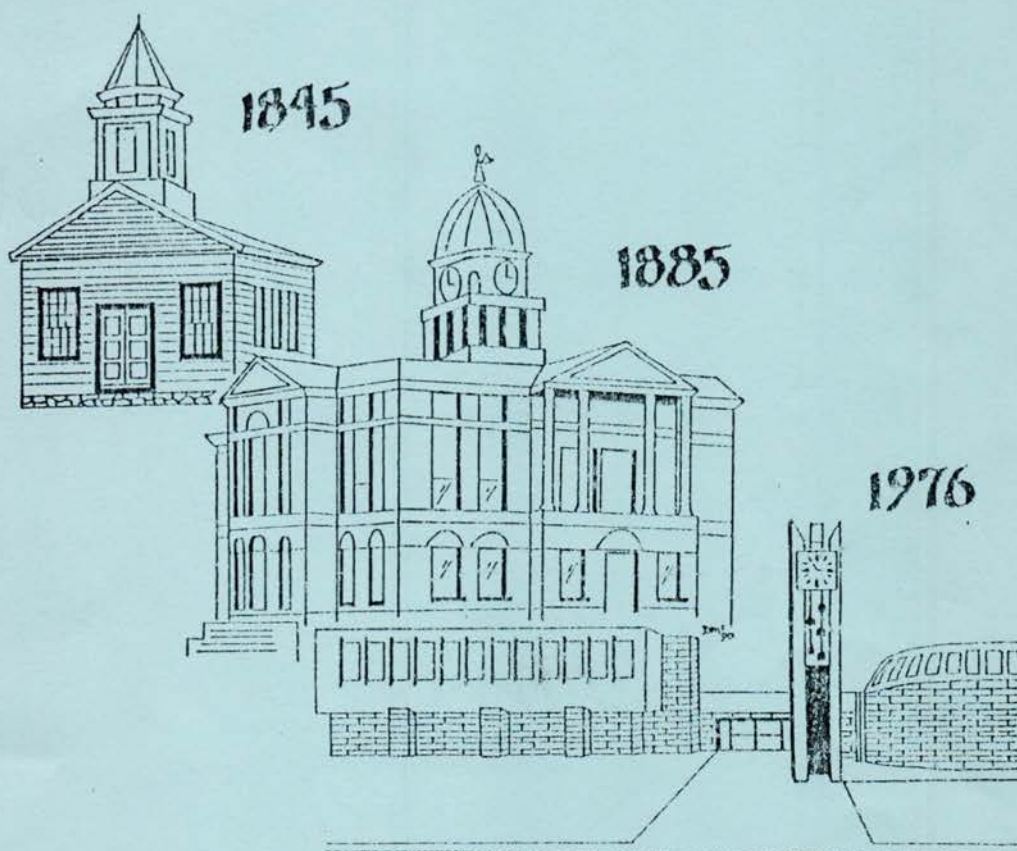

BROOKFIELD TOWNSHIP I.O.G.T.

The following article was found in a scrapbook from the collection at the library of the Eaton County Genealogical Society. Although the clipping was not dated, statements given within the article date it as being published in the year 1928.

Many years ago there flourished at "Duttonville" in Brookfield Township the Independent Order of Good Templars with a membership of 200 or over.

There each Saturday night the young people of the surrounding country would meet in the hall over Mrs. Sarah Williams' store and hold lodge. The memories of those bygone days were so pleasant that a few of the survivors living in and near Charlotte conceived the idea of having a reunion, although the lodge has been disbanded upwards of a quarter of a century. Accordingly through the efforts of **Vinnie Garvey**, who was a former secretary, and a few others the first reunion was held at Bennett Park the first Saturday, in August 1924. The plan met with such favor that a similar gathering has been held each year since at the same place, with a good attendance.

One of the most popular members was **Nellie Williams** over whose mother's store the meetings were held until the later years of the Order's existence. She very cordially invited the members and old Brookfield friends to her home in Union City this year for the fourth annual reunion. The weather was perfect for the drive and seventy-four of the old friends with their husbands and wives availed themselves of the opportunity to visit one who with her mother had done so much to encourage the Good Templar Lodge. Threatening clouds developed into a rain about dinner time so chairs and baskets were taken across the street to the basement of the M.E. Church where the abundant picnic dinner was enjoyed in comfort.

At the close of the meal the sun was again shining so all returned to the lawn where the business meeting and program were held. **Dr. C.S. Sackett** was elected "Chief Templar" for the ensuing year; **Mary Nye**, recording secretary; **Effie Tolbert**, corresponding secretary; and **Joe Webber**, treasurer. The funds of the Order were so well cared for in its flourishing days by **Joe** that all agreed that honor should still continue to be his. The newly elected Chief appointed the secretary, **Mary Nye**, **Millie Topliff** and **Susie McDonald** as program committee for next year.

An invitation was extended by **Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Shiderman** to meet at Duck Lake next year. As they have a cottage there they volunteered to make whatever arrangements necessary to insure a good time. It is needless to state that the invitation was gladly accepted. The program consisted of recitations and readings by **Clara Gildart**, **Rant Sherman**, **Lena Birkett**, **Millie Topliff** and **Gertie Hall** with remarks and reminiscences by many others. Some points of historical interest were brought out pertaining to what is now known as Brookfield Center although it is not geographically in the center of the township. Before the days of rural delivery, it was officially known as "Duttonville" and the postoffice went by that designation. **Dr. Dutton**

resided there and it was after him that the town was named. There was a dam in Battle Creek and a saw-mill was run by water-power in those early days, before the timber was gone. A very animated discussion of those pioneer days in Brookfield made that part of the program not only interesting but instructive as well. Copies of the opening and closing were provided to each by **Nina Kay Pryor** which made it possible to sing those songs as in "ye olden time."

Friends were present from Lansing, Charlotte, Brookfield, Homer, Sturgis, Battle Creek, Albion, Olivet and Bellevue, so that it proved a reunion in reality, and it is hoped many will again avail themselves of the opportunity to renew old acquaintance next year even though diverging paths lead us far apart.

As the group dispersed late in the afternoon all expressed themselves much pleased by the hospitality extended by **Mr. and Mrs. Miller**.

The "Nashville News" (published at Nashville, Barry Co., Michigan), Friday, January 12, 1894 issue presented a front page story about the 'recent fire at Bellevue, Eaton Co., Michigan.' The article reads as follows:

Best Business Blocks in the Village Destroyed, With Heavy Loss and Light Insurance

Shortly after six o'clock Tuesday evening fire was discovered in the old **Robinson foundry building** at Bellevue. The building was an old frame concern which stood on the corner east of the **opera house**, and was used by **Elmer Holland** for baling and storing hay. How the fire started is unknown, but almost as soon as it was discovered the entire building was in flames. A slight wind was blowing from the east; directly toward the **opera house** and the business portion of the town, and it was at once apparent that the Bellevue fire department, equipped with an ordinary hand engine, would be utterly unable to cope with the configuration, so assistance was immediately asked from Battle Creek and Charlotte. The Battle Creek boys loaded their steamer and one hose cart on a C. & G.T. special and flew to Bellevue at the rate of a mile a minute. The special then went to Charlotte and took the Charlotte department, with a similar equipment, to the unfortunate town. Before the outside assistance arrived, however, the flames had made terrible headway and a goodly portion of the business part of the town was in flames. The fire had eaten a pathway from the building where it started, through the **blacksmith and wagon shops** adjoining it to the west, to the **opera house**. This huge wooden building was soon a raging mass of flames and as it stood in close

proximity to the stores of Sawyer & Haven hardware, and Evans & Hare dry goods, they too were soon in the grasp of the flames. From these the fire spread rapidly southward, destroying H. Ovenshire's feed store, C.B. Higby's bazaar and Fred Van's confectionery and tobacco store. The flames also leaped across the street to the large double store of Frank Phelps, dry goods and clothing, and a wail of anguish went up from the hearts of the good people of Bellevue as they witnessed the hungry flames rapidly eating the heart out of their fair village. Just at this point, however, the Battle Creek boys, as valiant a lot of fire fighters as there are in Michigan, arrived on the scene, and a very emphatic veto was put upon the further progress of the flames, right then and there. They had the fire nearly under control when the Charlotte boys, another gallant crew, arrived, and the fire was soon a thing of history.

The loss is variously estimated at from \$50,000 to \$60,000, with but very light insurance, the prevailing rates being so high that many carried no insurance whatever, while others were but partially covered.

John Evans' loss is about \$18,000 with no insurance. Evans & Hare are heavy losers, part of their stock stored in the opera house building. The bulk of the goods in their store were carried out, but are in bad shape. Sawyer & Havens got out most of their stock, and have probably enough insurance to let them out. Frank Phelps' stock was almost entirely removed, but in a very bad condition. Elmer Holland had a large quantity of hay destroyed, with no insurance. At this time, however, we can gather but little details of the amount of losses or insurance, but the blow is a hard one to our sister village and it will undoubtedly be some time before she recovers from the effects of it.

The following article was submitted by Mr. Robert D. Haigh, one of our members. The story was published in the "Grand Rapids Herald," May 2, 1924 issue.

SHEIKS OF 1850 CARRIED BOOTS TO DANCE UNDER THEIR ARMS AS ECONOMY MEASURE
Not all Swains owned footwear and those who did, guarded it
jealously, Mulliken man says.

Mulliken May 2, 1924:

How the "Sheiks" of the early fifties carried their patent leather boots to dance under their arms, putting them on after they arrived there just to save wear on them is related by William Root of this place (Mulliken), who will be 91 years old next August 18th.

Boots and shoes were expensive in those days, Mr. Root said. A

pair of boots such as the young men wore then cost about \$7 and, by the way, \$7 was \$7 at that time.

Few of the fellows would dance in their boots after they got there, but would take them off and stack them next to the wall, where they could keep an eye on them.

Swains Shoeless

Going barefoot was the common thing then. I remember when I was a boy and my family lived on a farm near Cleveland, we seldom had shoes to wear, even in the winter.

You see, there were fourteen of us kids and shoes for all would have run into money.

Shortly after coming to Michigan, Mr. Root said, he was asked to take part in a logging bee. The field where the men were to work had been heavily grown up with thistles and the farmer had just mowed these with a sythe.

Mr. Root said his feet were so toughened by going barefoot that he worked among the dried thistles all day without feeling any pain.

Mr. Root was a great lover of the woods in his younger days and he boasts he seldom missed hitting a squirrel in the head with a rifle, even if the animal were in the tallest tree.

Despite his years, Mr. Root still is hale and hearty and retains the use of all his faculties. His sense of hearing is only slightly affected and he reads without glasses daily.

Mr. Root served during the Civil War in the 23rd Ohio regiment under Rutherford B. Hayes. He first saw action in the battle of Antietam, serving there as a raw recruit in the thickness of the fight.

Served Under McKinley

He was honorably discharged June 13, 1865 at Cumberland, Maryland, William McKinley being his captain at that time. George and Joe, two brothers of Mr. Root served through the war in the same company with him.

Mr. Root has been married three times. His first wife and infant son died while he was serving in the Union army. He and his second wife raised a family of nine children.

Mr. Root's father, when a young man, walked from Connecticut and settled on a farm near the latter place. At that time Cleveland consisted of just three log cabins.

(NOTE- Grandpa William Root met his young brother, George, on the battle field, both their faces were black from gun powder smoke. He exclaimed to brother George "My God, George, what are you doing here!?" He did not know his brother was in the war.)

William Root's children were George W., Ida, Vira, Lillie, Alma, Fred, Alfred, Ruby, and Leonard who died at age 21.)
