

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## EXCERPTS FROM AUNT BESS' COLLECTION ON THE WOODMAN/FRENCH FAMILIES

Our family has been blessed with a wealth of genealogical information passed down to us from parents, aunts and uncles. The most extensive collection is the work of Bess Woodman Odiorne. The Michigan State Library has the bulk of her collection, there is some of her work at the Fort Wayne Indiana Library, and the remainder was willed to her nephews John and Tom Woodman.

Aunt Bess was truly a remarkable person, doing much of her work after being stricken with Parkinson's Disease. She was born Dec. 20, 1906 in Eaton County, the daughter of Jesse and Lillian (Howard) Woodman, and married Earl Odiorne. They worked for the Miller Dairy Farm at one time, then owned their own farm in Eaton County. They had two sons, Milo (who married Betty McManus), and David (who married Jacquelline Robinson). Bess & Earl retired and moved to Florida. Then after Earl died in 1981, Bess returned to Michigan. She later lived with Milo and Betty in Memphis, Tennessee. Milo died in 1986, and she continued to live with Betty for many years. Bess died October 7, 1991, at the age of 84 in Memphis, Tenn.

Right up to her last days Bess worked on her treasured genealogy collection. About two years prior to her death, on her last trip to Michigan, I was privileged to be her companion on outings to the Michigan State Library to visit her collection and see the new library. Although the Parkinson's Disease had at that time weakened her to the point walking was difficult, she wanted to go to the library. We rented a wheelchair, piled her books and tote bags on her lap and headed for the genealogy department to spend the day. Betty Goostrey met us at the library and Bess kept both of us busy getting materials and making copies for her.

In a letter Bess wrote, dated May 22, 1970, requesting information from a Woodman family in Maine she wrote:

"For over five years now, I have been working on a book to bring all the Woodman families in the United States and Canada up to date.

I have a list of Woodman names to whom I am writing as fast as I can which numbers 523 without your name and those I listed to you in this letter, which would make 529. So you can see it is a big task, and I need all the help I can get to get this book done."

From a letter she wrote April 28, 1989 to Josiane Woodman of Angola, New York, she says:

"A member of the Morman Church came to my trailer home in 1983 and microfilmed all the material I had at that point." (Author's note - He sent her six rolls of microfilm of her materials.)

Bess had compiled information on at least nine generations of Woodmans, tracing all but two branches of these families back to brothers Edward and Archelaus Woodman, (The first Woodman immigrants to America that we have a record of.)

The two Woodman family branches that she couldn't tie in both settled in Michigan. One branch was three brothers; Franklin, Benjamin and Raymond Woodman who settled in Gratiot County. The other is our branch, descendants of Charles Albert Woodman, which was her main concern.

She searched for years in vain for information leading to Charles Albert Woodman's vital statistics and ancestry so she could complete and publish her book.

Less than six months before her death, her nephew Tom Woodman of Painesville, Ohio found Charles and Dorcas Woodman's marriage date and place, which led him to information on our ancestry dating back to 1615. Needless to say, Bess was overjoyed. However, none of us to this date have found Charles' death date or place of death and burial. We have determined he was alive in November of 1848 and dead by May of 1849. Also, to date this branch can't be tied into the Edward - Archelaus line.

Although Bess didn't live to complete her book, she contributed much of value to many people. John Woodman of Massachusetts, who had corresponded with Bess, came to Lansing to copy information from her collection at the State Library. He is hoping to publish a book of Woodman families in the United States. Bonnie Woodman, (wife of Bess' nephew John Woodman) is working on a book of Charles Albert Woodman's descendants.

The following explanation of how Bess got started on genealogy was copied from one of her many notebooks. "Indeed, the first real clue came from a Miss Grace Holcomb, who is a descendant of Dorcas' stepdaughter, Elizabeth French Cook. My mother had said we were related to the Epleys and Frenchs on my father's side of the family; but it meant nothing to me until 1964 when I began to try and trace my family lineage of my father, Jesse Woodman. I had come across the Woodman name on a barn in 1954 when on a trip to Mass., New Hampshire and Maine. It was the name, "King Woodman," in Maine. I thought then it would be nice to know more about my father's family; but would never hear it from him as he never said anything about his family. I was too young to remember any of my grandparents except my grandfather, Stephen Howard. He was my mother's father, and was married to Mrs. Alice Blair, the grandmother I loved to spend summers with. My grandmother Rosetta (Long) Howard died before I was born; leaving seven children. My mother, Lillian Harriet Howard, and six brothers; Uncle Ernest, Stephen, William, George, Thomas, and Earl. These I knew. On my father's side, I only knew a few of his brothers and sisters; Uncle Charles Washington Woodman, Aunt Luella (Woodman) Stacey and Aunt Nettie (Woodman) Burt. The others I heard about but did not get to know very well. They probably would have known about my great-grandfather, Charles A. Woodman; but at that time, 1906 to

1926, I was not interested in anything but growing up and had one ambition, to be a teacher. Whenever all the neighborhood children gathered together we played school and I was always the teacher.

That we were a little bit related in a distant way to Miss Holcomb I had been told, but did not believe it. I only knew I liked her and when we had our farm, my husband sold milk to the dairy she operated and I often went there to buy whipping cream, cottage cheese and butter. We visited but never talked family or genealogy; we weren't interested in those things.

So it was a surprise when I finally did get interested in doing something about father's family. There had been a family group who were working on the Odiorne Family Genealogy trying to bring out a second book to bring the Odiorne lines to the present generations. Through the sponsorship of David Odiorne of Illinois, with the help of the Odiorne Committee, this was finally realized and a second book was published. The work became interesting to me and I did some work on that book; but not until we sold our farm and moved to Florida did I find the time to start on my Woodman line. By that time all the family elders who might have given me information were gone and I did not have many clues to go on until Miss Holcomb found these old letters in the safe of her mother's brother. They were written by Isaac French to his daughter, Elizabeth French, back in Ohio. From them, I found that my great grandmother, Dorcas (Brinsden, Woodman) French lived just around the corner from the farm my husband and I owned in 1938. Miss Holcomb had heard I was working on a book about the Woodman Families, and she called me about the letters. At the time I had started my work and had gathered information from the Library in Ft. Lauderdale, Fla., and the one in Miami, Fla., where I had gathered enough information to fill two note books; but no connection to my own line. I bought a copy of Doane's Book on Genealogy, and started to put my notes in order. One Sunday while visiting my sister who lived in Delton, Mich., I happened to look in the phone book and found several Woodman families. On the spur of the moment I called a Mrs. John Woodman and asked if I might come see her. When I got there I found they had quite complete records on their family from the 5th generation to the 10th which was theirs. And a clue that led me to trace back to the 4th, 3rd, 2nd and 1st generation here in America; and with the information from the Miami Library, back to 1574 in England. This verified information I had gathered from a Mr. Joseph Edward Woodman who lived in Jacksonville, Fla., and had let me come to his home and type a copy of his family records. He was a direct descendant of the Lt. Edward Woodman who came from England in 1635 to settle in Newbury, Mass., and had the four sons who were the progenitors of the Woodman families in the States. The Delton, Michigan family was a direct line descendant of Edward's brother, Captain John Woodman of Oyster River Plantation. He built the Woodman Garrison which withstood so many Indian attacks. This was later called Dover. These two sons were born in England and came with their father Edward Sr. and the mother, Joanna, from England to Newbury in 1635. It is well to note here that Edward's half brother, Archelaus Woodman, also came about the same time and also settled in Newbury, Mass.

The 3rd and 4th brothers were born in Newbury; as were the three sisters of Edward and John. Joshua Woodman was supposedly the first white male child born in Newbury. His brother, Jonathon born in Newbury, was left the place of his father, Edward, with the stipulation that he would care for the parents. When they died he went to New Hampton, N. H. to live; and there many of his descendants live today."

CHARLES ALBERT WOODMAN was christened November 22, 1818 in Great Somerford, England, the son of Richard and Florancy (Knapp) Woodman. He married Dorcan Brinsden, daughter of William and Melicent Brinsden of Chippenham, England, on March 28, 1843. Charles & Dorcas' marriage record lists Charles' occupation as a mason, Richard Woodman's as a mason and William Brinsden's as a gardener.

In May of 1843, Charles and Dorcas Woodman boarded the ship Wellington at London, England and sailed to New York. They settled in Wooster, Wayne Co., Ohio, purchasing a lot known as Lot #308 on the revised plot of the town of Wooster from David Fairfield for \$141.00. Their three children Henry Albert, George Leister, and Julia are shown in the 1850 Ohio census as ages 7, 5, and 2 respectfully and shows Dorcas as "Darius" age 30. Charles died sometime between November 1848 and May 1849. Julia died (in Wooster) in November 1849 (1850 Mortality Schedule).

ISAAC FRENCH - Bess writes, "On Isaac French, my step-great grand-father: Isaac French was born 9-25-1813 in Cambit (or Caubit), Lincolnshire, England. The son of Thomas and Elizabeth French. He had a brother Thomas, James who came to America, Charles and several sisters whom I do not have names for. He thought Charles might come to America; but apparently he did not. He is mentioned in several letters to daughter Elizabeth, but that is all."

Isaac married on 9-28-1846. An exact copy of the marriage certificate is given on the following page.

"Isaac and Mary's daughter was born in England, 6-5-1847. Isaac and Mary left from Liverpool, England, in 1849. The journey took seven weeks and the ship docked in New York Harbor. When Isaac and Mary Ann with the baby left New York I do not know; but they were in Ohio City, Ohio but two weeks when Mary Ann died, leaving Isaac with Elizabeth French to care for."

Isaac married Charles Albert Woodman's widow, Dorcas Woodman on October 9, 1850 in Wooster, Ohio, where they lived until coming to Michigan.

Isaac's brother JAMES FRENCH was born 9-25-1820. Ress writes of James and Isaac in America as follows: "James came to America about the time Isaac did. They both went to Sullivan Township, Ashland County, Ohio where they did farm work. Then James left around 1850-51 for Michigan and Isaac stayed in Ohio, where he placed Elizabeth with Mrs. Foster and her daughter, Harriet N. Foster. Elizabeth was with them until 1861 when Isaac urged her to join him in Eaton County, Michigan. She did not stay on the farm with Isaac and her stepmother, Dorcas (Woodman) French very long as she and Dorcas did not get along very well. It was not until Dorcas died in 1881 that she took over his household.

Isaac put both Henry and George out to work for other farmers, and he did the same with Elizabeth. This was so they could help earn their own keep and get training to do different kinds of work.

For a time James boarded at Isaac's; then with different families in the area; marrying later in life after he had his farm land cleared and his house and barn built. Then he married the widow, Mrs. Thomas Foster of the same neighborhood."

The following pages will be from the letters Miss Grace Holcomb shared with Bess Odiorne. Spelling is taken verbatim.

#### A letter from James to Isaac

Eaton July 5, 1852.

Dear Brother:

I receive your letter with pleasure, and hope this few lines will find you as well as they leave me. I had send you a letter but I see that you did not get it. I inform you that I never intend to come here for to leave here. I have bought eighty acres of land in Eaton County, and Eaton Township, Michigan, and I am now working by the month to finish paying for it. Last winter I chopped eight or ten acres on my land. If you sell out where you live, I want you to come to me, and see this country before you buy elsewhere, and as soon as you hear of our brudders let me know, or if one wilt come, send him to me, or come with him.

I like this part first rate, this country is pretty healthy; I had my health better ever since I am here, and the land here is better than there in Ohio. My land is in Eaton Township, six miles from Charlotte. That is the County seat. Write me again as soon as you get this. No more at present. I remain your affectionate brother,

James French.

My address: Mr. James French Charlotte, Eaton County, Michigan. On January 31, 1854, William James French was born to Isaac and Dorcas in Wooster, Ohio. Isaac, Dorcas, and William, along with Henry and George Woodman (Dorcas and Charles' sons) left Wooster in 1856 to come to Michigan. The following is a letter from Isaac to his daughter Elizabeth who was left with the Fosters in Ohio.

Eaton Co. Feb. 2nd, 1857

Dear daughter Elizabeth French and Friends.

We write these few lines to you hoping they will find you all well as they leave us all in good health at this time, thank God. We have all been well since we left Wooster. The little boy is well and he is as fat as Elizabeth. He grows the very picture of Elizabeth. The boys are both well, and we also have some news to tell which is the birth of a little girl, its name is Louisa Ann, it was born on the 5th day of Dec. 1856. Both mother and daughter are doing very well. The reason why I did not write before I had no news of importance and I have been so busy; and I thought you was all well or else we should have heard from you. So I hope you will excuse me for not writing sooner but the Lord's will I do intend to write oftener. The time we was coming out was 30 hours from Wooster to this place, we had a pleasant journey and found my brother James very well. He is very well at this time and sends his love to you his neice. We did not get our goods until in June, they was delayed somewhere in the Depots between Wooster and here but we received them all safe at last, but they over charged us for the transportation which was \$24.00. I had to write to the intermediate stations on the railways and to Wooster before we got them. We began to think we should not get them. I had to fetch them 50 miles from Coldwater station, it took me 4 days with an ox team; it cost us about \$50.00 to get out with ourselves and goods so you see it cost a pretty round sum. We had a very dry summer here, we had no rain until November of any amount. The spring crops was very light through all the drouth; we had eleven acres of corn planted but the dry season and early frost we had in August the corn did not turn out more than half a crop. We planted garden soon as we got there, we had green peas in June but we did not get much other garden truck that was later before it matured through the dry season. I have cleared 10 acres of land and put up a good fence around it. I sowed 10 bushels of wheat on part of it and the remainder I do intend to plant in the spring with corn and potatos if all is well. I am chopping and clearing six acres for the next fall. My brother is chopping about the same quantity for the next fall. He cleared and fenced 10 acres the last summer; he sowed 12 bushels of wheat on 8 acres so we do expect to have bread stuff without buying after next harvest. So we do still live in hopes. We have a pretty cold winter here so far; the first snow fell on the 29th of Nov. and we have had sledding every since. The snow is about as deep as it was in Ohio last winter; but there is one consolation we have no fire wood to buy, we have our choice, beach, suger ash, oak, elm, so we need not perish with cold if we are not too idle to chop it. We have a cook stove it cost us \$26.00; it has an elevated oven, one of late patent.

We have eleven houses within a half mile of us and also a school house within half mile of us and the boys goes to school so you see we have plenty of neighbors. There is four families within one mile and half of us by the name of Foster.

Our nearest neighbor is name Foster, that is across the way. They are English, they used to live in Sullivan who Wood bought his land of when we first came to this country. They have been here seven years this next spring. The health of this country has been very good since we have been here but it was unhealthy the wet summer so perhaps it was a good thing we did not get here that summer. Mrs. Frenchs health has been very good since we have been here considering the situation she has been in this last summer; she is pretty stout and we are in hopes she will continue so. We have never heard any news from Wooster so we do expect to hear from you and some Wooster news also. We heard Charles Hay had been forging. Send us word how you have got along with your farming or if you are school teaching and all the news you are in possession of. Send us word how you all are and I do expect Elizabeth thought I had forgotten her but I have not. I expect to see her signature in the letter you send. She said she thought Willey would talk when she saw him again, he can talk now. sold the dower when we came away and we do not know if they mean to buy it. I wrote to Mr. Flattery in October but we never had any answer from him.

Wheat is \$1.12 1/2 per bushel; corn 66 cts; potatoes 1.00; May \$10.00 per ton; butter 25 cts per lb. We have 19 chickings and 2 ducks; one sow, and six shoats about six months old so we do expect to have some pork next fall without buying. You may depend it is not all gold that glitters in the west for it is pretty hard getting along the first commencement, having everything to buy and not earning any money by having so much work of your own to do which you must do to clear off the land and get the crops in or else I should be as bad off if I had no land so I thought I would take the hardship the first year expecting to have it softer the next year. So any one that goes west to have land they want to have money to last them one or two years at any rate. This is all I have to say about the west at the present. Please give my respects to all inquiring friends.

Dear friends and my dear child Elizabeth French we join with our kind love to you all. I still remain your affectionate father, my dear daughter.

#### Isaac French.

Did you get the things we left you; let us know these earleyst possible period by return of post.

Long look for has come at last. We hope you have a happy new year. Good morning. We have not heard anything of Charles.

Direct to Isaac French Charlotte Post Office Eaton County, Michigan BESS' NOTE, "This did not seem to go with any particular letter; but was sent to Elizabeth for her journey to Michigan evidently. Copied from original loaned to me by Miss Grace Holcomb. Bess Odiorne June 4, 1972."

From Wooster to Mansfield 40 miles this is the first station, then you will get a ticket from Mansfield to Toledo which is about 92 miles, but you will have to change cars at Monrovill which is but 40 miles from Mansfield and at this station you will get your baggage checked for Adrian Untill then you will have to look after it when they check your baggage they strap a piece of brass with a number on and give you one to corrispond with the one they strap on your baggage when you arrive at Adrian you will find it all safe and you show them your check they will give you your baggage this will be night when you arrive at Adrian you will inquire for the gairery house and stay all night in the morning you will take the cars and come to Jackson which is 52 miles their is a stage their ready that comes to Eaton Rapids which is 25 miles on a plank road you will be in Eaton Rapids at 12 o'clock which is 8 miles from our house and I will be their to meet you so that you will not be out but one night. But I will here remark it 33 miles from Toledo to Adrian this you will have to pay when you get to Toledo mind and get your baggage check at Monrovill to Adrian which is as far as you will come the first day and no further and send me word the day you will leave Wooster and I shall meet you only mind and send two weeks before you leave so that I may get the letter in time.

(Author's note:) I don't have any information on the Jackson to Eaton Rapids plank road, or the fares for the trip from Wooster, but the book <u>Bittersweet Journey</u> by Bernice M. Chappel describes the plank road between Lansing and Detroit as eighteen feet wide. Around 1850 the toll from Lansing to Detroit was \$3.00. For local travel the toll was one cent a mile per horse. It cost seven cents a mile per person to ride the stagecoach.

In a letter dated June 1, 1861 Isaac writes, "We are busy now. We have had six men boarding, carpenters and masons building the barn. They commenced on Monday; we do expect they will rase the building on Wednesday next. It will take them three weeks to build the barn from beginning to finishing so you see Mother will have her hands full until this busy time is over for they take some cooking for the day when we do rase we shall have about fifty men to help. The neighbors that is living around, their was one barn built two miles from us three weeks since by these same carpenters; their was about 50 men at the rasing and the ladies comes to hep to fix for supper for the men as their is all ways some extra fixings at such times in this section."

On March 16, 1963, Isaac writes, "Eggs is 7 cts. per dozen, butter 10 cts per 1b. chickens 15 cts each. Wheat 1.50 per bushel; corn 50 ct per bushel.

I am going to make sugar on Barbara Foster's lot again. I have made preparations when the weather permits. It has not been very cold this winter, we have not had snow enough to have a sleigh ride above 3 or 4 days. Henry has gone apprentice to George Trussler at Charlotte to be a blacksmith. George is going out to the openings next week, he has been at Kirby's all winter to go to Fox school. Two of the Bush boys has joined in the Army, Christian and Frederic. They are at Washington."

#### Author's Comments:

There are 24 letters from Isaac to Elizabeth, that I know of, in Bess' genealogy notebooks & files. They cover a period from February 2, 1857 thru September 4, 1964. Two especially poignant letters were written March 5, & 11 of 1861 telling Elizabeth of the death of Willie and Louisa (Isaac & Dorcas' children).

As near as I can tell by the worn headstone they share, Louisa died March 1st and Willie died the 7th. Isaac wrote "they had the scarlett rash". (Bess' notes said they had Scarletina and Diptheria.)

Dorcas died April 10, 1881. Her death notice in the Charlotte Republian read: "Mrs. Isaac French died, Sunday, April 10. Funeral services took place at the U. B. Church Brookfield, the following day. She was one of the oldest settlers in Eaton."

Isaac died November 18, 1886. His obit in the Charlotte Republican said: "Isaac French died, at his residence in Eaton, Thursday, November 18, of Brights disease. His funeral was very largely attended at Fox church, Saturday, Nov. 20, Elder Stevenson, of Eaton Rapids, officiating, after which he was laid to rest in the grave yard close by. Mr. F. moved on his place here in 1856, living there ever since as a most estimable neighbor and friend. He was 73 years of age, was born in Caubit, Lincolnshire, England, came to this country in 1849, with his first wife and daughter, Mrs. Eli Cook, of this place. The mother died two weeks after their arrival. He again married and the second wife and two little ones sleep beside him. His illness was brief though he suffered intensely. His only surviving child mourns a father gone and also the last near relative of her family. We extend our sympathy for her in her desolateness."

George Woodman (Charles & Dorcas' son, Elizabeth French's stepbrother) died May 5, 1887. The item in the Charlotte paper about his death said; "George Woodman, aged forty, and one of Eaton's Pioneers, died last Thursday and was buried from Fox church, Brookfield, Friday." Isaac, Dorcas, Willie, Louisa and George are buried in Fox Cemetery on Spicerville Road. There is also a stone for Mary Ann (Isaac's first wife who died in Ohio City, Ohio.)

With George's death, Henry Woodman (Charles & Dorcas' son) and Elizabeth French (Isaac & Mary Ann French's daughter) were left as the only surviving descendants of these pioneers.

Henry Woodman married America Eppley and they had 10 or 11 children (I have a record of 10, but Bess' notes say 6 sons and 5 daughters.) Jesse James Woodman, one of their sons, married Lillian Howard and this couple were the parents of Bess Woodman.

Elizabeth French married Eli Cook. They had two children, a daughter Mamie and a son Charles. Mamie married Homer Holcomb. Mamie and Homer had three children; Glen, Homer, and Grace Holcomb. Grace was the one who shared the letters from Isaac with Aunt Bess.

In the Charlotte Republican, Friday July 23, 1915 under local briefs is the following; "Henry Woodman, a pioneer of this county, coming here from Ohio with his parents when a small child, is dead. He was the father of ten children and died in the home of his son, Thomas, in Windsor, where he had lived since the death of his wife six years ago. Funeral at the home Tuesday in charge of Rev. Van Auken, burial in the Fox Cemetery Brookfield."

Elizabeth died in 1923. A book of obits in the Eaton County Genealogical Society library Charlotte, MI yielded the following obit:

Death of Mrs. Eli Cook — Mrs. Elizabeth Cook passed away at her home on Warren avenue early Tuesday morning, August 14, as the result of heart trouble. Her death came as a shock to her many friends, as she had been in her usual health, with an exception of being indisposed a few days previous to her death.

Mrs. Cook was a woman of unusual ability, and her kindly manner won for her a host of friends who will miss her as a neighbor and from the social circles. She was a prominent worker in the W. R. C. and was president of the corps in this city about four years ago and previous to that time held the same position in the Eaton Rapids W.R.C., before moving from her country home to Charlotte.

Deceased was born in Lincolnshire, England, June 5, 1847, and came to this country with her parents when but two years of age. Her parents settled in Pennsylvania and later moved to Ohio, where they lived until they came to Michigan during the Civil war.

She was united in marriage to Eli Cook July 3, 1867, and they spent many happy years of married life in their beautiful farm home in Brookfield. Mr. Cook passed away February 17, 1917, and since that time deceased has made her home with her son, Charles J. Cook, and daughter Mary, who with Mrs. Homer Holcomb, a daughter living in South Eaton, survive her.

The funeral will be held at the home Thursday afternoon and remains will be laid at rest in Rose Hill cemetery.

The following is a continuation of the series on "Eaton County Teachers' Institute Fees And Vouchers- 1889-1905." This segment deals with the Fees and Vouchers for the year 1892.

#### Eaton County Teachers' Institute Fees And Vouchers

#### What One Man Did

#### Copied from the "Springport Signal" newspaper, Fri., 18 Sep 1908

Some dozen or more years ago Charles S. Hutt of Dimondale went to the trouble, unbeknown to other business men in that village, of advertising a "street fair" for the town. Mr. Hutt advertised races, ball games, and other sports, and did not have a cent to put into the deal. Merchants looked at the thing as a joke, but that didn't worry Hutt any and he kept at work getting farmers to promise to bring their stock, big pumpkins and pretty babies to the fair. Time passed on and the first day of the fair arrived, the stock came and so did the crowd. The games were pulled off and the best stock took the premium, etc. and all were happy, especially the farmers who sold all the stock exhibited, for breeding purposes. Each year since that memorable day Dimondale has pulled off a "home coming" carnival instead of a street fair, the one last week being like all others- a grand success, but not as useful and interesting as the first. We think the street fair with its nice stock and farm products far ahead of the carnival of sports without them. The fair, even if it is a small affair, induces better farming & stock raising, and is instructive, while the carnival is not.

The good people over at Dimondale no longer take Hutt's schemes as jokes and he is probably the originator of the street fair in Michigan.



Feasibility Study & Success!!!!!

The feasibility study I reported on in issue #10 of our "Quest" magazine has been completed and the news is very good! About 50-55 interviews were

conducted by a professional consultant, Michele Steed. Her report to the Eaton County Historical Commission showed that the community has a strong desire to save the 1885 courthouse, as well as the old sheriff's residence which stands next door. The courthouse will take precedence over the sheriff's residence. The desire of the citizens interviewed is that the courthouse be turned into a first-class museum /cultural center.

Steps are currently underway to form a corporation. A 22 member Board of Directors will be recruited by mid-October and things will be a bit more 'official' then.

I might add that when the citizens were asked what comes to mind when they thought of the 1885 courthouse, our genealogical society came as their answer more than a few times. We've made quite an impression on the public in the last several years, and I think it is only the beginning! Watch us grow!!

For some time I have been bothered by some-New-Found Documents thing. I had heard that some old records were down in the vaults of the old sheriff's residence. next door to our 1885 courthouse. Until recently,

the Home Extension Office was housed in that building. They made a move to a new facility a few months ago, and I thought, "what better time to go check out the yaults?!" I received permission from the proper authority to see what was there and to bring the found items to our genealogy department for safe keeping. Drouscella Halsey and I went on what turned out to be a fruitful hunt. We came back with documents dating as far back as 1838. These items will be catalogued and in our room for the public's enjoyment. I'm glad I don't have to wonder any more what was in those vaults!
