

Virginia Preston

Virginia F. Sherman Preston was born in Charlotte, Mich., April 25, 1875. She was always a very sweet and good child when a little thing, and as she grew older ever remained so. She had a very strong will, and if she undertook to do anything was sure to succeed. We used to say sometimes that she was stubborn, but it was only firmness; one good thing about her she was always firm in the right. I was never afraid to trust her, for she seemed always to have that right principle about her, that I felt sure would keep her from anything wrong. No one was ever hurt by associating with her, and she had friends among all classes; the old and young, boys and girls alike. Even her young men friends would counsel and consult with Vinnie as they might with an elder sister. How many will remember her kind words. She was very fond of poetry and had written many pieces a few of which are found in this little booklet.

She was never very strong, but would not give up to bodily pain when many times it would have been the best to do so. Always busy; even now the neighbors will speak of how she used to fly past to and from her work, rain or shine, she was always ready.

She was taken sick in March, and July 28, 1896*, just after midnight, she left us for a better home. She was not afraid to go. A few days before we had a long talk. I said, "O, Vinnie, you'll come back to your poor old lonesome mother, won't you?" Said she, "I will if I

can, ma, but it may be so that I can't, but if I cannot come back to you, you and Minnie can come where I am; and even if I cannot come back, I can tell them all how much you have needed them this summer to help take care of me. I am sure I can do that. I shall see them all, pa, and Harry and grandma and all of them." Then she told me what to do with her things. "Give my Bible and set ring to Minnie, and the other ring to Bessie, and my Shakespeare to Ernest and give everyone some little notion of mine, and tell aunt Chloe I want her to dress me and Minnie to fix my hair." It broke our hearts to hear her talk so, but she was so calm through it all. "Don't go about crying for me after I am gone. It is nothing. I am no more afraid than I would be to get up and walk into the other room." Then she wanted me to read the Psalm where it says, "The Lord is my shepherd." When I got to "Yea though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil" she said "He will hold my hand when you let go; but, ma, hold my hand just as long as you can."

Was anything ever more pitiful to break a poor mother's heart? But I will not say more. We think of her only to love her more and more. She certainly did do her share of good while she lived her short life, and even now I feel her presence ever near, and could not do or even think a thing to grieve her. She lived a blameless life and did not die; such sweet spirits never die. We shall see her soon.

About that train I s'pose you're wond'ring, Telegrams were sent ahead, But those cars whizzed by like lightning, And everyone of us was mad.

The crowd in the hotel office Argued there till four, Then two couples started homeward, The horses could not carry more.

The rest remained till morning, And as our train went whizzing by, That lumber wagon pulled in town, "Twas seen by every eye.

Only three of all that crowd Ilad grit enough to work all day, With open eyes but sleepy brain They passed the weary hours away.

My friends, I must advise you If you ever for a sleighride go, Don't be quite so anxious; Bobs run better where there's snow.

Your editor did a little research on the brief life of Virginia Preston and retrieved the following records: <u>Eaton County Death Record</u>. volume 3, page 60, record #119 ~ Virginia F.S. Preston, died 28 July 1897, female, white, single, age 22 years 3 months 3 days, in Charlotte, of Consumption, occupation: Composition, born: Michigan, parents: Elisaph A Preston (deceased) and M. Adalaide Preston (residence Charlotte, Mich.). Recorded 29 Aug 1898.

An article in the 18 Dec 1975 Charlotte Republican-Tribune ("Glancing Back," written by Robert B. Collins) concerns a photograph taken about 1893, sent in by George R. Wildren in 1958 showing the interior of the Republican-Tribune newspaper office & 12 employees. Virginia Preston is one of the ladies in the photo. George Wildren (who was an employee in 1893 and is included in the photo) says: "Virginia Preston, called 'Ginnie,' died young. She was the sister of Roy who became a leading Charlotte banker."


Obit., Charlotte Tribune, 28 Jul 1897: PRESTON- at her home, in this city, Wednesday, July 28, 1897, at one o'clock a.m., after a lingering decline following pneumonia, Miss Virginia F.S. Preston, youngest daughter of Mrs. M. A. Preston, aged 22 yrs., 3 mos. and 3 days. The life of our young friend has been spent in this city, where she was well known and beloved for her many graces of spirit. She had been a newspaper compositor for several years, working on the several city papers to the time of her illness. In her various relations in life; in the home circle, at school, among her fellow workers, in church, and young people's societies she lived nobly and formed abiding friendships Many hearts are sad at this early separation, and the tenderest sympathy is felt for the mother, brother and sister who will feel the loss most. She knew the separation was inevitable, and talked freely and calmly to her mother about it, and gave directions concerning the disposition of personal belongings among her friends, and for her funeral, which will be held at the residence, tomorrow at 10:30 a.m. (End)

∼ The Past Well Traveled

So many roads that we travel today in Eaton County and I suppose any county, city, or state are named after someone \sim an early settler or prominent citizen of earlier times. Sometimes we know the ancestors of a forebearers for whom a road is named after. However, quite often, depending upon the family lines of migration, they no longer have any living ancestors in the area to remind us of the family.



Let's take Mr. Spice and see who he was. Amos Spicer, and his brother Pierpoint, left Ohio for Michigan about the first of November 1835. Once in Michigan they looked for land adjacent to

a stream that would develop enough water power to operate a saw and grist mill. They reached the place where two streams met. Spicer observed this was a wonderful setting for an industrial center and that a town of some prominence would be located there some day. They filed claim on the land they had selected before some speculator could jump the same, and returned to Ohio for supplies and their families. It was about the middle of April when the Spicer family, consisting of Amos, Eunice, Freddie, Ben, Althea and their baby again left for Michigan.

The first thing on Amos' mind was building the saw mill, erecting the dam and excavating the race. Amos had enough men in his employ to work on all projects at one time.

Just why a certain road was named after someone I suppose could tell us quite a bit about that person. Early roads were probably named after many prominent farmers who owned a considerable amount of land, and perhaps even maintained the road to their property. Others were named for merchants, judges, politicians (local, state and county). Eaton County, for instance, was named after John H. Eaton who was Secretary of War in Andrew Jackson's cabinet. The Legislative Council of Michigan passed an act forming the county of Eaton and 12 other counties on the 29th day of October 1829. All these counties were named after members of Jackson's cabinet also.

Eaton County was first a township by the name of Belleville and was attached to Calhoun County for judicial purposes. Eaton became a county before Michigan became a state. Michigan was at first in the Northwest Territory, then Indiana Territory, and in 1805 was organized as Michigan Territory. Michigan was not proclaimed a state until January 1837, some eight years after the county of Eaton was formed.

Some roads named after early settlers were Spicerville (Spicer), Kinneville (Kinne), Ackley, Toles, Peck, Smith, Santee, and Shance. Each time we travel the older Eaton County roads we are traveling on a part of our history, our past. These are the names of earlier men and their families who braved a new world and left a mark for their efforts and hardships.

\sim The Way Bodies are Embalmed \sim

Taken from "Uncle Sam's Almanac For the Year 1866," Philadelphia, PA, published by

King and Baird, No. 607 Sansom Street

By embalming people generally are apt to imagine that the modern process consists of saturating, filling and surrounding the dead bodies with spices, gums and other indestructible and preservative substances, as is understood to have been the process practiced by the ancients. Such, however, is not the case. The modern process is about as follows: The blood is drawn off through the jugular vein. An incision is then made upon the inside of the thigh, through which a chemical liquid is injected by mechanical means. This liquid permeates all the veins and arteries, taking the place before occupied by the blood, and in a short time renders the entire body as hard as a stone and as rigid as a statue. A portion of the scalp is removed and the brain scooped out. The chest is opened and the heart, lungs and viscera are abstracted. When the process is completed, the body is reduced to a mere empty shell, having only the outward semblance of the departed individual. How long a body will remain unchanged we cannot say. The process has only been employed for a few years- since the war (Civil War) commenced we believe- so that time sufficient has not elapsed to test the indestructibility of bodies thus prepared.

FACT....Born Nov. 23, 1880, in Kansas, he has since lived in Buck Prairie, Little Brick Bottoms, Pin Hook, Parker, Montpelier, and Eaton Rapids. Herb is 5 ft. and 1/4 in. tall, weight 165 lbs., and confines his dark brown hair under a 7 1/8 inch hat. Also, actuated by the impulse given him in the Junior Public play, remained a bachelor the rest of his days. *FACT*.... Fred D. Brainerd, the hero of our class, was born in this city in 1880. He has seen quite a large part of the U.S., having lived in Kansas and having traveled with Co. B. of the 32nd regiment through the southern states to Tampa for a 6 months' drill. Fred is well built for a foot-ball player, being 70 inches tall and weighing about 160 lbs. He aspires to the rank of an electrical engineer on one of our large men of war.

Edith Spaulding, PROPHECY....even before graduating, had shown such a liking for poetry, that publishers had already begun to look anxiously for the stray bits of her poetry she often tendered them. After graduating, however, her poetical works grew in volume and in time it was only the best and highest grade magazines that could secure her works. FACT.... If I could describe our poet as she should be described, I would think my part well done. She has grown only to the height of 5 ft. during the last 16 yrs. but she weighs 118 lbs. Edyth Spaulding is a very bright student and expects to pursue a course in music after graduating. Perhaps she wished to compose music to her verses. <u>Jennie Taylor</u>, *PROPHECY*....after graduating, entered the coolkng department of the State Agricultural College and came back the proud possessor of all the secrets of the culinary department. *FACT*.... Just sweet 16, Jennie Ethel Taylor was born in Hamlin and has, as she

expresses it, never moved. She is 5 ft. 7 in. high, weighs 168 lbs.

Hugh Whaley, *PROPHECY*...upon hearing that Miss Taylor had entered in the Agricultural College, decided that a thorough course of instruction in farming was just what he needed. 

The Sally, who aged only 5 years in a 10-year span, was Sally Maxon, born ca. 1796, CT., died 12 Dec 1878, Roxand, Eaton County, Michigan, wife of Joseph Root, born 23 May 1786, Waterbury, CT. They were the parents of William Root, born 18 Aug 1837, Dover, Cuyahoga County, Ohio, died 11 Jan 1928, Mulliken, Eaton County, Michigan.

Samuel, the Puritan, was Samuel Root, born 20 Nov 1712, Farmington, CT, died 17 May 1778, Waterbury, CT. The incident occurred in church when Parson Leavenworth called on him by name and told him to wake up. He replied, "I am as awake as you are, Parson, and you can mind your own business." Some of the congregation thought this funny, others didn't find it so, and Samuel was arraigned before a grand jury and fined.

Tom, who fell from the tree and was bled by the good doctor, was Thomas Sherman, born 1 Aug 1821, Delaware, Ohio, died 23 Nov 1888, Walton, Eaton County, Michigan. He was trying to shake a coon out of a tree when the limb he was on broke.
