

The mayor of New York called in a hundred prominent citizens to discuss 'graft' with him. A

"These 100 met and adjourned without adopting any resolution to either halt or increase it. It seemed everybody was satisfied as it is." September 14, 1930.

Prof. O. Hosford, for eight years Superintendent of Public Instruction in this State, has general supervision of the Normal Department, and in lectures upon the Theory and Practice of Teaching, will give the pupils the benefit of his extended experience and wisdom. He will also lecture upon School Organization and Government, and upon the School Systems of different countries.

Other members of the Faculty will give occasional lectures on subjects belonging to their departments.

The English Course of two years, above defined, is designed to prepare teachers for the Common Schools, and those who thoroughly complete the course will receive a Normal Certificate of recommendation for this grade of schools.

Candidates for admission to this course will be examined in Orthography, Geography, Grammar to Syntax, and Arithmetic to Percentage.

All students in this Department are required to attend weekly exercises in the Bible, Composition, Declamation, and Discussion.

Those teachers who wish a more extended course of study in Natural Science, Classics, or Modern Languages, can pursue a prescribed course under the direction of Prof. Hosford, by joining classes in the College Department, and on its completion will receive a Normal Diploma.

PRIZES.

By the generous endowment of a Rhetorical Prize Fund, by Samuel F. Drury, Esq., of Olivet, \$50 is yearly distributed in prizes for excellence in Composition and Oratory, as follows:

Twenty-five dollars at the Drury Prize Exhibition of students of the Classical, Scientific, and Ladies' Departments, at the close of the Spring Term.

Twenty-five dollars at the Drury Prize Declamation of students of the Preparatory Course, at the close of the Spring Term, of which twelve dollars will be given in prizes for the two best essays by ladies.

Drury Prizes for 1876 were awarded as follows:

First Prize to Frank Allen Dean; second Prize to George Norton Ellis and Abner Harris Gerrish.

For excellence in English Composition-

First Prize to Miss Isabella R. Hunt; Second Prize to Miss Josephine M. Jandell.

For excellence in Declamation-

First Prize to Leon Edwin Bell; Second Prize to Edgar Clarence Ellis and Willis Edwards Parsons.

LIBRARY AND READING ROOM.

The College Library contains six thousand volumes of well selected books. In connection with it is a reading room, well supplied with journals of news, politics, science, literature and art. For access to both no additional charge is made. Each student is entitled to take books from the Library, and to retain them two weeks.

George W. Ervay 1845 - 1863 CIVIL WAR LETTERS

Transcribed from Originals now in possession of Betty Moon Melson

It is with many thanks for the combined contribution of Robert Haigh & Ophalia Parish that a copy of these letters have been given to the Eaton County Genealogical Society, with permission to print them here in the "Quest".

INTRODUCTION

George W. Ervay was born in New York State in 1845. In 1860 he lived in Onieda Township, Eaton County, Michigan with his parents, Daniel and Eliza Ervay. The 1860 Census lists George's age as 15. While George was in the service, his family moved to Chester Township near Liza's parents, Daniel and Dorothy Shaver Wise. Daniel Ervay died at Chester in 1883. In 1907, Eliza died in Marshall, Michigan. George's younger brother, Orrin was the father of my maternal grandmother, Florence Ervay Root.

Although little more than 16 when he joined the army in 1861, George was quite able to express himself in writing, whether he was describing his surroundings, narrating an experience or stating his opiions. By his choice of words one can often determine his emotional state which runs the gamut from love to hate, from elation to dispair and from bravado to fear.

He used almost no punctuation and few capitol letters in his writing, instead he generally penned his messages in steady strings of words. I have therefore used my best judgment in adding extra spaces to break the text into sentences for easier reading. Otherwise the text was typed as written with the limitations of my word processor.

Betty Melson lent me the letters in Michigan so that Florence Lembeck and I could have them photocopied. Because the photocopies were painfully hard to read and comprehend it was decided to transcribe them while the originals were still in my possession. I hope your find them interesting.

Second cousin Betty Moon Melson and first cousin Florence Spear Lembeck are great grandchildren of Orrin L. Ervay. Our groups numbers more than seventy people of whom I have knowledge.

Dear Friend I now sit here in camp to write to you to let you know how I get along and how I like to be a soldier. I am well and feel well I have not seen george since I left home but I know where he is I would like to see him but I do not know as I ever shall see him but I hope so that I shall I am a coming home I do not think that the ball ever was or ever will be molded to kill me I like to be a soldier very well. I wrote to father the 28 of September. I do not know it he got it or not if he did not get it I wish you would let them know how I get along I have written three letters home I do not know whether my folks got them or not

but I hope they did

i would not give one cent to come home now but I would give ten cents to get site of a rebel that belongs to the south and more to if I could get site of old jef davis the old devil

Tell all of the boys that I know that I am all write and I hope that they are the same I do not know as it will do any good to ask you to write to me for we are a moving aroynd so that half the letters I think doe not get to us. We have crost the long bridge the 28 at dusk tell the girls or gals that George W. Ervay is coming back within 3 years to mary some of them I do not know if I can write any more you must think of me when you read this nonsense this is from a jackass to a friend I hope from George W. Ervay to John H. Althouse.

Headquarters stocktons Regt halls hill Co. H. November the 26 1861

Dear friends I now sit down to write to you to tell you how I get along and to tell you once more that I am well and that I have hopes of getting home again and that I hav got a little money but not much for I had a little bad luck in my travels I had the luck to loose my knappsack with my shirts and blanket and over coat and every thing that was in it and I had to pay for them and it drawd on my pay vary hard all I got was 5 and 67 cents and I shall want that before I get any more pay

I wish that you had been with mee last Saturday if I ever saw a croud of men I saw it then there was 100 thousand 1000 men there besides the spectators.

I wish that you would write to me as soon as you get this I wish to hear how much provision is there butter is 30 cents bread stuff is high wheat is 81 quarter corn is 75 per bushel apples is 2 for 5 cents onions 9 for 5 cents and if you can I wish that you would write off and tell mee all about the folks in the hood tell me if you got the wheet of jim (?) Or not and wether john has paid you or not and how the folks was in chester when you had from them last

Dear friend I now take my pen in to let you know once more that I am well and I hope that this finds you the same and I think it will ----(?) Tenantes (?) I would like it if you could look in to my tent about the time that wee are eating dinner or supper one will hollar git your darn coat tail out of my coffee an other git your foot off my bread an other there you hav got your hed in my sope git off of my potato wish the devil had you if you can not setin with out gitting in my vittles S E Messer says that if A A Young does not stop a folling with them guns that hee will go to the guard house and that makes them mad I was down to the Mich 4 the other day and I hunted for brad Carmical but I did not finde him I want you to write to me and tell mee wether hee is in 3 or 4 I do not know witch hee is in for it a great deal for to see some one from home from old grand ledge and url hulburt is in the same regment with him dan hulburt is in the 6 regment and Isac Blanchard and george jones all in Co H

I would like to see them and I would if I could get a pass but it is moste to far to get a pass to go there it about 28 miles there and a man can not get a pass to last but 2 days Captain Flagley and Lieutenant Fox Has both of them resined their office and gone home Flagley is at home I think and Fox is in jale in washington when hee left here hee sold his papers that he had to draw his pay from the government and then when the Reg got their pay hee drawed his pay the 2nd time and cheated the government out of it and they caut him and brought him back and they will make the fox hunt his hole this I herd and I have no reason to dout it at all by the way hee used me and I hope it is so any way you spoke of sending me some clothing if you could I can get enough here by paying for them I can draw just when I am a mind to but it is such a job to carry them wee are aloud just so much a year and if wee loose any thing wee hav to pay for it and if wee draw more than our alowance wee hav to pay for it all that I suffer for is good warm gloves I wish it was so that you could send me a pare of mittins with one finger and thumb but I suppose it would be unconvient for to do so being so far form rail rode that you could not write to me and let me know wether silas ever found that the mate to that steer and if he did not want pa to by it of him you said that Miss Althouse had returned but you did not say wether shee sold her house or not write how much she got for it if she sold it the col. Said the other day that hee thought that wee should go back to fourt wain to de fend Mich that is on the detroit river 1 milde from the city no more at present so good by for this time this is from - G W Ervay to father and mother brothers and sister.

Dear friends I now sit down to let you know that I am well and I hope that this will finde you the same I got your letter the 16th of January and I was glad to hear from you and to hear that you was well I was on guard when I got your letter and it stormed vary bad and I got a bad cold and I hav had a bad cold ever since but I am getting over it now and I begin to feel better I learned by your letter that george lewis was dead you said that he died at Washington I wish to know if hee had

enlisted and how john came to let him go John said that hee was a going to enlist I want to know wether hee has or not I want to know wether Jockey Jim trades horses as much as ever yet or not or whether he has got any thing to trade on I am sorry to hear that george jones is dead for I am afraid that fanney will not finde any one to hav her I would like to hear where Dean ela (?) Is and wether ike is -- bout there or not and if he has knocked the socks off of them macens in iona yet or not hee said that hee was agoing to wee hav been out on inspection this morning wee got hail columba from the oficers for not having clean guns and if could bee Cap tevo(?) Wants I would put then all of the little petty officers in the guard house until they would get enough of it wee hav to fall out twice a day with our knapeksacks and every thing on and it is no small job to keep every thing in order it is not a very pleasant thing to bee soldier I tell you that the next time I draw if I can I will send you some money the last time wee got any was the 17 of this month wee only got 10 dollars and I buoght a pair of boots and paid 6 dollars for them and I hav pretty hard times to get it and hard living and I can hardly see every thing that can bee thought of and not by a little some thing for my comfort.

Dear friends I now sit down to let you know that I am well and I hope that this will finde you the same I hav just got home from picket guard and it is so muddy that the devil could not run if it was to save his life the mud is six inches deep it took us from 11 oclock till 5 oclock to walk 6 miles and when wee got home the men was so tierd that they could not hardley stir wee did not see any thing to shoot at but one man and one woman and my pardner says to mee les not shoot them unless they run before they see us they came up within 5 rod of us and they they saw us an turned away I halted them and they did not stop I shot and hit the man through the leg and the woman recieved a ball through the arm and she staded by the man that could not run one of the men on the other poste came and him and mee went to them and wee had to kill the women before wee could take them prisners and wee had a hard time to take them

the man hit mee in the face an made mee a black eye wee draged him by the armes to the poste and our relief came and carried them to the camp today the woman was buried and 4 shots passed over her grave

I tell you when I took holde of the man my hare stood up that is all of the news at presant write as soon I sent you a paper the other day no more at presant

CHARLOTTE GRANGE — NO. 67

Charlotte Grange No. 67, located in Charlotte, was organized September 15, 1873, with the following members: Mr. and Mrs. James Murray, Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Dawson, Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Quantrell, Mr. and Mrs. A. C. Ells, Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Love, Mr. and Mrs. David Long, Mr. and Mrs. Sam Fisher, Mr. and Mrs. J. V. Johnson, Mr. and Mrs. Richard Allen, Chester Smith, L. H. Dunton, M. H. Bacon and J. G. Searles.

After the organization was perfected the Grange continued to grow; while its first great aim was to develop a higher manhood and womanhood yet they believed the producer of a commodity and the purchaser of it should together, have more voice in fixing its price, than he who simply carries it from one to the other, so the Lecture hour began early to be more than entertainment, it was study, reading, discussions on such topics as rotation of crops, the Leguminous Plants, Insects, Horticulture Live Stock and Dairying and Household Management, Practical Agriculture by James, was one study book used

Debates were popular.

For the social part, a society within the Grange was formed and many happy memories can be recalled of Oyster Suppers, Chicken Pie Dinners, Harvest Festivals, Fairs, exchange of visits with nearby Granges and adjoining counties. It was a great event when the organ was purchased from the funds made from the chicken dinners with a charge of first five then later ten per person.

A strong Fraternity existed. A number of times sickness, fire and cyclone came in the homes and groups would go take care of a crop or

clean up the debris as occasion demanded.

Charlotte Grange devoted much time to ritualism and believed firmly that its teachings should elevate and refine. Many times degree teams have gone to other Granges to exemplify the work and several times at State Grange; the Juvenile degree was also given at State Grange. In a community way many projects have been carried on one outstanding event was a play put on at the Opera House from which a large sum was realized and given for relief work during the war. An Extension Course of Domestic Economics was held with 230 ladies in attendance, 80 schoolgirls. This was the first one held away from the College. The first boys and girls Club work in Eaton County was organized in Charlotte Grange Hall by Mrs. Fred Curtiss, they were Mother and Daughter Canning club. Sewing club and Corn club.

ter Canning club, Sewing club and Corn club.

The hall was also used for sewing for the Red Cross during the war and the Woman's Work Committee now the Home Economics Committee carried on in all lines of work. The membership was 360 and each year one meeting was given especially for the young peoples entertainment;

both banquet and program were of worth.

For a number of years the Grange had charge of the dancing Hall at

the Fair the proceeds to get toward a building fund.

It celebrated its fifty anniversary and went forward to greater usefulness. The record for length of membership goes to Bernice Murray Curtiss who took in first degree March 24, 1886, and has been an active member since.

Its present membership is 98. Eleven are Silver Star members.
Its officers for 1935 are: Master, Charles Creits; Overseer, Leo. Flanders; Lecturer, Belle Creits; Steward, George Dawson; Ass't. Steward,

Luther Woodell; Treasurer, Bert Young; Secretary, Eunice Dawson; Gate Keeper, Wm. Huber; Ceres, Ruth Sloan; Pomona, Irene Flanders; Flora, Martha Sloan; Ladies Ass't. Steward, Mrs. Luther Woodell.

They were installed by Paul Vahs at its last October meeting.

Its 1935 Committees are: Executive Com., F. O. Johnson, H. V. Peter, Wilbur Martin; Finance Com., W. L. Huber, Ruth Sloan, Luther Woodell; Legislative Com., F. C. Curtiss, W. L. Huber, W. Martin, W. H. Cooley; Home Economics Com., Bernice Curtiss, Mildred Bolock, Dora Stockwell;

Charity Com., Mamie Young, Effie Cooley, Myra Bell.

All Committees will work on plans suggested by National and State Granges adapting to local conditions as needs arise. The Grange has had a large part in moulding legislation directly affecting agriculture. It has always stood for education. In 1917 the Grange was the only lobby for present Smith-Hughes State and Federal and for Rural schools; In 1878 it began urging our Michigan State College to put in a Woman's division to teach home-making. The Grange led the movement for rural free delivery of mail and worked steadily for this measure until the system was finally established on a small scale by Congress in 1896. Parcel Post was advocated and fought for by the Grange. Temperance has always been fostered and the Grange has consistently favored arbitration as a means of settling international disputes.

The Home Economics Committee continues in 1935 their program of improvement of Farms and Farm Homes, the improvement of Grange property and Halls and the improvement of Rural Community life. A Baking Contest in cooperation with the Michigan Farmers will be

sponsored, and a Flower Show held in the fall.

The Juvenile Grange is encouraged and fostered. It trains leadership, interests the young in rural affairs, teaches business methods, helps the child, benefits the community and strengthens the grange.


