

CIVIL WAR LETTERS

Transcribed from Originals now in possession of
Betty Moon Melson

It is with many thanks for the combined contribution of Robert Haigh & Ophalia Parish that a copy of these letters have been given to the Eaton County Genealogical Society, with permission to print them here in the "Quest".

INTRODUCTION

George W. Ervay was born in New York State in 1845. In 1860 he lived in Onieda Township, Eaton County, Michigan with his parents, Daniel and Eliza Ervay. The 1860 Census lists George's age as 15. While George was in the service, his family moved to Chester Township near Liza's parents, Daniel and Dorothy Shaver Wise. Daniel Ervay died at Chester in 1883. In 1907, Eliza died in Marshall, Michigan. George's younger brother, Orrin was the father of my maternal grandmother, Florence Ervay Root.

Although little more than 16 when he joined the army in 1861, George was quite able to express himself in writing, whether he was describing his surroundings, narrating an experience or stating his opinions. By his choice of words one can often determine his emotional state which runs the gamut from love to hate, from elation to despair and from bravado to fear.

He used almost no punctuation and few capital letters in his writing, instead he generally penned his messages in steady strings of words. I have therefore used my best judgment in adding extra spaces to break the text into sentences for easier reading. Otherwise the text was typed as written with the limitations of my word processor.

Betty Melson lent me the letters in Michigan so that Florence Lembeck and I could have them photocopied. Because the photocopies were painfully hard to read and comprehend it was decided to transcribe them while the originals were still in my possession. I hope you find them interesting.

Second cousin Betty Moon Melson and first cousin Florence Spear Lembeck are great grandchildren of Orrin L. Ervay. Our groups numbers more than seventy people of whom I have knowledge.

Washington
September 23, 1862

Dear friends and

Parents i now sit down to let you know that i am well and in good spirets and Mister Lincon says that he is a going to have us all to home to eat dinner next newyears i like to be a soldier first rate i am a setting on the ground to write this letter i am all write i have had the tifoied feaver and i was vary sick for two weeks but had A good dockter and a good nurse and nits i was Crasey as a loon but i am all write now we hav not had any pay yet but we are a going to hav some to morrow and then we will hav a little better times my first lieut went acrost the river yestady and he seen a lot of the rebels and he said that they ware dirty and ragged and half starved at that we have got about 20 000 encamped on meridian hill and it is funn to see them on drill on the ground i like to drill with them

I wish you not to let any one reads this part of the letter george w Charter if the St Johns Co can get a holt of him he will hav to be Shot but do for my Sake dont let anyone read this letter he is in the 6 regiment and the captain is after him you may read any of it to any one that you pleas but this be twene the dots

I wish you all good luck father and mother brothers and sister i am a going to write oftncr to you than i hav i am a getting tiard of sitting on the ground to write

Dear parents it is with pleasure that i set down to answer your letter which i hav just recived i was glad to hear from you and hear that you was all well i am vary thankful for the envelope and paper you sent to me it came vary good for i hav non at presant i am well as useyel except my leg is not quite well yet you spoke of brad carmichal i hav not seen him since the bull run fight i saw him the day before the fight and he was all wright then i do not know where they are now if i can finde out where they are i will go and see about him and let you know i suppose that you hav heard that his Genl wa s killed a better Gen never lived his name was Gen-l Carney hee had but one arm the rebs called him the one armed devil and they said if they ever caut him that they would hang him but the poor man was shot

Colnel broad head of the first Mich cavelry was killed through two of our great generals Pope and Mc dowel

I can write no more this time for it is getting dark and i hav no candle\
give my respects to friends brothers and sister and parents

Pleas tell Sile i say hee is a Coward

Oct the 13 1862

Camp near antetam Creek MD

Dear parents I once more sit down to let you know that i hav not forgotten you quite i am well and i hope that htis will finde you the same my leg has got well so that i do duty again the talk in camp is that Sturarts cavelery has broke through the lines and gon in to penselua and are comming back down this way and wee are ordered to bee ready at any moment for them they will have a nice time if they come

I sent you my likeness you didnn't say any thing about it in your last letter i should lie to hear about it whether you got it or not this antetam creek empties in to the potomac river about one mile from here our brigade is on detached duty from the division toprotect a mill and thr front lines so that it brings us on picket about every three days and wee hav a nice time our picket line is on the heal path between the river and canal

for a spell the rebs was on the oposit side of the river but for the last two or three times they are not to be seen the river here is about two thirds as wide as the grand river at the ledge our pickets and the rebs could talk to gaher if it had of been aloud there would have been some fun but it is not aloud on neither side to fire upon pickets guard

I suppose that jim docksey is at home by this time he was getting his discharge the last time i saw him that was at alexandria

no more at the presant we hav not got our pay yet write as soon as you get this

Camp near falthoth Va

Dear parents it is with pleasure that I sit down to ansere your kind letter that I recived A week ago but I had no time to ansere your letter before wee hav been on the move Tuesday we went on picket and staid there till wensday night Thursday morning wee started for fredricksburg and was moving around there tillyesterday wee came back to our old camp my Regt has had an other engatement with the rebs our victory was A defeat

the city of Fredricks burg is as large as lansing and there is not a house in it but what there is two or three canon ball holes through it and the town is ridled from one end to the other

you can think for your self there was about 75 thousand troops in it and they don what they was a mind to and took what they liked there was as much as two thousand barrels of flower in the place and it was all took by the soldiers you better believe the pancakes flew every man was baking wheat pancakes to eat I had all I could stuff I shall have to give up coming

home I think for the dock says that hee shall detail mee to wait on the sick and wounded in the hospitle but they can not make me take a gun yet anyway

I hav got plenty of paper and stamps but envelopes I hav non we hav not had any pay yet nor I do not see any signs yet

no more at presant write as often as you can and i will do the same

Dear parents it is with pleasure I sit down to anser you kind litter which I received the 5th of Jan I was glad to hear that you was all well I was glad to hear that you had heard from James and that he had sent you some money i shall write to James this afternoon I saw lin blanchard yesterday tell his folks that he is well and looks first rate and makes a good looking soldier I send my best respects to the folks in Onida I wish to know how much there is cleared on fathers farm and what kind of house there is on it i do not know how father has a going to get along without a team tell me how he is to pay for the land and how long payments I wish to now how many head of cattle and how many sheep and hogs you hav got and let me know whether them steers are broke or not if they are not broke father had brake them so to hav them to draw his wood with I can not think of any more to write at present I am on duty again I am on guard today.

I shall write to James this afternoon no more for this time

Dear parents it is with pleasure I sit down to answer your kind letter of the 5th. I was glad to hear that you was well and yet sorry to hear that Marium was sick I hope that she will recover I am well as usual and I hope that this litter will finde you the same I am thankful for the envelope that you sent me wee hav got marching orders wee was to start to-day but it is counter manded but I do not know what moment wee shall start nor do I know where wee shall go to some say that wee are going to DC but some say that wee are going to tenn it is hard telling but I know that we are A going on a long jurney for all of the govermint traines is turned over to the 8th Army Corps all so is all of the beel cattle I think that wee shall embark some where but I do not know. i hav no pay yet I hear that we are not going to get any pay till June if they do it will come in a lump

I hav three rings that I mad of laural root which I shall send home one is for Oren and one for Norman and one for Marium the small one is not A very good one for it would not color

I do not know as there is any more to write at present bee shure and let me know the condishion of fathers land and whether there is any house on it or not no more at present write soon good by

Dear parents It is with pleasure that I sit down to answer your letter which I hav just recieved and I was much pleased to hear from you and to hear that you was well & to hear that you had recieved the rings that I sent to the boys and marium but there is something that I am more ancious to hear from that is the money that I sent you it was thirty dollars I am thinking that as you have moved that you will not get it with out some trouble of going to the ledge

I sent it in A letter for there was no express office nearer than Aqua crick 38 miles and I could not get A pass to go down on the cars wee did march but was glad to get back to our old camp again for the Storm came on so that wee could not get our canons along and the men had to turn to and make cordoroy road so that wee could get back to our old camp the Soldiers made A mud man and put it up and then put up a Sine and on it said Gen Burnside stuck in the mud they Said that hee has not got out yet and so Gen Hooker is in comand of the army

I will send you A paper and you can judg something of how it was by the looks of the picture and the title is fruitless atempt of the army of the Potomac you must excuse my wrighting for I am in a hurry for it is now after taps and my light should bee out I do not think that there is any signes of our moving wright away wee may move camp for the wood is getting Scarce where wee are now

Mother I shall hav to tell you A little anactdote that my tent mate heard one day while washing his clothers ner the railroad there was three sitizens walking down the railroad and one says the others I will tell you how I escaped the draft and as hee said that hee was interuped by two proves guard which heard them and for fun the guard took them up to Colonel Stockton now acting Brigadier Gen and told him what they said and hee put them in the guard house and kept them on bread and water for four days and then let them go telling them if he cout them back there hee would tarr and feather them

Dear parents it is with pleasure that I sit down to answer your kind letter which I recieved last knight and I was much pleased to hear from you to hear that you are well

And I was vary glad to hear that you had recieved the money that I sent you. You wanted to know what I wanted done with it I want father to use it to the best advantage to himself. I think that it would bee A good plan to pay it on the place I do not want any Claim on the place

for if I ever get clear of the army alive and able bodied I do not intend to trouble Eaton Co much for I think that there is better places in the world than Eaton Co but I think that I shall bee clear of the war soon for wee white soldiers are going to bee relieved by the nigers

last pay day the officers had to pay taxes on the nigers that are in the army and around washington and it is in the New York herrild that every private Soldier will hav to forfit fifteen percent next pay day that will be three & 1/2 dollars every two monts for the support of the counter bands some say that if they take any money out of their pay that they will disert others say that they will mutenize and I think that if they ever take any of my pay that I shall prefer the former for if A man staves here it is death A if he falls out when they are going into the fight it is instent death and if you disert it is Shure death So I should prefer living honabfle and dying honabrle for as to live in danger of my life as long as I hav and been in as many battles as I hav then to disert is more than I shall do I shal write to sile waldo and tell him that I was captain of that guard that traided the nigers for sheep I hav never heard of any such a thing but there is not a soldier in the army but would give three nigers for one sheep

I shall send you A paper no more at present write soon George W Ervay

I will send you a riddle for to solv and want you to send me the answer next time that you write it is this

Dear Parents it is with pleasure that I sit down to answer the (letter) that Oren wrote to me I was glad to hear from you and hear that you was well I am well at presant withe the excption of A bad head ake I was much pleased with the letter that oren wrote to me but I could not make out what hee ment about the old jeff in trying to shade these letters I do not make much headway so I will stop it yesterday the Colonel turned out the men and hee laid a plan for A fort and they went to work and put up A snow fort and Colonel said that to day hee would put the wright wing of the Regt in the fort and the left wing had got to take it from them hee says the left wing is enough for the wright wing any time at snow balling any time and he thinks that wee can drive them out of a snow fort with snow balls the fort was four foot and 8 inches high and four foot wall but last night it began to rain and this morning there was the fort but no snow around it for to snow ball with so the battle of snow is played out there is no more at the presant so I bid you good by

Mary if I will send you my likeness will you send me yours if you will you will oblige mee by wrighting to me and let me know you can drop a line and put in some of mothers letters As I suppose that you have her for A neighbor by this time I think that I have written about foolishness enough you must excuse all bad wrighting and poor spelling give my best respects to all inquiring friends if any there bee do not faile to write to me Mary....

Dear parents it is with pleasure that I sit down to answer your kind letter which I recieved this evening and was muched pleased to hear that you was well I am well but some tired for I have just come off picket wee started on picket last wesday and got back this after noon and we had A pretty hard time of it for wee was in a larg plantation and A hill and the cold raw wind blew pretty hard we expect to get our pay again soon when the first day of march came around the government owed us four monts pay I am in hopes that they will pay us soon for I like to keep pretty high square with the uncle Sam I was glad to hear that you had recieved the song that I sent you I you get any new songs send them to me you knowed one when I came away that I would like to hav Father I hav quit Chewing Tobacco I left off the 18th of Febuary but I hav to smoke a little for to keep the hanker of Chewing off whether you believe it or not from the time I got my pay at Harrison's Landing up to the time I got my pay here in this camp it cost me 11 dollars and 25 cts for Tobacco. I got so I chewed it up and swalod more than half that I put in my

mouth and I made up my minde that the money that I would spend for tobaco would do you more good than it did for mee I got A letter to day from Silas Waldo hee said that the folks was all well in that place I do not know as there is any more news to write this time give my best respects to Silas & Sarah and also to aunt polly I shall hav to get to bead for it is getting late and it is my turn to go on guard to morrow you must excuse poor wrighting for my pen is A poor one.

I will send you two riddles

First. Why is a counter band never dead broke.

Seckond. I hav got A table that I eat off of that I hav carried since I came in the war guess what kind of a table it is if I ever come home I shall bring it home with me and I would not take five hundred for it Send me the answer to these when you write no more

Dear parents it is with pleasure that I sit down to write you A few lines once more to inform you that I am well and I hope you all the same I recieved A letter from you the 14th and was much pleased to hear that you was well I got A letter from Sile Waldo the same day the day that I recieved your letter I came off of -----ket wee had a first rate time----- wee went out the 11th ----- the 14th the is ----- hour sharp shooters ----- hee was shot ----- right arm but not deep so hee will get over it in three or four weeks Wee are having fine times at present there is no signes o f marching now as I know of I would like to have you get your likeness taken and send them to me I do not know as there is any news to write I was over and saw Lin Blanchard yesterday. hee told me that edwin niHan had gone home the first capt that lin had was A meen Scoundral and he got the ill will of the Co so that hee had to resine----- -and go home and Ed got his -----and said that if hee -----acrost the Capt tha----- ----- a going to thra-----

Ed pounced on to him and the Captain gave him an aufel thrashing the most that is going on here is d ball playing the boys hav fine times now The 17th the sharp shooters were on picket down by the Rapahanac and the reb pickets were on the other side and they were talking all the time they told hour men that the war would be settled by the first of July there hav chosen delagetes for peace and the reb pickets tryed to throw their papers----- but the current was so strong -----that it would not flot ----- has been snowing to ----- falls it is A ----- spring

in fact I do not know as it makes much diferance for the people can not rais any thing for there is not

A rail (?) with in Seven miles of here

Clinton Jones

Clinton, son of **Joseph** and **Cornelia Jones** passed away at his home in Chester, Sunday, February 15, 1942 at the age of 69 years, 9 months.

He was born in Watertown township, Clinton county, Michigan, May 15, 1872. On December 4, 1896, he was united in marriage to **Eva Shirts**. To this union were born four children, 2 sons and 2 daughters, **Ora Jones**, of Springport, **Grace Miller** of Mulliken, **Lena Noelp** of Lansing and **Thomas Jones** of LaPorte, Indiana.

Mr. Jones has lived in this vicinity for the past 36 years. He was a much respected citizen and neighbor.

Besides the widow and four children he is survived by one brother, **Stanton Jones**, of DeWitt, three sisters, **Mrs. Mary Parks** and **Mrs. Ida Keck** of DeWitt and **Mrs. Grace Stuart** of Lansing and nine grandchildren.

The funeral services were held at the **Myron E. Pray** funeral home in Charlotte, Tuesday, February 17, 1942 at two o'clock in the afternoon. **Rev. Leon W. Manning** of the Methodist church officiated and interment was made at the cemetery at DeWitt.

Dr. R.C. Rolls

Dr. R.C. Rolls, 69, died at the **Ruth Love** home Sunday after a short illness. Funeral Services were conducted from

the **Pettit and Rice** Funeral home Tuesday afternoon at two o'clock, the **Rev. Della Post** of Sunfield officiating. Burial in Rose Hill cemetery.

Dr. Rolls came to Eaton Rapids forty years ago and began practicing as a veterinary which profession he has continued. He was found on the floor in his home Saturday in an unconscious condition and taken to the **Ruth Love** home, it is reported. He had been in poor health for some time.

He is survived by one son, **Leroy** of Sunfield; one sister **Mrs. Rosella Heipel** and one brother **Buell Rolls** of Ontario.

Tom Garvey Dies in Hospital Wednesday

Thomas Garvey, 89 years old, a resident of Eaton township for many years, died Wednesday afternoon in a Battle Creek hospital where he had been a patient since February 26. He was born in New York state December 9, 1862. His wife died several years ago. Surviving are two nieces, **Mrs. James Moore** of Charlotte and **Hazel Bibbins** of Ypsilanti; six nephews, **Dec** and **Lloyd Garvey** of Eaton township, **Earl** and **William Garvey**, **Charles Garvey** of Lansing, and **Louis Garvey** of Battle Creek, and two sisters-in-law, **Mrs. Vinnie Garvey** of Charlotte and **Mrs. Dave** of Lansing. The body was brought to the **Cheney** funeral home and services will be held at St. Mary's Catholic church Saturday forenoon at ten o'clock, in the charge of **Rev. Father Jerome V. MacEachin**. Burial will be in Maple Hill cemetery.

.Mrs. Grant Kiplinger

May 6, 1862 March 4, 1942

Mrs. Grant Kiplinger was born **Ida M. Crozier**, fourth child of **Irvin** and **Permelia Taylor Crozier** at Phelps, Ontario county, New York.

At the age of seven she came to Michigan with her parents, three brothers and one sister. They settled on the farm in Center Eaton now owned and occupied by her niece and husband, **Mr. and Mrs. Carroll Elliott**.

She lost her mother at the age of eighteen, when all the responsibility of making a home was shifted to her young shoulders. No task was too great and she never faltered under the load. One of her greatest joys was the rearing of her young brother, **Howard**, aged only five. Mr. Crozier resides in Center Eaton and is the only surviving member of their family.

February 3, 1886, she was united in marriage with **Mr. Grant Kiplinger**, who came to Michigan from Ashland, Ohio.

Four children were born to them two having preceded her in death. **Grace May** in 1905 at the age of fourteen and **Carroll Everett** in 1931 at the age of thirty-four. She is survived by the husband, son **Clarence H.** of this city and daughter, **Kittie**, at home. Also two grandsons, **Dale Kiplinger** of West Benton and **Robert** of this city and four great grandchildren.

She was a quiet home-keeping woman, but had a few outside interests, chief among them being her church, which she loved and attended as long as her health would permit. She was also a member of the O.E.S., W.S.J. and the Progressive Birthday club.

Nearly seven years ago, Mrs. Kiplinger was stricken with a fatal

malady which finally overcame all efforts to bring her back her health. Despite her years of affliction she managed to find considerable comfort and hope and faced the eternal dawn with faith and courage.

She entered into rest at three a.m. March 4, 1942. Memorial services were held Friday at 2 p.m. at the **Cheney** funeral home when her pastor, **Rev. Leon Manning**, spoke feelingly of her fine life and the esteem in which she held as a member of his church.

Burial was in the family lot at Maple Hill. Relatives were present from St. Johns, Lansing, Battle Creek, Roseville and Redford.

"Jack" Tennant Dies At Daughter's Home

John St. Clair Tennant, 79 years old, died Monday morning at the home of his daughter, **Mrs. Hazel Milbourn**, in Benton township, where he had resided the last three years. He formerly lived in Charlotte, owning and operating a barber business here. His wife, **Addie**, died September 24, 1936. He was born at Youngstown, Ohio, May 24, 1862, the son of **Arthur D. and Margaret Youngs Tennant**. Besides the daughter, there survive one sister, **Mrs. Margaret Aberham** of Youngstown, O., and two brothers, **Ed** of Youngstown, and **Tom** of Ravenna, Ohio. Funeral services were held at the **Pray** funeral home Thursday afternoon at two o'clock, in charge of **Rev. Leon W. Manning**. Burial was in the Pottersville cemetery.

As briefly noted last week, the funeral of **Mrs. Geo. W. Greist** was held last Sunday afternoon at the residence, 451 south Cochran Ave., **Rev. Dr. Barnes** officiating. The deceased, **Mary McConner**, was born in Salem, Ohio, March 13, 1824, her age at death being 78 years, 9 months and 26 days. In 1840 she moved with her parents to Bedford, Ohio, where she was married to **Geo. W. Greist** Jan 23, 1849, and with husband and little ones came to Michigan in the fall of 1854 settling on a farm in Walton, where she was a ready help in all the good work of building up and developing a new country, both socially and otherwise. In 1889 they retired from active life and bought a

pleasant home in Charlotte where she spent the balance of her days.

Mrs. Greist was a lineal descendent of **Sir Joshua Wright**, a younger branch of the House of Bedford, who came to America in the beginning of the 18th century and developed a landed estate in Maryland. She was the mother of six children, two of whom died in infancy, and two later, **Emerson L.** and **Tully T.**, the former in 1897 and the latter in 1898. Two daughters survive, viz: **Mrs. Estella Krebs**, of this city, and **Mrs. Eva Smith**, of Bellevue, also three stepdaughters: **Marian A. Gruesbeck**, **Maribah O. McLaughlin** and **Esther J. Rachel Richards Hart

The pleasure comes to few of a life of nearly ninety years and all of them a flood of sunshine and of happiness. This brief sums up the life of **Mrs. Rachel Hart** who passed to the higher life at the home of her daughter, **Mrs. Emma Shepherd**, soon after two o'clock the morning of Saturday last, March 28th. Till her final illness came her buoyant spirit maintained its mirthfulness in the home circle and her greatest pleasure was derived when members of the family gathered about her and anecdote, and story and reminiscence were rife. Her mental faculties were unimpaired and her memory of events was a marvel. During her last days she chatted pleasantly of the past and hopefully of the future. She loved her home life, the children who remained to her, the grandchildren and the great grandchildren, but her heart

yearned too for the re-union beyond and with a resignation which was peaceful and bright with hope she obeyed the summons of Him "who doeth all things well."

Rachel Richards was born in Springfield, Ohio, in January 1814, and at that place twenty-three years later, July 6th, 1837, she was united in marriage to **Jesse Hart**. The honeymoon had hardly passed when three young people set out for the wilds of Michigan and in the fall of 1837 reached Walton township and two weeks later Brookfield where a rude hut had been hastily constructed in the depth of the forest, with barely a road cut out and the nearest neighbor four miles distant. There, with them life's activities begun; the solitude of the forest and the howling of wild beasts were the sole companionships which cheered them in the early struggle. On the old farm came in due time better surroundings, 10 children cheered the hearthstone and gave ambition to life's best directed efforts. The companion of those early years and five of the children had preceded her to the life hereafter. The survivors are **Mrs. Hattie Derby**, Eaton Rapids; **Mrs. Jerrie Mikesell**, **Mrs. Emma Shepherd** and **Mrs. M. J. Lamson**, Charlotte, and **Mr. Jesse Hart**, Alpena. Five grandchildren and three great grandchildren and two nieces, **Mrs. J.C. Smith** and **Mrs. Peter McNaughton**, also survive and all were present at the funeral except **Paul Shepherd**, who is in Wyoming.

Funeral Services were held at the residence Monday afternoon at half past two, **Dr. D.F. Barnes** officiating. The choir of the M.E. church thoughtfully selected for the occasion several of the hymns, which were known to be her

favorites, but her especial delight "The Man of Galilee" was sung by her granddaughter, **Miss May Derby**, of Eaton Rapids. Interment was in Maple Hill and there as the verdure of springtime comes loving hands will go laden with incense of sweetest flowers to preserve green the spot which holds so much that in life was near and dear and that in death is of precious memory.

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
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EATON RAPIDS, MICHIGAN

The following has been excerpted from the speech given by Shirley J. Hodges to the Eaton County Genealogical Society, 15 January 1997.

"As indicated my topic for tonight is 'What Our/Your Society can do for You?' If you have any Irish ancestry I am sure that you can understand if I paraphrase my title just a little and call it Our Society: Blessings and Curses. Many of the Irish thought that sometime they go hand in hand. We have to understand sometimes that if we want to have all the benefits of something, then sometimes we have to accept the responsibilities or the Curses that go with it.

There are several reasons why people belong to a group, or why they do not. A clear understanding of potential members' reasons for belonging will allow an organization to structure itself so as to meet those needs. If they don't meet the needs of the membership they will not flourish.

A genealogy society should have a mission statement or clearly state their objects and purposes. For discussion purposes, I will use the MMGS statement for an example.

The objects and purposes are stated as follows:

1. To preserve and make available for genealogical research the records of our ancestors.
2. To encourage and assist the study of family history; to promote the exchange of knowledge; and genealogical records.
3. To cooperate with other societies and to assist the area libraries in expanding and publicizing their genealogical holdings.
4. To publish materials of interest and use to genealogists.

I really recommend that each group examine their mission statement annually and make sure that they are keeping on target. Make sure that what you *thought* was important is *being handled* like it was important. If not, re-evaluate.

There is also a very important role that a society that has an office with a library can provide for people. Lots of us have heard horror stories of people who have worked diligently on their family histories for years only to have them thrown in the trash by their heirs. If you do not have a family member who is interested in your materials and you want to have them preserved and perhaps published at some point make arrangements for them to be given to a genealogical repository. Your materials represent a great deal of time, energy, research and money and they deserve to be **preserved** and **disseminated** as a testament to you and your family, A genealogy society may help you insure that this happens.

The goal of every society should be to have a society worth belonging to.

For a society to survive they must, in my opinion, do the following things:

- Understand and appreciate the structure of the organization. The organization is the important thing. The membership ultimately rules what a society undertakes and ultimately accomplishes. The majority of the membership rules. All members have equal rights and discussions are always encouraged. Officers come and go in a society, but the membership is the core. **Without an active membership you cannot flourish.**
- Keep your long term members active. It doesn't do any good to recruit new members if you can't retain them.
- Energize volunteers. This means fitting the person to the job and the job to the person; take on important projects. You can burn your members out with too many small jobs.
- Make meetings work. Do the necessary business and keep monthly business meetings as short as possible. Eaton Co. is a good example where this is working. By utilizing the board members very effectively it has taken a lot of the trivial day-to-day business matters out of the general meeting arena.
- When considering projects, determine if that activity will enhance the image of the Society. What will be the most helpful approach for the members..... and will the members enjoy doing it. I also encourage evaluating every project and deciding if it truly is for the good of the society. If it is not, we should take a very close look at it. Sometimes we continue doing something out of habit. This may not be all bad but we want to make sure that we are asking people to work on important things and not burning them out on trivial matters.
- Make it easy for the volunteers to accomplish those things that are of value to the society. I think a terrific example of this is the Funeral Home Project that has been implemented by the Eaton County Genealogical Society. We have accomplished more than anyone thought possible simply by allowing members to take the books home and work on them. Volunteers appreciate being able to work at home and their spouses certainly appreciate the fact that we don't expect them to work at the office all the time. Also we find that it is difficult for two people to be working on the computer at one time. By working at home on projects we multiply our efforts greatly. IT IS ALL A MATTER OF TRUST. We trust the volunteers to work carefully with the materials. They trust us because they know that we will appreciate their efforts.

- Appreciate your volunteers.

**As members you have responsibilities also to do the following:**

- Elect leadership who will show **respect, integrity, courtesy, tolerance, compassion, and humility** to each other and to the members of the society.
- As members it is your responsibility to see that the organization is ran in a way that meets the goals of the society. Offer suggestions if you have a "better mousetrap".
- Give your officers support. Sometimes that is the most important thing they get. Believe me, the pay isn't great.

I would recommend that people consider joining a least three genealogical societies.

Join a society in the area you are researching. You hope that this will provide material that will be useful in your own research. Usually societies publish some type of newsletter or quarterly in which you can find information and sometimes have queries published.

Join a society in the area you live. Even if you have no ancestors from the area it can be of great benefit. You gain the opportunity to meet other family historians, to hear speakers at society meetings, and discuss problems with others who may have had similar experience. By volunteering to work on its projects, you can help the society give others the kind of help you hope to receive from your distant society of interest.

And... finally, a national genealogical society. Membership dues in the National Genealogical Society (NGS) are \$40. Membership includes mail use of the society library and a subscription to its quarterly journal, whose carefully researched articles often feature innovative approaches to difficult problems.

Collecting and recording family history is a rewarding pastime, and the hunt is often as much fun as the actual discovery. Never underestimate the value of your genealogy society in this never ending hunt for your ancestors.

Since I opened with an Irish belief, I would like to close with one. There is and Old Irish Proverb that we should pay attention to: "Fear na bo' Fein Faoin a heirbeal." Loosely translated it means, "The cow's owner must get under the tail to push her out of the bog." And we are all in a bog if we can't learn from our own history and work together as those Irish Farmers did so long ago.

Let us all work together to make our Societies the best that they can be for all involved.

## **EDWARD "ED" DANNER: A SLAVE, A SOLDIER, A FREE MAN**

I have been researching my family's roots since 1993. The following story is about the life of Edward "Ed" Danner, my great-great-grandfather. I knew little about him until this year, when I received his Civil War pension file from a relative, who got it from the National Archives in Washington, D.C. This pension file was a genealogical goldmine because it basically told the story of his life. He was known as Edward Bobo in the War. Ed was a Union soldier, but his life was saved by his master's son, a Confederate soldier.

Ed Danner was born into slavery in Union County, South Carolina, in about 1832. He was once the slave of a white planter named Thomas Danner. Ed lived on the Danner farm up until the year of 1860. He was then sold to Dr. William Johnson Bobo, who took him to Panola County, Mississippi, near Como. Shortly after the doctor brought Ed to Mississippi, Ed married Lue Bobo, the mulatto daughter of Clarissa Bobo and the young mother of two sons, Jim (1858) and Mack (1859). They were married on Christmas Day in 1860 on the Bobo Plantation, and they had eight children: Alfred Danner (1863), Alex Danner (1865), Mary Danner Davis (1867), Frances Danner Howard (1869), Laura Danner Reid (1871), Martha Danner Gray (1873), Moseley Danner (1875), and Edward Danner, Jr. (1876). Martha Gray was the mother-in-law of the late great gospel singer, Mahalia Jackson.

Edward Danner and his young wife Lue suffered a brief separation. Shortly before the birth of their first child, Edward Danner left the Bobo Plantation in the summer of 1863, headed for Memphis, Tennessee. Inspired to fight for his freedom, he enlisted in the Union Army on August 13, 1864, at Lagrange, Tennessee. He became a Private in Company I of the 59th Infantry Regiment of the United States Colored Troops. From his service in the Union Army, Edward contracted a troublesome disease called dyspepsia, and he frequently suffered from severe stomach pains and vomiting. A war doctor sometimes excused him from guard duty because of his illness. Despite this illness, Ed continued to fight on for his belief - to end slavery.

On June 10, 1864, Ed participated in the Battle of Brice's Crossroads at Guntown, Mississippi. There he was captured by several Confederate soldiers. Ed's regiment did not know what

had happened to him. The Confederate soldiers were going to kill him, but Ed's young master named Alexander "Alex" Bobo, the son of Dr. William Bobo, rescued him and saved his life. Ed stayed with Alex Bobo briefly in the Confederate Army. Due to his illness and Alex Bobo becoming wounded, they both came home to Panola County, Mississippi. Ed later named his second son after him.

Edward Danner later died a free man on September 15, 1876, at the age of 44. He lost his battle with dyspepsia, which he had contracted in the war. His wife, Luc Danner, was 7 months pregnant with their last child. In honor of him, she named the healthy baby boy after him who became known in the family as Eddie. Because of the great love she had for her brave husband, Lue made a mark in her bible every 15th day of September after Ed's death, and she never remarried. I am the son of Ed's great-granddaughter who was born on September 15th.

In 1918, after several attempts, Lue Danner finally received a pension. This was a great help to her, who for many years had to depend on her own daily labor to help support her and her ten children. Lue Danner died on July 5, 1921, at her home near Como, Mississippi. She was 79 years old. Lue was the mother of 10, the grandmother of over 50, and the great-grandmother to many. She also had many sisters and brothers: Palayna Boyd (184?), Ben Bobo (1844), Frank Bobo (1846), Sally Vaughn (1848), Caroline Bobo (1851), Hezekiah Bobo (1852), William Bobo (1854), Alice Bobo (1857), Lucy Bobo (1860), George Bobo (1862), Richard Bobo (1863), Annie Holloway (1865), Georgia Bobo (1867), and Charles Bobo (1869).
