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Digging Up Ghosts

A few trips to the local library and to the Eaton County Genealogy Society was all it took to find the ghost in the house my son rents.

As the house had just been completely stripped down to the studs and remodeled, except for the original beams in the attic that still have bark on them; the ghost was unhappy. My son and daughter-in-law were complaining that their bedroom door kept shutting by itself while they were downstairs watching T.V. or eating. I noted that perhaps it was the cat, Max. They claimed Max was with them each time the door closed and the windows were not opened either. Well, this really piped my curiosity. They wanted a research done on the house anyway, so I started out to the library with notebook in hand.

Since this house is in the city of Charlotte, I figured the first step would be to look in the City Directories. I also checked the city plat maps. This is what I found:

1873 - House is on city plat map for that year.

- 1908/09 City Directory Clarissa Robb lives there (husband Marvin deceased)
- 1940 Emily B. Robb owns house
- 1944 Emily willed the house to the Salvation Army (question: When did Salvation Army sell it?)
- 1947 Ruby Nicholls lives in house
- 1962 Elaine Rowan & Evelyn Otto live in house
- 1964 Wendell Ripley lives in house
- 1972 Ella Laudenslager lives in house
- 1973 Kendal Wellman owns house through 1990's
- 1996 David Huva rents house to my son.

Well, that was not enough information to satisfy this researcher, I looked in the World Book and found Salvation Army, World-wide Christian religious body with semi-military structure. Provides food, shelter, and clothing to the needy, and administers to the spirit by bringing religion to many whom churches never reach. Started in the U.S. in 1880.

In order to find if the land was owned prior to 1873, when we know there was a house on the property, I searched in the land records at the Eaton County Courthouse.

An Alvan Shaw purchased said piece of land on May 12, 1852 from the State of Michigan. (Liber 13, page 237). It also mentioned that this land was part of the Primary School Land. The copy was very hard to read, however, for a certain sum which looked like \$50 dollars, Marvin W. Robb of Eaton County, Michigan was assigned transfer of the land from Alvan Shaw. It remains unknown

yet as to when the house was built on the property.

After checking both marriage and death records on film in the Genealogy Room, I found

TWO GHOSTS, not one. Two people died in the house, one Emily Blinn Robb who died November 21, 1941 at the age of 80 (see Obit) and Miss Cynthia Green passed away in the same house at the age of 85 years. The obit I found for Miss Green wasn't dated.

This is only the beginning of researching the ROBB family, but could turn out to be a very interesting story with two ghosts haunting their old homestead.

Michigan County Clerks Online

The 1994 Michigan County Clerks Genealogy Directory is "online" courtesy of the State Archives of Michigan. It was compiled and printed by the Calhoun County Clerk's Office with the encouragement of Michigan County Clerks Association and the Michigan Genealogical Council.

It is organized by county. The following information is provided about each of the 83 offices: address, phone and FAX number, genealogy research hours, identification requirements for use of records, costs of such as whether the records are microfilmed or whether there is seating capacity for genealogists, and a list of available records and inclusive dates of the records.

The original directory was based on a survey of offices in 1993, but it will be updated periodically. Any changes should be brought to the attention of the State Archives of Michigan at the following address:

The State of Franklin

Between 1784 and 1788, some records show citizens from the state of Franklin, NOT Tennessee. Known today as the "lost State," it was about to become our 14th state and a fact in the history of the United States. Davy Crockett was a Franklinite, born in 1796, and is one of the most notable individuals to claim this fact.

This state was named for Benjamin Franklin, mostly to solicit his support. It had first been named Frankland. It did exist from 1784 to 1788 and had a governor, legislature and a court system.

The state of Franklin broke away from North Carolina and thus lacked their support for statehood. Approval by the U.S. Congress was denied by one vote. In 1789, North Caroline finally ceded its lands to the United States. In 1796 Tennessee became the 16th state and included the Franklin Territory that is now 14 counties in northeast Tennessee.

New York Hints

If you have lost an ancestor in New York around 1800, check tax records. Within recent years, the State Achieves in Albany, NY has processed for research tax records that cover much of the state for the years 1799-1804. Cataloged as B 0950-85, Tax Assessment Roles of Real Estate and Personal Estates 1799-1804

the records are arranged by county, year and town (not alphabetically). The lists were made by county treasurers and filed with the State Comptroller's Office. There are some gaps in the records--meaning that all counties are not covered for every year. The State Archives and Records Administration is on the 11th floor of the Cultural Education Center, Empire State Plaza, Albany, NY 12230. Inquiries may be mad regarding availability of information on a particular county.

10,000 "Lost Military Records" Have Not Been Found

Clifford G. Ansler, Jr. Assistant Director for Medical Records of the national Personnel Records Center in St. Louis, has put out a call for assistance in setting the record straight with respect to the reported "lost" military records being found. The Records Center very much regrets the confusion and misunderstandings that have occurred as a result of these reports. The fire which destroyed so many military records on 12 July 1973 destroyed the major portion of records of army military personnel for the period 1912 through 1959, and there were no duplicates.

Not Just For The Beginning Genealogist Continued

Many veterans had filed claims with the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) before 1973, with the result that their original medical records were loaned to the VA. Therefore, these records were not destroyed by fire. If the records were in the Records Center on 12 July 1973, and stored in the area where the fire occurred, it is probably that they were destroyed.

The Records Center can verify hospitalization and some types of outpatient treatment from other record sources, however the medical records cannot be reconstructed from these sources.

The Records Center has been flooded with requests as a result of these reportings, and they have asked for help in advising the public.

Fire Warning For All Genealogists

There is a potential firebomb in your house! Fire marshals across the country have been alerted that between 1889 and the mid 1950's all film contained nitric acid. This means ALL FILM - negatives, slides, home movies. With age, this film will self-combust, especially in attics and basements.

This is a very real danger, but there are some things you can do. You can have each piece of film tested - or test it yourself using a special pen from an archival products company. Your best option with old film is to have new copies made on modern film. The old film should be destroyed - very carefully because nitric acid fumes are toxic.

The 1890 census we miss so much was destroyed by such old flammable film. The National Archives now stores its old film in steel drums immersed in water.

"Where'd I Get This Face?"

When I thirteen in 1971, I remember studying my face, intensely disliking the face in the mirror, with its high forehead, wide spaces between the eyes and eyebrows, pale, almost non-existent eyebrows and eyelashes, and thin upper lip paired with a full, pouty lower lip. It was not a face that would conform to the fashion of the day -- long straight hair, parted in the middle, wearing gold wire-rimmed granny glasses, and I didn't want to be different from "everyone else."

Desperately wanting to conform to the image of what was "cool," I grew out my bangs and ordered granny glasses, in spite of gentle admonishment from my mother who said I'd look prettier if I wore bangs and plastic framed glasses. I proceeded with my plans to look like everyone else, but really didn't like the results.

No longer needing reading glasses, two or three years later, I decided to wear bangs again, which greatly improved my appearance. For the first time in years, I began to like the way I looked. I grew comfortable with myself and decided I would never again try to look like "everyone else."

After graduating from high school, I worked for the State of Michigan at the Secondary Complex in Lansing. One morning during coffee break in the cafeteria, a woman I didn't know came up to my table, looked me over, and said, "I know who you are. You are a Myers." Well, I wasn't a Myers, but my mother was. This woman asked me my name and who my parents were. After a few more questions, she told me she was my mother's aunt, a half sister of mom's deceased father. In a room full of people, she knew I was her relative, because of my face.

Over the next few years, I became interested in genealogy and began asking questions about Mom's and Dad's families. My husband eventually photographed hundreds of pictures that belonged to relatives, and I began to see that I didn't look like any one person, I was a combination of many people.

My parents both had brown hair and mine was blonde, although it darkened considerably as I grew older. Dad's mother and paternal aunts had dark blonde hair, as did many of Mom's relatives.

Mom had light green eyes and Dad light brown, while mine are a pale, non-descript blue. At times I can't tell what color they are--sometimes light gray, sometimes chambray blue, and other times nearly teal, depending on the color of my clothing. I've grown to like the color of my eyes and it may be wishful thinking, but I thank they most resemble Dad's mother, Maude Sirrine Stadel, whose light gray eyes were kind and loving, but also kept a sharp watch on everything. Unfortunately , they also look like her mother's. Grandma's mother, called "Grandma Tom," my dad once said "could stare a hole through a brick wall."

The shape of my lips--a thin upper lip and full lower lip--also comes from "Grandma Tom," who could be a very intimidating, controlling person. She was also extremely competitive and once threw a fit of rage when her nine-yeard old great-grandson beat her in cards. I like to think that the only trait of hers I received is her lips.

"WHERE'D I GET THIS FACE?" continued

Dad and several members of his immediate family have large, unbecoming noses. An acquaintance once told me that I look just like my dad's brother, Dean Stadel, who has a large hooter. I haven't quite forgiven her for that, and I remain convinced that my nose comes from my mother's side of the family.

Pictures of Mariah and Inez myers, sisters of my great-grandfatehr, Glenn Myers, reveal the same wide space between my eyes and eyebrows, the same round eyes and heavy eyelids, as well as the same eyebrow arch. Those traits, and the nondescript, pale lashes and eyebrows, definitely come from the Myers side, along with my high forehead, which looked so dreadful without bangs.

As a child, I was repulsed and yet fascinated by the flesh-colored facial bumps on my dad, his brothers and sisters, and my grandma. They had bumps on various parts of their faces, including their noses. I always swore that if anything like that grew on my face 1's immediately have it removed. Well, I've had a small bump on my left temple for some time now, and it doesn't bother me a bit. In fact, I kind of like it.

What Do Funeral Records Tell?

One of our members has been using the net for obtaining information regarding funeral home records. Many of the responders gave different answers to the same question, and that is reasonable as all funeral home records are not the same. Even the same funeral home will report different information for different years, depending on their log book.

The Eaton County Genealogical Society, has found this to be very true. While working in conjunction with a local funeral home we found it interesting, that most of the time the burial site is left blank and only the cemetery is mentioned. The cemetery listed might just say Maple Hill and nothing more. Is this then the Maple Hill in Charlotte? Some books will show occupation, place of death, cause of death, religion, parents, while others won't. It just depends on the book being used, and the person filling it out.

In the near future, our Society hopes to have indexes for local funeral homes, so that your search in the Eaton County area, will be a little easier. Then when you find a missing person you will be able to zero in on an area. This will be most helpful for missing persons that have no headstones.

While looking for a relative I was appalled to find cemetery records in such a sad state of affairs, even the head stones are in need of attention. I've been tempted to inquire about a little fix up in a particular cemetery in Eaton County. Of course vandals have done their work also.

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

Griffith Takes Property

Church Closes At Charlesworth

Charlesworth United Methodist church, a going concern since 1874, is closing its doors this week for the last time as a house of God. The few members still attending the white clapboard country church are transferring their membership to Griffith church or to other nearby churches. Griffith members have already voted to accept the Charlesworth church property and make disposition of it. The closing of Charlesworth Methodist follows closely the merger and closing of Grace church on Columbia Rd. and M-99.

The demise of country churches is a phenomenon marking the end of an era. It was an era of neighborhood communication and neighborly social affairs, which was also cemented, until recent years, by neighborhood country schools.

Charlesworth church was built in 1874 by the German Evangelical Society. Prior to that meetings were held in the schoolhouse. The first church was built on land located northeast of the present site. In 1888 the German group dissolved, but the pulpit in use today was built by one of their members.

In 1890 the Methodist took over the church and in 1896 moved the church to its present location on land donated by Mark Benson. It was officially named "Methodist Episcopal Church of Hamlin Township, Eaton County, Michigan." The church deed was recorded in the Register of Deeds office in Charlotte May 2, 1898, by the Rev. Patrick Marveta, presiding elder.

Some of the early family names recorded were Goodycar, Harshey, Finch, Raber, Lloyd, Boatman, Benson, Bradford, Smith, McAllister, Miller, Tilford, Mrs. Laura Harshey, who died a few years ago, was the last surviving charter member.

In 1915 the church was raised and a basement placed under it.
