Covenant Meeting, Dec. 6/90 (1890)

Meeting opened by the scripture lesson being read by the pastor and Brother SLOAT leading in prayer. After singing largo. 21 and our pastor making a few remarks the regular exercises began. 43 testifying of their love for Christ and His cause. The minutes of previous meetings read and approved.

At the communion service held in the church on Sunday morning Dec. 7/90 Sister HETTIE F. ROGERS was received into fellowship from the Lansing Baptist Church. After which the pastor gave the hand of fellowship to Sisters SYVAN, BRAINARD, ROGERS and SWAN, and Brother BRAINARD. The communion service was an impressive one being the last of the year. 69 partook of the ordinance.

Dec. 18, 1890

After prayer meeting a business meeting was called and letters were granted to Sister MARY H. BRONSON to unite with the First Baptist Church at Detroit and to Brother and Sister SAM UNDERWOOD to unite with the Baptist Church at Hillsdale. No other business the meeting was adjourned.

January 31, 1891

In reviewing the month which ends today, we cannot but rejoice in the leading, the blessings and glorious manifestations of the Holy Spirit in our midst in awakening and converting many precious souls. The year opened with our regular prayer meeting on New Years night in which our pastor urged us to pray, work and look for salivation during the week of prayer. The meeting was marked with the Divine presence.

On Saturday, Jan. 3/91 (1891) our regular convenient meeting was held. 57 members being present and participating in the exercises in which the spirit of consecration and of an expectant faith was manifest. LORENZO AND MARTHA A. CROCKER were received on their letters from the Rollin Church and MRS. MARIAN A. GRUESBECK from the Ellendale Baptist Church. DK/D.R. (Dakota?)

On Sunday, Jan. 4th, our regular communion service was held. Brother and Sister CROCKER and Sister GRUESBECK received the hand of fellowship. 88 partook of the emblems. A spirit of devotion and deep and expectant waiting preempting all present.

Meetings have been held every evening since with increasing interest. 100 having either risen for prayers or fully consecrated themselves to the services and cause of the Redeemer accepting salvation in and through Christ Jesus our Lord; and while today closes the fourth week of labor, many are yet waiting at the door of the kingdom and may we not pray and trust that these also may enter in.

On Jan. 19 during the evening service Mrs. MARIA HENDERSHOT was received on her experience from the Disciple Church.

Saturday, Jan. 31/91

The covenant meeting was opened by a selection of scripture being read by the paster and prayer. 86 participating in the exercises. The testimonies were all burdened with a desire for a still greater outpouring of the Holy Spirit. MR. BALKESLEY, SYBEL PALMETEER AND CHARLEY TURNER were received as candidates for Baptism.

The meeting adjourned.

Meetings have continued during the month of Feb. demonstrating the power of God to redeem and save mankind: many very precious and some very glorious meetings have been among the number, it being the general experience and testimony that they had never passed through a revival of such magnitude in which there was as great an evidence that it was indeed of God and not of man. Strong men and women together with children and youth have sought and found Christ and are today rejoicing in the love of God which passeth knowledge.

It was a precious scene God witnessing to the ordinance ordained by our blessed Saviour, in giving richer manifestations of His love and favor to not only those who put on Christ, but those who witnessed their full consecration to Christ.

On Sunday evening, Feb. 8/91, after a sermon of "The World without the Christ", MR. ELISHA CADY, MR. GEO. N. CADY, MAUD CADY, HATTIE CADY, HORACE HICKS, ORRIN GIFFORD, WILLIE GRIFFIN, MR. HENRY F. MC GILVRA followed Christ in the ordinance of baptism. One scene will not soon be forgotten, as Bro. ELISHA CADY, 72 years of age, having been for 49 yrs. a member of the Presbyterian Church entered the baptismal waters, followed by his son and grandchildren, three generations being thus "buried with Christ in baptism" together.

It was a blessed time and all felt that God was in our midst and that to bless.

On Sunday evening Feb. 15th inst after a sermon by our pastor, on the "Scriptural mode of Baptism", MR. ISAIAH CORBIN, MR. MICHAEL CRONAN, MR. DANIEL MCKENZIE, MRS. DEBBY MCKENZIE, MR. AND MRS. GEORGE R. GIBSON, MR. WILLIAM E. PRATT, MR. EDWIN HYATT, CHARLES W. TURNER, MRS. EMMIE (Eunie) BLAKESLEY, EFFIE MILLER, JOHN R. HOLCOMB, RALPH HOLCOMB, entered the baptismal waters and put on Christ in a holy consecration to His service.

Again it was our happy privilege to witness husbands and wives being baptized together and coming up out of the water rejoicing in Christ whom they had followed in this sacred symbolic burial. While wives sat and wept tears of joy to see their husbands following in the sacred ordinance which they had enjoyed but a few brief days before, thus becoming united in the bonds of Christ and in the fellowship of His church militant. May all be thus one for ever in the glories of the church triumphant.

During the services Tuesday evening, Feb. 24/91 the following resolution from the Board of Deacons was offered and after discussion and the names being called for being read the resolution was passed without a dissenting vote.

The names appended to the resolution were excluded from the church. "That the clerk be authorized to drop the following names from the church records who are known to have united with other churches or have not walked with the church for over one year, withdrawn from such and that the clerk write 'expelled' by vote of the church against such names". [The names listed now are the same as the list above]

During the service Wednesday evening, Feb. 25/91 a letter was granted to Sister IDA DEERING to unite with the Wealthy Ave. Baptist Church at Grand Rapids, MI.

Read and approved at regular convenant meeting Feb. 28/91.

Read Sept. 6/91

Saturday, Feb. 28/91 (1891), the regular convenant held in the auditorium was opened by singing hymns 250 and prayer being offered by Bros. FESSEUDEN and FIELD. After singing hymn 21, the scripture lesson was read by the pastor. 118 took part in the exercises which were alike spiritual and profitable, many for the first time joining in the services. This meeting closed eight weeks of special meetings, during which time 69 have been received baptism, 4 on experience and 1 by letter making a total of 74 of whom have been baptised. It has been the testimony of the older members of the church that they have never attended any meetings which were more marked by the Holy Spirits presence or were blessed in their results.

Adjourned after reading the covenant and prayer by the pastor. Minutes of previous meetings read and approved.

Communion Service Mar 1st. 91 (1891)

This was a memorable day in Isreal. After receiving MRS. SYLVIA SPRAGUE on her letter from the Rives Baptist Church. Seventy one members received the right hand of fellowship from the paster and were welcomed into relations where 203 partook of the emblems, the bread and the wine, memorials of Christs broken body & shed blood. It was a season long to be remembered in our Zion because of the Divine presence and Holy Spirits power.

Adjourned after reading the covenant and prayer by the pastor. Minutes of previous meetings read and approved.

Communion Service Mar 1st. 91 (1891)

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Sunday evening Mar. 22/91.

After a sermon by our pastor, CARRIE REEVES, LOTTIS SCOFIELD, ALICE HOYT AND HENRY STONE were led by him into the baptismal waters and were baptized.

Covenant meeting Apr. 4th/91

Regular covenant meeting opened by singing hymn 21 and DEACON BARRETT leading in prayer. The 13 chapter of Hebrews was read, and 58 participated in the exercises. On motion it was ordered that our regular roll call be held Thursday, May 14/91. DEACON PARKER and BRO. ROGERS led in prayer. After reading the covenant and prayer by the pastor the meeting adjourned.

Communion Service, Apr. 5/91. (1891)

The communion services were enjoyed by 105 members who partook of the emblems. ALICE HOYT, LOTTIS SCOFIELD AND MRS. HATTIE HALL received the hand of fellowship and were welcomed into church relations.

May 2, 1891. Reg. Cov. meeting was opened by the pastor reading the 34 psalm and Deacon WRIGHT leading in prayer. After singing hymn 21, fifty eight members spoke of their love for and trust in their Savior. The Divine present was manifest. On motion MRS. MARY DAYTON was received into fellowship on her letter, from the Dansville Baptist Church and CLARK S. GREEN and wife were received on their letters from the Gaylord Church. Meeting adjourned after reading the covenant, prayer being offered by the pastor.

May 3, 1891.

Communion services were held at the usual hour and 91 members gathered about the Lord's table and partook of the bread and wine in obedience to Christ's command. It was a season of great spiritual profit to all.

Roll call. May 14, 1891.

The annual roll call was held in the afternoon, nearly 200 responding to their names. It was a time of great blessing and spiritual enjoyment. After a sumptuous supper served by the ladies the evening was spent in reminiscence, including an address by our pastor. LILLIE AND GRACIE GREEEN AND MR. & MRS. EDWARD FAY were received as candidate for baptism, and the meeting adjourned with the benediction.

May 15, 1891

Our beloved brother GEORGE N. CADY passed away from us after a brief illness and on Sunday, May 1, he was laid to rest in our cemetery after a sermon in the church by our pastor from the text, John XI: It was a very touching scene to see in the coffin one of our first fruits of the revival work of the year and the multitude around of those who had joined him in seeking the Savior and praising God. The words of the pastor were very tender, as he said he felt that he was burying a son in the gospel and every heart seemed to beat in unison with the thought that God had prepared him for his early translation, but not without some stars in the crown of his rejoicing.

On May 18, 91 our aged sister, MRS. SAMUEL FERRIS, after a few days of sickness joined her husband on the other shore. Her funeral services were held in the house of her son and her remains laid beside those of the Deacon, in the BRICK YARD CEMETERY. [Eaton Rapids, MI.)

On Sunday, May 31/91 after a sermon by our pastor, sister LILLIE & GRACIE GREEN and Bro.& Sister FAY were baptized and thus put on Christ in a public profession and espousal of His cause.

June 6, 1891

The regular covenant meeting was opened by singing hymn 138 after which Deacon PARKER led in prayer. Hymn 286 was sung, and the scripture from the 2nd Chapter of Acts was read. 73 gave testimony of their love for Christ. The annual church letter was read and approved and delegates were elected to the association. Adjourned.

Sweet Family Bible

American Indian Research

As of the 1880 Federal Census there were 25 pages (80 tribes to a page) of listed "tribes" to be coded and those not listed had a special code number. The more well known tribes were: Apache, Navajo, Hopi, Cherokee, Sioux, Iroquois, Crow, Chippewa and many others. The tribes that were less known include the Attu, Atka, Hoh, Makah, Sanak, etc. Some tribes have more and better records than others. Our way of doing genealogy does not always fit the Indian way. They may take into their home an orphan, the homeless of any age, a widow or other stray and call them "brother, sister, aunt" etc... and there may be no blood relationship at all. It was also an accepted practice to use the mother's family name and she could be listed as head of household. An Indian name generally does not tell you if the person is male or female.

Sometimes in census/index records you will find a number with the name. This number could be a "roll" number and is very important. Keep it.

Many Indians were missed completely on the census rolls when taken because of distance, lack of communication and understanding of the language and customs. Others did not want to admit to being Indian and some just refused to report. Also, as with all people, names were written as then sounded to the person taking the census. (Pal could be listed as Powell). Many Indians had only one name which did not help to keep the records correct. There were many with given and surnames so different from what the record taker was accustomed to that they did not always understand them or know how to record them.

In 1835 the US government classified as "Indian" anyone with 1/4 degree of Indian blood.

The Cherokee nation was lucky in that there was a census taken in 1835 before they were moved in what is know as "The Trail of Tears" to Arkansas and Oklahoma. But in the three years between 1835 and 1838 no records seem to have been kept of those **Cherokee** Indians who were born, who died along the way, who never left their homes, or who initially reached the new territory.

Originally the Indian was to be included in the Vital Statistic Records of each state when that state began keeping records but because Indians were spread out in large area, complete registering was not done for many years. There are many tribal offices for different tribes as well as Bureau of Indian Affairs offices for different areas.

These have information that may prove helpful but they do not do genealogical research. See the following message for source records...

Proving your Indian Heritage With Your Teeth and Eyes

If your have been unable to prove or disprove an "old family tale", concerning Indian ancestry, there may be a solution to your problem. The Talbot Library and Museum, Colcord, Oklahoma genealogy publication, noted interesting Indian research being done at Stamford University in Birmingham, Alabama. An extremely rare mutation of the "Y" chromosome may be a gentic marker unique to those who migrated to the Americans some 30, 000 years ago. Stamford University researchers, using a new method of scanning genetic changes, have found a mutation that in the sample exists only in Indian populations in North and South America and in Eskimo groups. The lead author of the Stamford Research Study noted, "In only one chromosome in all the world was there this change and all Native Americans may be able to trace their heritage back to that genetic change".

Seeking the answer will involve a trip to the optometrist or physician and the dentist who may help decipher your Indian ancestry. The eyes of American Indians and Blacks

carry a melanin (pigmentation peculiar to them.

The physician/optometrist/ophthalmologist, can determine by looking at the back of the eye on the retina, whether the melanin is present.

Your dentist can tell if you do, or do not, have a Carrabelli cusp on the maxillary first molars. Counting from the center front of your upper teeth, the sixth tooth on the back on each side is your maxillary first molar. The cusp is present on those of strictly western European origin, but missing on those of Asian or American Indian hertiage.

That old family tale may be true to a degree, but you will have to prove what tribe of American Indian you belong. One may contact a library reference department that contains books detailing the whereabouts of the various tribes in North and South America. Indian tribes often noted in Michigan's rich history and lopre are: The Huron Indians -as a result of wars between the Huron Indian and closely related Tionontati or Tobacco Hurons, they were mered and the term Wyandot became the common noame for the group, the Ottawa Indians, the Chippewa Indians (name often spedded Obijwa), the Menominee Indians, the Miami Indians, and the Potawatomi Indians.

The book *How to Enroll in an Indian Tribe* by **Heather Morningstar**, tells why and how to enroll in a tribe and gives a list of federally recognized Indian Tribes.

Perhaps the elusive Indian Princess or Chief will be discovered in your research and the "old family tale" will take on new important meaning.


