Letters From Our Volunteers

This letter was published in the Charlotte Republican in 1862

Copied as written.

Letters From Our Volunteers.
Nolin Creek, Harden Co., Ky.
January 2d, 1862

Editor Republican. ---- My last letter was from Louisville, and I supposed we were to leave for this vicinity on that morning. But it proved only a change of camping ground to a more elevated position in the same locality, where we remained until the 27th: and then our division of the regiment, (Marshall company K. and Albion company A.) left about sunrise for Bacon Creek, arrived in the afternoon, and tented at dark. Perhaps your readers do not all understand that this regiment was intended expressly for mechanical operations, and, if necessary, Two divisions had left fight. Louisville before us, and one was left when we came away. It is said that two or three of our four divisions are now laboring at the Green River bridge which was sometime ago destroyed by the rebels. division marched to this point from Bacon Creek yesterday, fourteen miles; that is a part of it, and the remainder comes tomorrow. Here we are to build a bridge, some eight or ten rods across the stream. The old one is so poor that when we marched over our captain spaced the files six or eight feet apart; and wagons forded baggage between the bridge and will-dam

above, so as not to risk a tumbling down of the old thing yet awhile. We were in our tents long before dark, after eating a hearty supper, for cooking which we brought wood from the adjoingin forest and water from a little underground stream that gushes out under a limestone bank thirty rods distant. Early in the evening we were packed into our sleeping places, eighteen to each tent, man next to man, feet to the center pole and head within a few inches of the canvas. accoutrements for our pillows and our blankets and overcoats our Some men gathered bedclothes. corn husks and added to the little share of straw, until our bed was really the most comfortable we have had since leaving Marshall. I am very much disappointed in this State, not finding many things here as I expected from what I had heard and read.

Have I not heard Kentucky described as the choicest of the southern states, and having the most enterprising, intelligent, and vigorous common people? I have earnestly looked to find it son, but in vain. A really good house and barn, and farm well fenced, such as you see on almost every improvement settled twenty years in Eaton Co. is a rare exception here. There seems a general appearance of decay in almost everything. Old houses actually falling to pieces, in a majority of instances, while the occupants are yet within, and no visible sign of intention or ability to build anew. What would my Eaton County friends say to see a framed house (as I have) covered with exactly such oak "shakes" as we put on the shanty we take for the

hen-coop or pig-pen, after we have been three or four years on a new farm. Occasionally a new log house may be seen; but put up without any pretention whatever to a pleasing aspect, and scarcely a window anywhere about it. Framed houses seldom have any cornice at all, no any projection of roof at the ends. nor any wall at the foundation to Old dilapidated indicate a cellar. buildings are the rule, and anything new to live in is the exception, not the country alone, but also at the stations on the railroad. In Michigan a railroad station produces a score of neat little cottages, and makes almost a new building of the old one that happened to be there before. There are more indications here of enterprise existing thirty-five years ago, than now. There are many old orchards that seem to have had no attention for fifteen years, and no fences around them; and nice shade trees in lines which indicate that fences once existed, but have long since gone to the history of the past; and much land, evidently once cultivated, now only commons. If one sees a house worth three or four hundred dollars, he will almost certainly notice one or two chimneys of brick or limestone built outside. next to the end, and from the prevalence of this custom I should think they like it, or else adopt it form economical notions. But to me it seems an outrage upon good taste to gross to be perpetuated in an enterprising community.

Almost all the streams are of a muddy, clayey hue, and the soil itself is a red clay without gravel, looking just right for brick. In places there is an abundance of limestone in the ridges and slopes; much of it in small fragments entirely covering the surface, but sometimes the road itself crosses several years of level solid rocks. In one place we traveled short distance road а macadamized with it, and it, and it answers so good a purpose, I should suppose more such road would be made. Yesterday the road was quite dry except in the hollows, where the mud was so deep that our baggage wagons, four horses to each, came near sticking fast. Six mules to a wagon seems the standard team.

As I write surrounded by sixteen messmates, some writing or reading, and others taking of Kentucky incidents, not one of us admits he has seen more than two buggies this side of Louisville.

Females are generally poorly clad. Yesterday we passed two girls, almost women, clothed in coarse wollen dresses, and an evident scantiness of underclothes. They were white and seemed to be cheerful without crinoline. Respectfully,

Benton Barrocks, Mo. January 12th, 1862

Ed. Republican. Since my last communication to your paper, nothing of special interest has occurred here, which is my excuse for not writing sooner. The Republican comes regularly to our company, as I have reason to believe, but more than half the boys never see them because of the carefulness of somebody in general, and nobody in particular. The general health of this regiment is good, with the exception of a strange sort of throat disease, something

akin to the mumps. Dr. B-----y, late of "Sebastopol," *swears* it is nothing but the horse distemper. The Doctor is now ministering in St. Louis, and often comes to camp. Presume he would send his compliments to "Dr." M-----s, if aware of this opportunity.

We have, at length, a commander appointed unto us---Col. G. Granger. He is said to be a West Pointer and a capital officer. At all events, a new order of things is introduced under his being administration, which will. of necessity, tend greatly to improvement of our regiment in more ways than one. While, before he came, commissioned officers of all grades, could appear at reville or not, as they chose, they, now, are compelled to don their immaculate "fixins" and curl their moustaches, of a morning, in just about the same time that it takes the rough private to pull on his course jacket and comb his elfin 'har.' Every officer and man must be, if well, a working soldier, and, if sick, he has to be sick according to the "Regulations." He believes in the "Regulations" with an abiding faith. I have not the honor of knowing the Col. personally, but I believe he eats, drinks, swears and prays by the "Regulations." which is not true of many of his subordinates. In my opinion, the Col. will become a favorite with the regiment, because of that same veneration of his, for the articles of war and other military text-books, and the conclusion is, that he will know no favorite in the regiment except merit. We are already proud of our Col. and think he is favorably impressed with us as a regiment.

It is determined on, that we are to be armed with Colt's revolving rifles and pistols, which will change our designation from cavalry to mounted riflemen, or some such thing. We shall not be armed with sabres if we get pistols and *vice versa*. The sabres we now have are miserable things. Hope we shall be rid of them at any rate.

The news has just arrived, as I am writing, that our regiment, the 3d Michigan Cavalry, Benton Hussars, and another Missouri regiment, have been formed into a Brigade, with our Col. Granger as acting Brigadier General of the same.

This is undoubtedly true, as such an arrangement has been contemplated for some time. True or not, the time of our inactivity has evidently nearly expired, and we shall soon know something of the "pomp and circumstance of glorious war," in good earnest. Marching orders, at any hour, will not take us by surprise.

Everything betokens active, advancing war, all along the lines from the Potomac to the Mississippi. An immense army, 60,000 strong, Under Gen. Grant, have left and are leaving Cairo, Paducah and Bird's Point for some point south-----probably Memphis, Tenn. Regiments are leaving this camp daily to join that or other expeditions. Grant's movement will probably be nearly simultaneous with an advance Gen. Buell in Kentucky, Rosencranz in Western Virginia, McClellan on the Potomac and the departure of Burn-side's Armament and its avalanche upon the coast. A part of this prophesy, but the advance of Gen. Grant, by direction

of Major Gen. Hallock, is a grand fact, and is certainly indicative that in this Department, at least, the army lethargy is over. It is in view of this very important fact, that I prophesy a general and simultaneous "stirring up of the animals" along the 'secesh' lines. Well, we hope to have a share in the melee when it comes around. Though we wont say we are 'spiling' for a fight, still, for one, I should'nt feel right to go home without having a shot, after taking so much trouble to hunt up the game. The hunter sometimes becomes the hunted, and instead of the slaver becomes the slain, ---this may be mine, and the fate of many of us, ----but it is no the business of a soldier to fear death, --- there is no such thing in the "Regulations."

The boys from Eaton County are generally well and in good spirits.

When I next write, my letter will bear the post-mark of some place farther into Dixie, if my anticipations are well founded. Your readers may therefore expect something more interesting in future.

I had nearly forgotton to say that it is a 'heap' cold here, but there is no snow. To say, it is a 'heap' cold , or a 'heap' hot, or a 'heap' muddy, is to talk Missourian. With them a shilling is a 'bit,' and with a great many people of the country, I imagine a 'bit' is a 'heap' of money. Au Revoir, till next time.

Lamb Genealogy

(Larry has been writing a column for a Springport newspaper for some time and has donated these for the Quest

I have been asked to write a genealogy item from time to time. So I will attempt a go at it. For the most part it will have to be about the Lambs of Duck and Lincoln's from Springport/Thompkins Although I grew up around the Lamb cousins, here in Clarence Township, Calhoun County, the Lincoln cousins were not far away, in Springport and Tompkins Townships, Jackson County. My first, "Official" study was when I was invited to a Lincoln-Lamb Meeting in the State Library, in Lansing, early in this decade. At that meeting, there were descendants from Apollos Lincoln, (Sr.)'s, three children. Apollos (Jr.), Caleb and Susan Lincoln Lamb. Many of the cousins there that day are no longer able to do any work on the family

We can trace Andrew Lamb back to New York State. His last stop being Wyoming County. Where his father Isaac and mother Martha were buried in the late 1820's and early 1830's. We can find Isaac Lamb in Northeast Town, Dutchess County, New York in earlier dates, but little else is know about him.

Andrew married Susan Lincoln in New York state, and some of their children were born there. First was a son, 1829 then a daughter 1831, named for his father and mother Isaac and Martha. Martha was the subject of a story

that appeared in this paper a while ago. In 1835 their 4th child was born in New York State, the last to be born there. The 5th child was born in 1838 in Michigan. The record I have shows that the last one born in 1850. This baby was name Lillis Pruella Lamb, married William From the Anderson Anderson. family that we get the name for Anderson Drive at the South end of Duck Lake. They built the brick house south of where we call De Descendants of those Camps. Anderson's include many names we see every day.

In Susan Lincoln's family we can trace back a few more generations. Her Mother was Lois Bill. Lois's mother was Lois Gibbs. One cannot help but wonder......Hummm Gibbs Road 222

Susan's brother Apollos, (Jr.) settled the Tompkins area. They started the Lincoln-Pomroy Cemetery. Her other brother Caleb settled in Saginaw area.

Many of these families records are in the LDS archives outside Salt Lake City, Utah. And are now available to anyone. Try http://www.familysearch.org/

Andrew Lamb and Susan Lincoln Lamb's children and where they lived. Martha married David Olds and lived in Round Valley, Inyo County, California. Emeroy lived in Albion, Michigan in the 200 block of West Austin Avenue. That house is still there. Charles's home is the brick house near the pay storage on 26 Mile Road, west side of Duck Lake. The next brick house south of there was built by Marvin. The brick house south of "DeCamps" was built by William Anderson and his wife

Lillis Pruella Lamb Anderson. Sarah A. married Charles Squier and their home was on the V Drive North and 27 Mile Road curve. Andrew and Susan had other children that lived in the area and their home sites are the subject of this writers research.

The following letter was copied from a letter sent to Duck Lake. The spelling used by the letter writer.

A Letter From the Civil War This is a letter from John Wise, dated August 16th 1864 and postmarked Jackson, Mich. Sent to Mr. Charles Wise, Esq.

Albion Calhoun Co., Mich. Duck Lake Box

Dear Brother and Friends
I now take My pen to let you know
that I am all right at the present and I
hope that you are all right as well as
myself

Well Boy I shall go to (XXX) (Looks like Diey) to morow I expect if nothing happens It will. Charles We are going to morow as sure as thunder. I have found out since dinner I have Bought a Blanket and a pair of Shirts and a pair of drors and I shall leev them for you and You can keep them or let cerean halv them do as you like. I will send his money in a letter to him and you can tell him--

Tell Let to be a good girl and ise, I will Wright to her as soon as I can ("Let" is Sarah Angelette Lamb Wise, his wife) I shall send My money so Tine can get them ve for you ("Tine" is Valentine Wise a relative) tell Tine to go to Holdens and inquire for perhaps I shall send the money by express Theas pictures is for Let one is Willcox and the other is an old

Chum a cook. Take care of them Till I come back so be good By(e) J Wise

This is the first note we have on Pvt. John Wise Andrew and Susan Lincoln Lamb's son-in-law.

Our last note we have on him is as follows.

Michigan Veterans of the Civil War burial sites

Wise, John D. 8th Cavalry, Mufreesburo, TN Company G #4051

John never lived to see his son Andrew Wise.

Sarah Angeletta, 1841-1932. "Let" married Charles Squier 1838-1900, in 1868 and lived on the curve at V Drive N. and 27 Mile Rd., Clarence Township, Calhoun County, Michigan.

In a small pioneer cemetery some 6 miles west of here (Springport, Mich.) on the west side of Duck Lake, are the graves of Andrew and Susan Lincoln Lamb. They were buried here less than one half mile from their 1844 log homesite. They left behind many children that settled here and their descendants are many and most are buried in the Clarence Center and North Clarence Cemeteries. One exception is their oldest daughter, Martha was born in Martha. Wyoming County or then Genesee County New York, and had come to Michigan when she was 5 or 6 years old. Their first stop was in Marengo Township in 1837. Martha stayed with her parents until 1850 when she then was a young lady of 19 or 20 years of age. She went west in the Gold Rush towards California with a group including a William Thornton

and three Olds boys from Battle **Parents** Creek. Their Grandparents are buried in the Cemetery east of the Airport on Territorial Rd. Martha's husband William Thornton was good at a card game, and soon as they got to Genoa, Carson Valley, Nevada, (then it was Utah Territory) he became known as Lucky Thorington. It appears that the local people had gotten rid of the Mormons and their plural marriages, and were not to happy with "Lucky's" having two wives, so in 1858 vigilantes came and hung "Lucky Bill".

Early in 1990's a local resident in Genoa, Michael Makley, (a High School Coach), wrote a book called "The Hanging of Lucky Bill". At that time, many weeks of research revealed nothing about Martha Lamb, who she was, where she came from or how she got to Carson Valley. Later Martha married David Olds and they moved to Inyo Co., CA. and lived well into this century. Many of her descendants are to be found out there in that state. (This 145 page book is in the Springport Library for all the Cousins to read)

During the past two years the more we found out about our subject, the more we wanted to learn of the life out West of the young lady that left Duck Lake, Michigan in the early 1850's. Gold Rush. Finally it led to going out there and seeing first hand the places she had lived. Our plane landed in Reno at 2 PM, and before dark we were in a library in Garderville, NV., the closest one to Genoa, Martha's first home out

After going through books, and taking notes, getting some copies it was time to end day one. The morning road report told us the roads to Sacremento were clear and dry so we were off to other adventures. The trip from southern California back to Reno was through Invo county, California. In a visit to the Inyo County Courthouse we hit A picture of Martha's paydirt. husband, David Olds, in the hallways with the pictures of all the county supervisors. His term of office was While in the from 1878-1882. courthouse, were found Martha's last will. This was a real good find, for her surviving family members were unaware of its existence. Later we took a side trip and looked at the remains of the World War Two Japanese interment Camp at Manzanar near Lone Pine, CA. Then on to Bishop, the library there had some things of interest, but they told us to visit the museum at Laws, a few miles from there. At the museum they were most helpful, and had a file on David and Martha in front of their home in Round Valley, some nine miles from there. After a few phone calls, they drew us a map, with instructions to get to the home site. We found the site OK. but everything was gone, a sad day, I had wanted a present day picture of her home to add to the collection of her brothers and sisters, then an now home photos. When we left the area, they had the 7 x 9 picture, but we have many memories of real nice people. Both present day and those of a hundred years ago.

This weeks genealogy we study a picture of the Andrew and Susan Lincoln Lamb family taken in

about 1890 at their 1844 Log house. The location was on the lake near the pay storage on the present 26 Mile Rd. and S. Dr. N.

The photo is a copy of the original tin type still in the family not far from this location. The cousins had copies, but they were the reverse of the tin type.

In past weeks, we have named the family members so we will name only the ones we know here.

Standing next to the cabin corner near the center is Susan Lincoln Lamb, born in 1806. She is 84 years old here. On her right is her daughter, Lillis Pruella Anderson. She is shown here with 3 children. She and her husband William had 7 children. Jesse born 1870, Martha married Tooley, Lucy married Sears, Fannie married Wise, Eliza married Snyder, Willie, Ina married Bingham (not born till 1892). The lady on Susan's left is daughter Mary who married Oscar Hotchkiss. Know family members missing from this photo are daughter Sarah married Squier, and Martha married David Olds, lived in California. Identifying the members in this picture will most likely never be completed with any certainty, if any of the readers have any information, if any of you have information concerning this family please let me know. All dated herein are approximate.

This week we take a closer look at the Nichols Cemetery about 6 miles west of town. Of the 20 graves, we note seven are Nichols and an early burial is that of Diana, wife of Jacob Nichols in 1851, age 47 years. Eight of the graves have Lamb names. The oldest being

Andrew and Susan (Lincoln) Lamb. Subjects of many of the writings in this column. Two of their sons Isaac and Sanford and their wives are here also. Andrew and Susan have one daughter, Mary and her husband Oscar Hotchkiss and son Freddie interned here. Two others buried here, Samuel Burch and Sanford Parshall seem to be the only ones not connected to the Nichols-Lamb families.

This week's report takes up to another branch of the Lamb family. Soon after Andrew's parents died, in the late 1820's and early 1830's, Andrew brought his wife Susan (Lincoln), and two children to Michigan. His brother James and family went first to Wisconsin and then on to Minnesota. From there they separated, some went to Utah and others went to California. From those that chose the latter we have this account of James's grandson, Denver Orrin Lamb's daughter.

Dedication to a Family Pioneer The following was written on the occasion of Annie's 100th birthday. Annie was born on February 7, 1896, to Denver O and Lucy Ellen (Gird) Lamb in Fallbrook, California. Her given name was Martha Jane Lamb, but she never used that She has always been name. "Annie". Many are the tales she still tells of family, friends and more than a century of life. Annie's mother, also a native Californian, received many cards and letters on her 100th birthday. Annie commented about her own 100th year, that "I'm the second one in the family !. "

The house where Annie was born still stands at the north end of

the Fallbrook Country Club in what is now the northern part of San Diego county, California. That home was built on the northern 1000 acres of the Gird Ranch, which was on the lower end of a fertile valley (now bearing the name Gird Valley). Annie was one of five girls and three boys raised at that home.

Annie has always enjoyed a wide variety of interests and activities. The laws of nature and all natural phenomena fascinate her. She gained a love for growing plants, whether from seeds, from cuttings, or by grafting. She learned to recognize a great variety of birds, enjoying the observation of their activities. She once raised parakeets to sell. Her only other "earned money" was from picking tomatoes for about a month.

Annie's father had a small camera and created a darkroom for processing photos. Then the girls got a better camera and took many beautiful pictures of the canyon, the trees, the rocks and hills, and even some family, too. On outings, they took the camera to capture scenes, events, and people of interest. Many of these are still family treasures.

About 1915, Annie learned to drive a Model T Ford. She continued to drive until she was 80.

On October, 1924, Annie married Eric Hindorff, a widower with three children. They resided then at his house at the northern end of Gird Road, still her home today. They raised his three children, who had lost their mother, and three more born during the next few years. The happy family was a joy to Annie and Eric.

In addition to the usual household chores, there were the

numerous task otherwise required to sustain the family. A large vegetable garden, including a berry patch, was tended. There was a cow to provide the milk, butter and cheese. Some chickens provided eggs occasionally, meals. In the summer, many jars of fruit were canned. Grapes, figs, and peaches were dried. Peanuts, from the garden were roasted to preserve them. Popcorn was dried and shelled for later popping in a wire popper over a fire in the fireplace. Annie made her own bread for many years. there were often course, baking-powder or soda biscuits, and also corn bread. Much of the time, Annie took care of the chores, then she began to occasionally delegate them to the growing children.

Water was pumped from a well along the Fallbrook Creek, up the hill to a water tank, by a gasoline Later, an electric motor engine. The only drove the pump. "refrigeration" was an evaporative cooler hanging under the water tank. Wash water was heated in a large kettle over a wood fire. electricity was available, clothes were ironed with heavy irons heated on the wood-fueled cook stove. Until just a few years ago, Annie split wood with wedges and a sledge hammer.

Each summer, after canning was done and before school started, yardage was picked out to make new dresses for the girls. She has always continued to used the treadle Singer Sewing machine she got in 1923. As they grew the girls were also taught to cook, sew, crochet, knit and embroider.

While she was raising her family, Annie was always busy, but

she found time to go camping at the beach, to a picnic at the river, or to the mountains. Annie enjoyed the desert outing and rock hunting, cutting and polishing some of the prettiest ones she found. She also loves music and dancing, especially the Scottish and square dances (the old-time way). She played cords on piano to accompany her husband's fiddle playing. She played accordion once in a mistrel show given by the Rebekah Lodge. She still like the old-time tunes best.

After the children were grown, Annie helped Eric more with his work. They had many colonies of bees, which she helped to tend. including extracting the honey for Eric was deputy Bee market. Inspector for the county for some time and Annie was a lot of help in that work. They trapped animals for the fur market, then later, trapped predators for the government. They hunted an caught live rattle snakes for sale to markets in Los Angeles and for the government to make anti-venom during World War II.

Eric died in 1962, but Annie continued to be central to her family. Mail time is exciting for her. She has a wide correspondence with many members of the family and people she's known for years, including school mates and girlhood friends. For years, she walked up and down the hill several times each day, to open or close the fate, mail a letter, and pick up the mail and the paper. She is noted for her long, "newsy" letters on a wide variety of subjects and her occasional poems. She has always enjoyed reading, including the newspaper, even the ads. She keeps up with local, national, and world news.

Annie's once auburn hair has grayed and she walks slower, but even at 100 years she would not be kept down, enjoying walks in the yard, the flowers, the birds, and changes in the weather. There's that twinkle in her eyes, the instant smile, and the same sharp wit she has had all her life. With nearly 100 including descendants. great-grandchildren. Annie's life has been full and loving. Equally, she has always been very interested in and proud of her heritage, that of the Lamb, the Gird, and the Hindorff families, pioneers

Martha Jane "Annie" (Lamb) Hindorff quietly passed from this world in the early morning of August 9, 1998, at the age of 102 years, 6 months, 2 days. She was buried next to the loving husband Eric Charles Hindorff in the Odd Fellows Cemetery, Fallbrook, California.

The North East corner of the Memorial Gardens Cemetery in Battle Creek, Michigan is the final resting place of early pioneers Luther and Dorcus (Young) Olds. Three of their sons, the two mentioned here, and John, went West to Genoa, Utah Territory (now Nevada). Later one brother, David moved to Inyo County, California and sets the scene for this weeks story.

A Deplorable Affair. Luther Olds

A brother of Supervisor David Olds, on the night of Tuesday last, the 9th inst. came to the end of his earthly career in a manner sad as it is almost unaccountable.

He had been at Bishop and Fish Springs, Lately, purchasing a band of horses. On the night named he left the town about 8 o'clock in the evening to go to Robert Love's place, near the Bishop Creek crossing of Owen's River. He was alone in a light spring wagon, drawn by a pair of fine, spirited horses. Intoxicated as he was, the team passed Love's place, all the bridges and across the river to a point where Benton road divides in two courses, one of which leads along the McNally irrigating ditch. On the morning following teamster а passing down found the deceased and his horses lying in the ditch---all drowned. He reported the fact as soon as possible, messages were sent to his brother at Round Valley. and the local authorities hastened to the scene. Olds was found with one of his feet so lodged in below the dead animals as to render his extrication impossible without first removing one of the horses. The vehicle was lying upon its side, in the shallow water and the horses in their struggle had turned about and probably struck and stunned the unfortunate man. The inquest held subsequently by justice Brooks substantially shows the forgoing facts so far as they could be ascertained. Luther Olds was 54 years of age last September, a native of New York. He was a resident of Carson Valley, near Genoa, where his wife and two or three children reside.

(May 1882 Inyo County, CA)

The David Olds in this account was the Husband of Martha Lamb who, as a child lived on the West side of Duck Lake. More of this story can be learned in the book, "Hanging of Lucky Bill" in the Springport Library.

Page 160 Green

Died, on Thursday, October 25th, at five o'clock p. m., at his residence, in Olivet, **Hon. A. L. Green**, aged 50 years.

Death has closed the scene as referred in our last issue.

The deceased came to Olivet in 1844, to try the dark uncertainties of a new and almost complete wilderness. He was at an early day a student of Olivet College, of which he at the time held many offices of trust, gradually winning the confidence of its trustees, and consequently has been their chief advisor for the last twenty years.

As years of prosperity rolled on, he became somewhat politically inclined, and for six years our Senate and House of Representatives recognized his presence and influence.

His funeral or memorial ceremonies were well attended, and a general feeling of regret manifested. It is with respect due Mr. Green, we mention that during his most busy pursuits of life, he did not lose sight of religious interest, and has been for several years a

member of the Congregational Church. He left a wife and four children to mourn his loss.

Ambrose Slosson

Ambrose Slosson died last Friday Deceased was born in Broome county, N. Y., January 27th, 1822, where he resided until 1848 when, he in company with his brother, Cyrus Closson, and James Bradt came to this town and purchased 50 acres of land on Section 22, where he lived until his death. Mr. S. had added to his first purchase and at the time of his death owned 117 acres of land. On the first day of January, 1852 he was married to Sarah Gridley, sister of H. & R. Gridley. Two sons blessed their union, who, with the widow and a host of friends, mourn his loss. The deceased by his honesty and upright dealing had won many friends, He had served many years as Town Treasurer, and all his business, whether public or private, was transacted honestly to the last cent. He had been a sufferer for many years with consumption, but has always borne his suffering patiently and without a murmur. His brother-in-law. Abraham Gridley was in attendance at the funeral.

Page 164 Rev. George D. Lee

Rev. George D. Lee was born at Naples, New York, April 14, 1834. His father was one of the far-seeing farmers who left the East and sought a home in Michigan in 1837 the year of her admission into the union of states. The subject of this sketch has always been an energetic

student and at the age of 16 years began teaching inter schools. He taught winters, work on the farm summers and occasionally took a term at college until at the age of 20 he began to pursue his college work. He had marked out his life work as a teacher, was successful in a high degree was within tow terms of graduation at Albion and had closed a successful year as principal of the Union City schools when he concluded to enter the ministry. For this his previous life had peculiarly fitted him for he had been an earnest member of the Methodist church since he was 14 years of age and had taken such an interest in Sunday school work that at 18 he was made a superintendent. He had the benefit also of a considerable experience before the public as a the sciences. upon lecturer in astronomy particularly mathematics. At the age of 22 he married Miss Margaret West, of Union City, who died six years later leaving two children. Mr. Lee afterwards married Miss Mary E. Zimmerman, of Sturgis, who with himself and a young son constitute the family circle. Three boys and one girl have left the home nest and all are enjoying the peace and prosperity of right and honorable living. In 1860 he joined the Michigan Conference at Ionia and was assigned to the charge at California, Branch County. Mr. Lee did not enlist during the war but he entered the ranks of the Christian Commission, a body of energetic, humanity-loving men and women of every shade of religious thought. Presbyterians, Congregationalists, Methodists, Baptist, Universalists, all rising above narrow secta-ianism

during that momentus struggle in which love of man triumphed over love of creed, thus furnishing a glimpse of that broader and grander future toward which the human race is fast tending. Here he did noble service throughout the war in ministering to the sick and wounded in hospitals, on gunbuats, etc., and distributing literature thousands of other articles furnished from the north. He was at St. Augustine, Fla., and helped to care for 3,000 boys just set free from the Andersonville prison pens. Upon his return home from the south Mr. Lee was assigned to the work at Pentwater and Muskegon, after which he for four years was presiding elder of the Pentwater district which embraced four and one-half counties and the Indian mission, composed of about 400 Indians. During his 30 years in the ministry he has found no place more homelike than Charlotte where during a three years pastorate he made himself popular with our people. He has held pastorates also Sturgis, Hillsdale, Mason, Hastings, Grand Rapids and many other places, in all of which he has been very successful. Failing health has several time broken him off from his work and at such times he has traveled extensively, but always in his own country. He is now seeking to build his health anew by manual labor on his neat little farm of six and on-half acres at the end of West Henry street on the Bellevue road. He will there make one of the most beautiful homes in the city, where he expects to spend the remainder of his days on earth in the enjoyment of the fruits of this long life of labor.





JOB R. WOOD WILL Died 1842

(Extracted by Mary Jean Baker Library of Michigan Archieves)

Job R. Wood of the town of Eaton Rapids in the County of Eaton and State of Michigan being of sound and disposing mind, memory and understanding do hereby make and declare this to be my last Will and Testament as follows to wit: -

First: I Will and direct that all my just and legal debts and funeral charges be paid by my Executors herein after named.

Second: I Will and direct that my eldest son Tillison have one dollar as I have advanced him his share by deeding him fifty-four acres of land. My second son, Nelson Wood I Will and direct that he have one dollar as I have advanced him his share by deeding him forty acres of land. My beloved wife, Judith, I Will and direct that she have all the rest and residue of real and person at Estate to have and to hold her natural life and she then ____ real estate to be divided equally between my two sons, Francis and Job.

My eldest daughther, Mary Browen, I Will and direct that she have paid from the money that John M. Hatch owes me forty-five dollars and my daughter, Sarah Wood I Will and direct that she have forty-five dollars from the said money due from the said J. H. Hatch & Lucinda

Hooker I Will and direct that she have paid her from the money that **John H. Hatch** owes me forty-five dollars.

And to **Deidana**, my eldest daughter by my second wife, I Will and direct that she have, when married, forty-five dollars out of my estate left to my beloved wife. My next daughter, **Melinda** I Will and direct that at the time of her marriage that she have forty-five dollars out of my said estate and my other daughter, **Caroline** I Will and direct that she have when married forty-five dollars - - - -

And all the rest of my personal property I Will and direct shall be to the disposal of my beloved wife **Judith** for her support and the minor children.

And lastly I do nominate and appoint my second son, **Nelson Wood** executor of this my last Will & Testament and hereby revoke all and every form Will by me made.

In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this twenty-fifth day of April in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty two.

Signed sealed and declared by the Testator Job R. Wood to be his last Will and Testament in the presence of us who at his request in his presence and in the presence of each other have signed our names as witnesses: John M. Hatch of the town of Tyler, Eaton Co. L.(or I.) Esther Hatch of the same place, Barbary Ann Booth of the same place.

Brookfield Township Included in Early Michigan Settlements by Mary Jean Baker

- Fact: More land in Michigan was purchased in 1836 than in all the years preceding and for many years thereafter.
- Reasons: Detroit had been settled for more than a century but the flat lands were under water part of the year and bottomless mud the rest of the time.
- By 1830, a few settlers came to Oakland and Washtenaw Counties. They sent glowing report to their eastern friends about the fertile soil in Michigan. Grain and port brought fabulous prices.
- ❖ Immigration into Michigan was at floodtide by 1836. Three men could organize a bank and issue notes. When inspectors were coming, kegs of silver were sent in advance so that the inspectors found an abundance of silver in the first bank. While they were eating, the silver was sent ahead to the next bank. It didn't take long for banks to close. There was no real money. Business was at a standstill by 1837. No one could purchase necessities.
- Even though people had to use "wildcat" money, they still explored the interior of Michigan. In Brookfield Township settlers started coming from the east through Spicerville and in the west through Bellevue. Because

of Narrow Lake and wide swamps, these settlers might have lived for years not knowing of each other.

Peter Moe and his sons, Erza and Henry, and John Boody were probably the first settlers in Brookfield's northeast corner by 1837. Moetown was the name given to this corner.

Moetown' settlers were J. S. Moe, J. Otely, J. E. Fisher, S. S. Bly, C. Kintner, E. P. Stewart and Amos Carrier.

Jesse Hart and wife Rachel, came the same year to the northwest corner. Five years later he became the first supervisor. Mr. Hart built the first frame barn in Brookfield in 1851. The first shingled roof was claimed by **Peter Williams** in 1841, even though it was on a log house.

The first schoolhouse was near Nicholas Boody's residence. The first teacher, in 1841, was Roxana Skinner. Claiming the first Brookfield Township marriage was B. B. Snyder to Sarah Moe. Thomas D. Bryan became the first postmaster in 1858. The postoffice closed in July 1904 and mail reverted to Charlotte.
