



# OLDEST PIONEERS OF EATON COUNTY

From the Olivet Optic, Thursday September 23, 1909

Edwin and Jorum Boyer have lived in Chester Township Seventy-two Years-Seventy Years on the Same Farm.

Came to Michigan the Year the State was Admitted to the Union and Have Watched Eaton Grow From a Wilderness to the Best Agricultural Section in Michigan.

Courtsey Charlotte Republican.

Residents of Chester township for 72 years, 70 years on the same farms, entitle Edwin and Jorum Boyer to the honor of being the oldest pioneers in the county. Esek Pray, father of County Clerk Pray, was born in Windsor township 71 years ago, but a year earlier, or to be exact, June, 1827, Leonard H. Wm. Cummings, Boyer, brother-in-law of Mr. Boyer, and Parles Worden and their families, the party numbering 21, located in Chester township. Edwin Boyer was a lad of 12 when the family reached their new home in the wilderness, while Jorum was a baby two years old. The family emigrated from New York State, making the trip from Syracuse to Buffalo on the Erie canal, thence to Detroit by boat and from Detroit overland, the trip from Detroit to Chester requiring 12 days, and the entire trip 37 days. Harvey V. Prentice, of Eagle, owned hundreds of acres throughout this section of the state in the early days, and Mr. Cummings came out here to look over the land and arrange for the purchase of ten 80 acre lots, the Boyers taking four of the ten lots, two of the same being the adjoining farms where the brothers still live. Of the entire colony the Boyer brothers are the sole survivors so far as known

Bishop----At his home in East Windsor, April 7, 1891, Eli C., son of Rev. Jacob and Rachel Bishop, aged 48 years, 1 month.

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Civil War Letters From Our Volunteers.

As written in the Charlotte Republican Newspaper of April 25, 1862

LETTERS FROM OUR VOLUNTEERS.

THE BATTLE OF PITTSBURG.

PITTSBURG, TENNESSEE, April 12, 1862

Friend Saunders:----I have long delayed writing, for the reason that I did not suppose you would be allowed to publish an account of our army movement here till after the battle: and since the battle, our mail facilities have been broken up till now. Of course you have received a general account of the battle ere this, and a much more perfect one than I could give you. But I may be able to give you some of the particulars of that part of the battle in which our Eaton County boys were engaged, of which you have had no account. Our Reg't (the 12th Mich. Inf.) was stationed on the advance post on the west, and attached to Gen. Prentiss' division. Our Brigade was commanded by Col. Peabody of the 25th Mo. Vol., which Reg't was stationed on our right.

At about 2 o'clock on Sunday morning the 6th inst, our pickets reported that the rebel cavalry were near at hand, about two hundred in number, and that we could bag them if we would turn out. Accordinly Co's D. E. and G. of the 12th Mich. Inf., and two Co's of the 25th Mo. Vol. were sent out. After advancing nearly a mile, a part of our force filed off to the left, and the rest went on. Another half mile travel brought us nearly together again. At this time

two or three shots were fired by the rebels which gave us an indication of their whereabouts. There were but few shots fired on either side till it was light enough for us to see the enemy, when the firing commenced in earnest. Our boys took very deliberate aim, and continued the action for nearly an hour, when the rebels commenced to advance down the hillside in front of us with an overwhelming force. We then fell back, bringing our wounded with us, till we came within half a mile of our encampment, where we met a small reinforcement and returned to the fight. We deployed in an old cotton field and fired several rounds, when the enemy were seen coming around on our left. We were then withdrawn from the field and filled to the left in a piece of woods, where a few more volleys were fired, but the enemy coming up on double quick forced us to retire. We soon fell in with our Regiments which were drawn up in line of battle near the quards' quarters, some sixty rods in front of our tents. Our men stood their ground for a short time, and then fell back to our tents, where they made a short but stubborn resistance. the enemy advanced with solid front, three or four lines deep, the front line firing and laying down and the rear lines stepping in front of them, firing and laying down in turn. In this manner they steadily advanced in overwhelming force. Before we retreated from our camp ground they brought their artillery to bear on us. The order to retreat was given and last the ground was lower back of our camp, their shots went mostly over our head, on our retreat. We fell back nearly a mile before we met reinforcements. Our Rea't got

considerably scattered in retreating, and the same might be said of the whole brigade. After retreating from our camps, our forces made one more rallv before reaching reinforcements, and such a terrible fire as they poured on the enemy can scarcely be imagined. The thick underbrush which covered ground was literally mown down with musket balls, and every tree of the size of a man's body has the marks of from twenty to thirty bullets. The rebels carried off all their wounded and many of their dead, but as I passed over that spot two days after the battle, I saw the rebel dead lying thick on the ground like hailstones after a storm. Standing in one spot I counted thirty lying in a small circle around me.

After fell back we to reinforcements the battle commenced along the whole line extending for many miles. We are well supplied with artillery, and so were the enemy. The booming of cannon, the whizzing of shot and shell, and the rattle of musketry continued without ceasing through Our forces stood their the day. ground well through the day till about three o'clock, when the enemy received large reinforcements. Our men were then compelled to give The enemy cheered and charged on us with the greatest fury, taking many prisoners. Our forces fell back near the river, where our heavy seige guns were brought to bear, and Gen. Buell's forces arriving at this time, from the other side of the river, they were compelled to fall back for the night. Buell's forces were crossing the river all night, and all day Monday. He brought about 80,000 men.

The battle commenced again Monday morning, at about 8 o'clock, and continued till about 4 o'clock P.M., the rebels being steadily driven back. The firing throughout the day was most terrific. The rebels fought with the utmost desperation, but were completely driven from the field before nightfall. We captured nearly all of their heavy guns before noon.

I have no doubt the rebels took many more prisoners than we did, for they surprised and captured several regiments early on Sunday morning. It is generally believed that our skirmishing party that went out before daylight on Sunday morning saved us from total defeat. Our firing alarmed those directly in our rear, and the alarm was carried to right and left as rapidly as possible.

The number of dead and wounded cannot be ascertained yet, but the rebels lost far more than we Our regiment lost at least twenty-two men, who have been found and buried by us. One of them was Jas. Worden, formerly of Charlotte. John Baldwin, of Walton, was slightly wounded and taken prisoner. He fought desperately. Geo. W. Gates, of Grand Ledge, was shot through the leg----merely a flesh wound----and is doing well. John Sattler, from near the Ledge, is missing. All the rest from Eaton County, so far as I know them, are here, unharmed. Dr. Kedzie was taken prisoner, while caring for our wounded, but has returned.

Gen. Prentiss was taken prisoner on Sunday and sent South. Col. Peabody who commanded our brigade, was killed on our campground, and the command then devolved on Col. Quinn, of our regiment. Consequently our

regiment is now commanded by Lieut. Col. W. H. Graves, of Adrian. He is universally beloved by his men, and it seems as though they could never speak enough in his praise. Long may he live to lead us.

We have lost many Colonels and Majors, and some Generals. The rebel General, Johnson, is certainly killed, and many of their other officers were slain and carried off the field. Many of them were seen to fall, but they were carried off, as were many of our men who were wounded on Sunday; but we recaptured most of our wounded on Monday. they treated our wounded as well as could be expected from any enemy.

At one time the line of battle extended at least 12 miles in length and covered an area of not less than fifty square miles. Waterloo is eclipsed. The batltle of Pittsburg is the largest and most desperately fought battle of the nineteenth century.

The flower of the southern army was here. Generals Johnson, Beauregard, Bragg and Breckinridge are known to have been here. Thousands of the Southern gentry were in the army, having joined it for eight days only. It was the general understanding that if they lost this battle their case was hopeless. Beauregard addressed his men and told them this would be the last battle. If they lost this they lost If they gained it the everything. North was whipped. He assured them he would take us before Monday night or make us swim the Tennessee river like rats. addressed them again Monday morning, and said they would water their horses in the river before night.

How greatly he was mistaken., They suffered a most disastrous defeat.

Before entering the fight the rebels were served with rations of whisky and gunpowder. The gunpowder is said to keep up the stimulating effect of the whisky for many hours. The prisoners all say that they had no fear of the result. They confidently expected to win, and when our force fell back they were wild with excitement, and regarded the victory as already gained.

While writing the above 80,000 or 90,000 troops have arrived from Gen. Halleck's command, and the gun boats have just fired a salute for a Major General. It is understood that Gen. Halleck himself has arrived. We think we now have force enough to march anywhere through the South. Our forces are said to number three hundred thousand men. You may expect to hear from us at Memphis next, and them at New Orleans.

The rebels are whipped. they will fight no more for an independent government, but for an opportunity to make peace on the most favorable terms. The leaders will try to keep up the fight untill they get an opportunity to flee the country. they will try to get to Mexico, and there get on board some foreign vessel.

The Rubicon is passed. The problem is solved which decides the capability of a free people to govern themselves. the hope of the oppressed remains. Our republican government---the light of the nations, shines brighter than ever. Let the tyrants of the earth tremble. The edict has gone forth--their days are numbered.

Historical Markers in Eaton County, Michigan

Eaton County -

Named for John H. Eaton Secretary of War under Andrew Jackson, Eaton County was set off in 1829. Bellevue, where the county's first settlement took place in 1833, was platted by Isaac E. Crary and John D. Pierce, fathers of Michigan's public school system. Most of the early settlers were Yankees. The county was organized in 1837. Charlotte, which was built on a prairie near the center of the county, became the county seat. Maple sugar soon was a famous county product.

(This marker is located at 100 W. Lawrence Avenue at Cochran and Bostwick streets, Charlotte on the Eaton County Courthouse yard, now known as Courthouse Square. Marker was dedicated April 16, 1958)

First Congregational Church of Charlotte - This handsome brick church was completed in 1881. organized the Seven persons congregation in 1851 in nearby Carmel Township. Moving to Charlotte the next year, they held services in the wooden courthouse and in 1856 built the city's first place of worship, "The Basswood Church" on Bostwick Avenue. In 1873 construction of the present church began. Members made contributions assure its finish. Local businessman Joseph Musgrave

donated exterior brick originally purchased for his own home.

(This marker is located at 106 S. Bostwick, SW corner of Lawrence, Charlotte; First Congregational Church lawn. Marker was dedicated Feb. 11, 1972.)

Gresham United Methodist Church - Members of the Gresham United Methodist Church first worshipped in a school and in homes. In 1879, Palmer & Rebecca McDonald gave this site on which to build a church. In order to erect the church, people in the community donated logs which were cut at Merriam's sawmill. The Dade building's pointed-arch windows and steeply pitched roof exemplify the prevalence of Gothic elements in rural church architecture. The church was completed in 1881.

(This marker is located at 5055 Mulliken Road, NW corner of Gresham Highway, Chester Township; Gresham United Methodist Church lawn. Marker dedicated January 21, 1988.)

Delta Center Methodist Church -

In 1837, Methodists in Delta Township began meeting in a log schoolhouse. Served by circuit riders, they organized as a Methodist class in 1842 with two families. The class grew, and in 1865 the Reverend J. Gulic became its first appointed minister. On June 6, 1867, a Ladies Aid Society was formed to raise funds to build an adequate place of worship. The church, completed in 1873, was significantly enlarged in 1926 and 1954. During a special church conference in the summer of 1962, delegates from

Delta Center and nearby Bethel and Millett voted to merge their three churches. The first meeting of the newly formed church was held at the Delta Center Methodist Church on June 24, 1962. The name Trinity Methodist Church was adopted on July 5, 1962.

#### SIDE TWO

The original white frame church that stood just northwest of the present church was designed and built by Darius B. Moon, a native of Delta Township, in 1873. Members of the congregation donated labor and much of the building material. The 30' x 50' structure, which cost \$340, served area Methodists for 110 years. When completed, it was a crisp, clean, simple rectangular building with a central entrance and rectangular windows. It was topped by a square, louvered belfry, with bracketed cornice and turned finial capping. The last regular worship service in the frame church was held March 10. 1968. On congregation used the old church as a fellowship hall until it was razed on May 18, 1983.

(This marker is located at 7533 West St. Joseph, Delta Township Delta Center Methodist Church Informational Designation on October 27, 1983.)

Delta Mills - Erastus S. Ingersoll settled here in 1836 and constructed a water-powered sawmill. A gristmill was added, and in 1840 a resident wrote that people came from twenty miles around to have their flour made. A school modeled after Oberlin College was chartered as "Grand River Theological Seminary,

" but never opened. Platted as Grand River City in 1841, the village was commonly called Delta Mills after the township and main industry. The mills operated into the twentieth century.

(This marker is located at Delta Mills Park, Old River Trail, SW of Delta Mills, Delta Township; Delta Mills Informational Designation. April 14, 1972.)

Delta Mills Schools - On this site in 1839, residents of Delta Township built their first school. A one-room wood frame structure, it could seat sixty-five. In 1940 the building was remodeled and a second classroom was added. Although the township district was annexed to the Grand Ledge School District in 1956, grades one through eight continued to be taught in the old building until 1958. That year, the schoolhouse was replaced with a modern structure, which served students until 1982.

(This marker is located at 6816 Delta River Drive, Delta Township; Delta Mills School Information Site. Marker was dedicated March 22, 1983.)

Delta Township -Musgrove Evans platted this area in 1827. The first settlers, Erastus & Sally Ingersoll and their twelve children, did not arrive until 1835. The township was organized in 1842. At the first township meeting, citizens chose the name Delta and elected Ingersolls to nine of the nineteen offices. They township also appropriated "\$100 for bridges and roads" and decreed that bulls and boar hogs must be fenced in. By

1887 the area was mainly supported by farming and grist and sawmills. The clapboard township hall, erected in the mid-1870s, served the township until 1955. A combination fire chief's residence and township hall was built to replace it on the site of the old Soper one-room schoolhouse, one mile north of the earlier structure.

(The other side of the above)

Delta Charter Township - Between 1940 and 1987, Delta Township's population zoomed from 2,618 to nearly 28,000, and its state tax evaluation increased from \$1.48 million to \$475 million. Charter status, attained in 1962, helped fuel an explosion that gave Delta the moniker "fastest growing township in government Michigan." Local services are now directed from this building, which was completed in 1970. As farms became residential subdivisions and apartment complexes, the township created an extensive recreation facility. The Sands Moon House, a log cabin built around 1855, was moved to Woldumar Nature Center in 1980, when a large industrial plant was built on its original site. There it became a walk-in demonstration museum commemorating Delta's early pioneers.

(This marker is located at 7710 West Saginaw Highway, Delta Township; Delta Township Informational Designation. Marker dedicated September 26, 1987.)

First Presbyterian Church - In 1846, Congregational services were conducted by the **Reverend Joseph Smith** in the home of one of Windsor Township's earliest residents, Nathan Pray. In 1875 nineteen years after the town of Dimondale was platted around the mill of Isaac Dimond, the Congregationalists and Presbyterians jointly built this structure. The community's first church, it was formally purchased by the Presbyterians in 1877.

(This marker is located at 162 Bridge Street, SW corner of Quincy, Dimondale, First Presbyterian Church. Marker dedicated April 4, 1975.)

This list has been compiled and is forwarded to you, under instructions contained in a Joint Resolution of the Legislature of Michigan, approved January 17, 1812. The delay in procuring returns from the Regiments in the field, together with a desire to add to the list the names of volunteers substing in Regiments which have been massaced into service during the fall months, necessarily deferred the completion of the record beyond the time originally contemplated.

Information concerning the residues of the volunteers whose names are given, as well as that in regard to their being married or suscential, is based (with the exceptions hereafter noted,) upon special returns to this Department, verified by the

commanding officers of commander

commanding officers of companies.

The details of executive are derived from the same special returns, and from the regular "Monthly Returns" of Regiments. Although noted on official authority, there may be occasional errors, in exceptional cases, especially in the record of desertions, as atranglers on a march, or after an engagement, and disabled sobliers absent without the knowledge of their officers, are sometimes, under the rigid rules of the service, accounted for as deserters where no other information concerning them can be These instances, however, are but rape

procured. These lietances, however, are but one to as showing the residence of volunteers, are wanting in the case of Commany D. First Industry; Companies A. B. C. and G. Ninth Industry; First, Fourth and Fifth Datteries; and Willet's Sharp-shoniers. The place of cultament, as shown by the muster rolls, is given as the residence of the men in these companies.

Except in a very few instances, casualties reported since the 3cti of Soptember, have not been antered on these lists. It was necessary to adopt a uniform period at which the record should cases, and a later date could not astely be fixed.

Three lists include the infantry Regiments, from the First to the Twenty-Sixth inclusive; the Cavalry, from the First to the Sixth inclusive; the First Meclanics and Engineers; the two Michigan companies in the "Marrill Horse"; the Batteries, First to Ninth inclusive; all the Michigan Binaryshouter (six companies) now in active service; McDermott's Company in the Mulligan (III.) Regiment; and the "Stanton Guard," cultisted to guard roted prisoners as Nackinac—now dislaunded. The First Regiment of Three Moulles' volunteers was mustered out of service before these backs were contemplated, and left no record of the residence of those connected with it. The Twenty-Serenth and Twenty-Serenth interview for the Regiment of the Test and the Test and Eleventh Stateries, set incomplete and remainded. The Regiment which have joined Regiments in the field since July 1st, 1802, will be included, should the present system continue, in future lists similar in character to this.

Companies from this State, numbering in the aggregate over 1,200 men, who joined Regiments of other States during the

Companies from this State, numbering in the aggregate over 1,200 men, who joined Regiments of other States during the year 1861, are not included in these lists, the organizations to which they are attached not being embraced in the records of this Department, and having no official connection therewith.

The entire number of names which have been classified under the Resolution of the Legislature, and which are now sent in acquirate lists to the several countries in the State, is 30,159. The men in each company and regiment are classed together.

It can hardly be necessary to impress upon the county officers who are made the custodians of these books, the importance cir preservation. This is not only due to the brave men whose names are escaled in them, but should be a matter of of their preservation. pride on the part of the county. 

Take out a one-dollar bill and look at it. The one-dollar bill you're looking at first came off the presses in 1957 in its present design. This so-called paper money is in fact a cotton and linen blend, with red and blue minute silk fibers running through it. It is actually material. We've all washed it without it falling apart. A special blend of ink is used, the contents we will never know.

It is over printed with symbols and then it is starched to make it water resistant and pressed to give it that nice crisp look. If you look on the front of the bill, you will see the United States Treasury Seal. On the top you will see the scales for the balance--a balanced budget. In the center you have a carpenter's T-square, a tool used for an even cut. Underneath is the Key to the United States Treasury. That's all pretty easy to figure out, but what is one the back of that dollar bill is something we should all know.

If you turn the bill over, you will see two circles. Both circles, together, comprise the Great Seal of the United States. The First Continental Congress requested that Benjamin Franklin and a group of men come up with a Seal. It took them four years to accomplish this task and another two years to get it approved.

If you look at the left-hand circle, you will see a Pyramid. Notice the face is lighted and the western side is dark. This country was just beginning. We had not begun to explore the West or decided what we could do for Western Civilization. The Pyramid is un-capped, again signifying that we were not even close to being finished. Inside the capstone you have the all-seeing eye, an ancient symbol for divinity. It was Franklin's belief that one man couldn't do it alone, but a group of men, with the help of God, could do anything. "IN GOD WE TRUST" is on this currency. The Latin above the pyramid, ANNUIT COEPTIS, means "God has favored our undertaking." The Latin below the pyramid, NOVUS ORDO SECLORUM, means, "a new order has begun." At the base of the pyramid is the Roman Numeral for 1776.

If you look at the right-hand circle, and check it carefully, you will learn that it is on every National Cemetery in the United States. It is also on the Parade of Flags Walkway at the Bushnell, Florida National Cemetery and it is the centerpiece of most heroes' monuments. Slightly modified, it is the seal of the President of the United States and it is always visible whenever he speaks, yet one knows what the symbols mean. The Bald Eagle was selected as a symbol for victory for two reasons: first, he is not afraid of a storm; he is strong and he is smart enough to soar above it. Secondly, he wears an material crown. We had just broken from the King of England. Also, notice the shield is unsupported. This country can now stand on it's own. At the top of that shield you have a white bar signifying congress, a unifying factor. We were coming together as one nation. In the Eagle's beak you will read, "E PLURIBUS UNUM", meaning "one nation from many people." Above the Eagle you have thirteen stars representing the thirteen original colonies, and any clouds of misunderstanding rolling away. Again, we were coming together as one. Notice what the Eagle holds in his talons. He holds and olive branch and arrows. this country wants peace, but we will never be afraid to fight to preserve peace. The Eagle always wants to face the olive branch, but in time of war, his gaze turns toward the arrows.

They say that the number 13 is an unlucky number. This is almost a worldwide belief. You will usually never see a room numbered 13, or any hotels or motels with a 13th floor. But think about this: 13 original colonies, 13 signers of the Declaration of Independence, 13 stripes on our flag, 13 steps on the Pyramid, 13 letters in the Latin above, 13 letters in "E Pluribus Unum", 13 stars above the eagle, 13 plumes of feathers on each span of the Eagle's wing, 13 bars on that shield, 13 leaves on the olive branch, 13 fruits, and if you look closely, 13 arrows. And for minorities; the 13th Amendment.

I always ask people, "Why don't you know this?" Your children don't know this and their history teachers don't know this. Too many veterans have given up too much to ever let the meaning fade. Many veterans remember coming home to an America that didn't care. Too many veterans never came home at all. Tell everyone what is on the back of the one-dollar bill and what it stands for, because nobody else will.
