

Sampson Hall - The Best In The State of Michigan!

The Grand Opening of Sampson's Hall was held February 16, 1867. The hall was designed and executed by **E.S. Fassett**, according to newspaper articles in the 1867s.

An article appearing in the Charlotte Republican in Feb. 1867 tells that Sampson Hall is one of the largest and best finished in the state, 50 by 100 feet, 20 foot high, built with 16-inch brick walls and a supporting wall under the centre of the hall floor, a self-supporting roof, ample stage and fine scenic representations. It has cost \$10,000. As the finishing touches are being given, it is exciting the admiration of visitors, and it is acknowledged by citizens of the cities around us that Charlotte leads them all in providing a Hall for public gatherings.

The scenic painting and artwork which gives beauty of finish to the Hall is worthy of special notice. It is made up of original designs suggested and executed by **E. S. Fassett**, who is well-known to our citizens as the painter of a successful traveling panorama and of many very fine portraits.

The drop curtain represents an Italian scene-lofty mountains illuminated by the rays of a setting sun. On the left is a flight of stairs heading to a mansion; in the middle distance a church and convent partially in ruins crown the summit of a lofty cliff; in the center is a stone walk and flight of stairs leading to the water's edge where a gondola lies in

wait for two lovers, a cavalier and maiden richly clad in costumes of the olden times. On the right are lofty mountains, at the base of which, in the foreground, a fountain sends forth slivery jets to the lawn below. It is pronounced the finest drop curtain in the State.

On each side of the stage are imitations of private boxes, and beyond large panels in which are representations of statuary - the one on the right representing Summer; and holding a garland of flowers; and that on the left, representing Winter; is covered with snow.

The crowning feature of decorations is in the centre of the ceiling, above the large chandelier - the imitation of a Dome. This is indeed a novelty, and when seen under the strong light of 24 large burners will present a beautiful display of art.

The Hall is now being frescoed, and will receive its finishing touches in a few days. Its embellishments will do great credit to **Mr. Fassett**, as a designer and artist.

The elements of comfort have not been overlooked by the proprietor. The Hall will be well warmed, ventilated and lighted. 400 comfortable chairs will be arranged to give room for enjoyment and with the disposition among all classes to recognize the liberality and public spirit of the proprietor, we expect to see these opening exercises a grand success.

Saturday evening, Feb 16 (1867), the Oratorio of Esther, will be presented under the direction of **Prop. Bailey**, assisted by the best musical talent of Charlotte.

Feb. 18 to 21. The Athenaeum Company of Detroit will appear in a selection of Chaste and instructive plays. Admission 50 cents.

Feb. 22 - A Grand Ball, with Supper at the Phenix.

### Bad News For Mr. Fassett.

Reported by the Eagle, Sept. 17, 1869.

Last evening between ten and eleven O'clock, in Fuller's wooden building, corner of Canal and Bridge Streets, over A. Hardy's billiard saloon, as Mrs. E. S. Fassett was sewing the scenes of Fassett's panorama of the Old and New World together, she met with a narrow She had the ends of the escape. two scenes in her lap, and directly in front of her a kerosene lamp. Suddenly there was an explosion, throwing the fragments of the lamp and the contents completely over the scenes. She had sufficient presence of mind to disengage herself and give an alarm. Her husband, who had just stepped out, heard her, repeated the alarm, and rushed into the room, followed by the occupants of the room below. The fire was extinguished before any damage was done to the building, but the magnificent painting is a total loss.

Mr. Fassett valued it at \$5,000; it was insured for \$1,000. He had been

at work nearly two years on this painting, and contemplated exhibiting it to our citizens on the 10th.

As it is, his labor is lost, with all his original designs, obtained in the old countries some three years since, and the public deprived of the rich treat which he had promised, and the hope of which had been the inspiration of his artistic genius and skill.

# Where Was the Sampson Hall located?

### The Writing On The Wall

The following list of men had something in common, but what? Their names are hand-written, in pencil, on the third floor walls of a downtown Charlotte building. Could this have been Sampson Hall?

Lodges known at that time were the Good Templars, Charlotte Lodge of Free & Accepted Masons and Odd Fellows. Were they members of the same lodge or were they the crew who built the building?

Lodges Organized in Charlotte 1859-1868 by Mary Jean Baker

Have you ever come across ancestors who were members of a lodge? Did you ever wonder when that lodge might have had their beginning? This information was found in old newspaper accounts. Perhaps one of those listed was your ancestor!

The Charlotte Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons was organized in Charlotte the last of June, 1859. Officers elected were: F.E. Leiter (W.M.), J.Q.A. Sessions (S.W.), E. S. Lacey (J.W.), Tracey Case (Sec'y), E. S. Lacey, (Treas.), W. C. Foster (S.D.), P. Kauffman (J.D.), B. E. Rich (Tiler)

On February 3, 1860, there was an election of the Charlotte Masonic Lodge No. 120 - F.&A.M. These men were elected.

E.S. Lacey, J.Q.A. Sessions, F. E. Leiter, Tracey Case, C. Cummings, W.C. Foster, P. Kauffman, J.P. Cessna, Edgar E. Ellis & B.E. Rich.

Good Templars, another early organization, was organized in Charlotte in June of 1860. Thirty charter members joined. Officers elected were: Henry Baughman (W.G.C.), Chas. A. Schafer (W.V.C.), John H. Kimball (W.S.), Thos. Haslett (F.S.) & Miss E. White (W.T.)

By August 10, 1860 the following were officers of the **Good** 

Templars: Stephen White, Lewis Nobel, M.H. Marsh, Miss D. Sweeney, Geo. Tausler, H. Baughman, J.M. Haslett, A.L. Hines, T.L. Curtis, Mrs. Jas. Johnson & Mrs. A.L. Hines.

Names listed in Masonic Lodge No. 120 F.&A.M. in December 1864 included: E.S. Lacey, E.A. Foote, W.C. Foster, G. V. Collins, A.J. Ives, E. T. Church, N.A. Johnson, J. F. Hirshman, A.H. Kester & R. H. Kinney.

February 1865 in Lodge No. 90 I.O.G.T. (Good Templars) were: Robert Curry & Lewis Stine.

Where did these lodges meet? A March 4, 1868 newspaper ad tells that the Charlotte Lodge, No. 90, I.O.G.T. held meetings every Monday p.m. in the **Old Cummings' Block**, third story.

Wednesday, 25 March 1868 the Good Templars have leased the third story of E.T. Church & Co.'s new brick bldg. (Dry Goods & Groceries)

An encampment of the **Grand Army of the Republic** was
organized in Charlotte March 30,
1868. It will hold meetings every
Tuesday P.M. at **Templar's Hall**,
over **Boltons Store** (Dry Goods). All
soldiers honorably discharged are
invited to join.

# Where Did You Get That Date? By Rhonda R. McClure

If you have attended more than one lecture whether at a local genealogy society or at the larger national multi-day conferences, you have heard something about source situation. We are encouraged to cite sources. There are books out on this subject. Yet, still there are people who refuse to cite sources, especially the sources they found on the Internet or through a GEDCOM database collection.

The internet is made up of millions of Web pages devoted to things genealogical. A large percentage of those pages are the compiled family histories of fellow researchers like you and I. They have spent months and years in search of those elusive ancestors. They have taken the time to compile the information into their genealogy software program and have now placed the information on the Internet.

We come along and take notice of their Web site. We are intrigued because they appear to have solved the research problem that has been plaguing us for years now. As we investigate further, we cannot tell how they have been able to come to this conclusion. No bother, we add that information into our data and go merrily along.

This is, unfortunately, an all too familiar tale. It happens so often that there is a lot of misinformation floating around the Internet. I incorporate the information into my data. I create a GEDCOM file that I upload to WorldConnect. You come along and download the GEDCOM file and incorporate it into your data and then publish it to a Web page. The cycle goes round and round, as each new person just incorporates the information.

What is about the Internet that seems to make us believe that the rules of evidence no longer apply? Are we swayed by the pretty pictures and dancing leprechauns? Is it that the page looks professional so therefore it must be true?

There is a basic tenet in genealogy that should never be forsaken for modern technology. Cite your sources. Demand that other cite them too. Don't just accept, on faith, what another publishes on the Internet. Don't be swayed by those fancy graphics. When you find information online that has no source citation, ask the publisher where they found the information.

How can you evaluate a person's research when they have not shown you the records used? You can't. As a result, I find myself cynical of any information posted to such a site, just as I question any published, undocumented, family history in periodicals or books.

The Internet is just another way to publish our family history. It allows us the opportunity to publish before we are finished. It allows others to come along and perhaps offer some additional information. but before we take any of this new information and incorporate it into our own data, it is essential that we be hones in evaluating the site from where we get the data.

Was the site documented? If not, then you know that you will need to verify the information before you add it to your main database. I have always kept miscellaneous type databases to dump unverified information into. Once I have been able to verify the information then I incorporate it into my main database.

What is the focus of the site? Some sites are up just because they can put them up. This is not to say that the research is not good, but when combined with a lock of documentation, you must be suspect of any information found on such a site.

Just because it is in print does not mean that it is true. Take off the rose colored glasses and be honest when working with your family history, especially online where it is all to easy to add names, dates, and places to your own database.

### Heritage Help July 2001 Efficiently Using Records By Amy Johnson Crow, CG

Recently, I was reading messages from a county listsery. A subscriber asked for the most efficient way to look up land records to find if a person sold land and left the area. "Would it be looking in the grantor index for the last entry for that person?" the researcher proposed.

In genealogy, and indeed often in life itself, we confuse "efficient" with "fast." Merriam-Webster Online Dictionary list one meaning of "Efficient" as "productive without waste." 1 Note that the definition does not include anything about speed. Yet in our research, we often think that having a quick solution is the most efficient method. Land records are a case where a quick solution can cost time in the long run.

Deeds often list the residence of the grantor (seller) and the grantee (buyer). When trying to trace where a person went, his last sale of land may give the clue, as many people would hold on to a piece of land in the old location while establishing themselves in the new location. Based on this, it would seem reasonable to find the last entry in the grantor index. But what if that last index entry wasn't his last disposition of property?

The best way to do land research is to get all of the deeds pertaining to that person and then analyze the deeds to be certain that you have accounted for all the land. Can you find deeds that account for him selling all of the land he acquired? If not, how did he get rid of the rest of it? It could have been through inheritance, gift or legal proceedings resulting in a sheriff's sale. Land transfers through inheritance and gift are supposed to be recorded, but sometimes they weren't.

If he lost it in a sheriff's sale, the grantor is likely going to be listed as the sheriff of the county. Likewise, if it was sold through an estate administrator or executor, it might be listed under that person's name. Though the

deed is supposed to be listed under the name of the deceased, it didn't always work that way. Also, deeds with multiple grantors (as is often the case when heirs are selling their claims) may be indexed only by the name of the first grantor listed in the deed.

Take this example to the next step. What if you have him selling more land than you can find him purchasing? How did he obtain all of it? Was it a gift or inheritance? Did he purchase it directly from the federal government and did not record his entry locally?

When the land cannot be accounted for, other records will need to be consulted to help fill in the gaps. Some countries have geographic indexes, sometimes called "Range Books." Rather than an index of grantors and grantees, these indexes are based on the location of the land. Reading these indexes can help you find the "hidden" deeds-- those deeds that you could not find because they are listed under a different name, such as the county sheriff or an administrator.

If the county of interest does not have a geographic index, tax lists can be used in much the same way. Instead of reading them for your ancestor's name, read them for the geographic description of the land to find the previous or the next owner. County atlases and other land ownership maps can also be used for clues to identify other owners and help you track down hidden deeds.

Why should you go to all this trouble? First, if your ancestor lost his land in a sheriff's sale for back taxes after he moved to Indiana, you may not find this last disposal of his land by simply looking for his last entry in the grantor index. Second, you never know which purchase or which sale is going to have the tidbit of information that you are looking for. If an ancestor did intestate, the heirs may not have recorded the sale of their claim at the same time. While several of the deeds may list the grantors as heirs of Ezekiel Cumberbund, deceased, there may be one deed that states the relation ship is "children of Ezekiel Cumberbund, deceased.'

Full research in land records is not achieved by taking a fast peek in just the grantor or grantee indexes. Doing a quick search may cause you to later have to re-examine those records-- and backtracking in research is seldom being "efficient."

"How We Received The News"

April 14th ----Tuesday ---- was the 47th anniversary of the outbreak of the Civil War, and just four year later, on the same date, occurred the assassination of President Lincoln.

At the Grand Army banquet on Lincoln's birthday last February, Mrs. E. L. Mills read some verses composed by her late husband when the news of the terrible tragedy reached him while serving at the front. Herbert L. Mills enlisted in August, 1861, and his final discharge was in April, 1866, showing the longest term of service of any member of Lewis Clark Post. The later years of his life were spent in Olivet, an almost helpless invalid, the result of harshils endured in the war. The verses referred to are as follows.

Written at Memphis, Tenn., on the 16th of April, 1865, just after receiving the new of the assassination of President Lincoln.

This Sabbath morning we were joyous, Talking of the victories won And the day that we'd start homeward, When our soldier's work was done.

Talking of the pleasant welcome
With which our friends would greet us,
Wondering if that day was far away,
And how loved ones would meet us.

Thus together we were talking,
When suddenly there came a pause,
In vain we looked in each one's face,
Wondering what could be the cause.

Till we saw the flags of Pickering Slowly sinking to half mast, Telling us of some disaster, When we thought all danger past.

Still we knew not who had fallen, We await in dread to hear, Little dreaming it was Lincoln, Of his death we had no fear.

At last came the news offical, And our colonel broke it to us, Also bidding us be manly, And not let this blow undo us.

Low sank our hearts within our breasts, Sad grew each face, stern each brow, Then low muttering of revenge, Many a one hath made a vow

To make all traitors, North or South,
Pay, with their blood for this dark crime.
To hunt them out wheree'r they be,
Though it should take till end of time.

### CHARLOTTE HIGH SCHOOL 1841-1937

It was on a gently sloping prairie land that a little band of courageous settlers began the struggle to lay the present prosperous city of Charlotte. By May, 1841, a school board was elected and plans were begun for a means of education. The thrifty board decided that a new building was to much of a financial responsibility, so an old building was secured, which was the second structure to be built in the village, set up the educational suystem to be in operation three months annually. This building had but one window and boards were nailed to the inside of the walls to make long seats facing the In these meager quarters a teacher, Miss Jane Gallery, was hired for the unbelievable sum of \$1.25 weekly.

As time went on the school board was forced to move that a tax amounting to one hundred dollars be raised to build a new schoolhouse. Strange as this seems now to us, this building was to be 18 x 26 feet and 10 feet high. Upon completion of the building 21 students, ranging from five to

seventeen years of age were in attendance there. Remarkably liberal sums for those time of \$1.08 to \$1.50 per week were reveived by variouys teachers during the next few years.

### Johnson is Founder

I 1846 William Johnson, popularly, know as "Printer "Johnson, started a high school in the front of his office. Being a man of high intellectual ability he created enthusiasm and interest in this school. As a branch of this school a stock company was formed and became incorporated into the Charlotte Academy.

For a new building to accommodate the growing interest in education Mr. McComb donated the land and a bell and the contract was given to Nathan Johnson who built the academy with out physical aid. He industriously worked in the winter as best as he could and it was not until 1850 that the academy was completed into what seemed a masterpiece of art. By 1859 a grade school was organized which was known as the Union school with Henry Robinson as moderator. This inturn called for a larger building but it wasn't until 1866 that \$14,000 was raised and the final cost amounted to \$20,000.

### **ANNEX BUILT**

This building remained in used until 1913 when the back part of it was torn down and a modern structure was annexed. This building was passably convenient with a cherished auditorium in which all plays and entertainments were held.

Again the inevitable happened and the new again replaced the old when conditions became crowded and inefficient and so in 1936 the school board and the tax papers of the community decided to raise funds for a new building. This building furnished almost every possible added advantage for education and convenience.

With a roll of over five hundred and fifty, a high standard, a member of the University of Michigan accredited list, the school is becoming the civic center and attraction of the enitre community and with all its added improvements it is indeed a credit to those who founded it.

Judge Henry A. Shaw

Judge Henry A. Shaw, the veteran attorney of Eaton Rapids, died of general debility at his home last Thursday age 72 years, 7 months and 8 days and his funeral was held on Sunday, February 1st. Mr. Shaw was a native of Vermont, removing there from to Ohio at the age of sixteen. He began the study of law at the age of fifteen years but taught several terms of school and completed an academic education before his admission to the bar. In 1842 his health failed and he came west (for Michigan was popularly supposed to be in the west at that time) with a flock of 850 sheep. These he sold at Eaton Rapids, Charlotte and Vermontville at a time when there were not over 200 sheep owned in Eaton and Barry counties. Before his return he invested in real estate and ever since was an extensive land holder in this county. He was admitted to the bar in 1846 and continued in active practice for over forty years. He was always actively interested in the enterprises which helped to develop this county and aided largely in the construction of the two Eaton Rapids railroads. In 1856 Mr. Shaw was sent to the legislature and at once took a leading part in the councils of state. Few men have been more instrumental in suggesting more or better laws than he. During his first term he introduced the following important bills: for an independent supreme court, for making the probate office a salaried office, for the relief of religious societies, for the laying out of highways under the constitution of 1857 and for the invention of grand juries. During this session he was the chairman of the judiciary committee and was re-elected by a very flattering vote. In his second term he was elevated to the speakership. In 1865 he was again sent to the legislature and again served as chairman of the judiciary committee. He served as Probate judge for eight years, as president, trustee and attorney of Eaton Rapids village, president of

the Eaton county Agricultural Society and he helped to organize the county pioneer society. Mr. Shaw served for a time in the war of the rebellion and was a pensioner. He was an able man, a man who was true to this county and state, and among all the pleasant recollections of his life work he was proud to enumerate among the able lawyers trained by him in his office, O.M. Barnes, I.M. Crane, M.V. Montgomery, O.F. Price, of Illionis and Anson Bronson, of California.

### Men We Know

Rev. Wolcott B. Williams, the pioneer minister of Charlotte, was born on a farm in Brooklyn, Connecticut, on the 13th of August, 1823. Until 13 years of age he attended the district schools and the academy, which was two and a half miles distant. He then removed with his parents to Laport county, Ind. The country was new and the schools were few and poor. For several years he worked on the farm summmers and in winter attended school in the log school houses. During these years much of his life was spent in the open air just at the time when he was growing most rapidly and thus he acquire the robust health that has been so valuable all through life.

When 17 years of age he taught a winter school at eleven dollars a month and board. and after the fashion of those days boarded round. The next winter he received fourteen a month in the same district. After this for two fall terms he attended a select school at Michigan City taught by Rev. James Towner; one term he boarded in a club and the other he tended the light-house for his board, for besides the select school, Rev. Towner held the office of light-house keeper. There was at that time no harbor at Michigan City but large quantities of wheat and corn were shipped from that point and the vessels would come to anchor about a half mile from there and stretching a cable to the pier were loaded by means of lighters pulled and poled back and forth. By working night and day vessels could be loaded in about twenty-four or thirty-six hours; Laborers were paid at the rate of a shilling an hour in the day time and eighteen cents for night work. Money was very scarce among the boys in these days and young Williams and other students were glad to avail themselves of these opportunities to earn a little spending money.

About the year 1840 an "underground railroad" was laid from Missouri to Detroit and Mr. Williams made several trips as conductor on this road. His was a night run of about eighteen miles. In the year 1842 Mr. Webster concluded a treaty with Great Britain by which the right to search vessels was denied and after that when slaves were once on board a propelier in Chicago they were as safe as though in Canada. This greatly shortend the hoe (?) and wholly broke down the track east of Chicago.

When Mr. Williams was 20 years of age, he felt that he must have a better education if he continued to teach school. He had heard of Oberlin and that a young man could work his way there, and he determined to go there and spend a couple of years in studing the English branches. Oberlin was more than 300 miles away and the journey was to be made on foot over muddy roads. He left home March 27, 1844, with a sachel filled with books and clothing strapped upon his back, an umbrella in one hand a a bag of provisions in the other. He secured a ride only 40 of the 300 miles. His bedding and other things were to be sent round by water to Cleveland as soon as navigation opened. Meantime he was an entire stranger in town and had not money enough to pay for lodgings at a hotel. He found at once a place to work for his board and looking into the barn of his landlady, he found there a pile of hay, so after the studies of the first day were over he went down to the barn and slept there. The next day the kind woman for whom he worked inquired into his affairs and offered him the use of a straw bed and comfortables until his own goods arrived and by forming a partership with another student he was comfortabley lodged the next night in a room in the college building. In the fall he returned home having been gone eight months and traveled over 600 miles. He left no debts behind him and aside from what he earned his expenses for the time were only twenty-four dollars and twelve of these went The summer's contact with for tuition. college life, however, awakened a love for study and he entered upon the regular college course and graduated from the college in 1850 and from the theological department in 1853. On the 5th of October following he was married to Mary A Thompson, of Buffalo, New York. He had previously accepted a call to the newly

organized church in this city, then a village. He began his pastorate here on New Years day 1854. At that time the church here had only sixteen members and there was no house of worship of any kind within ten miles of the place. The following year, after a hard struggle, a house of worship was built costing \$1,000. This is now occupied by the Lutherans. Mr. Williams remained pastor for thirteen years. Soon after the close of the war he resigned his pastorate to accept an agency for the American Missionary Association which was then planting schools among the children of the freedmen of the late slave states. Previous to entering upon the work he spent a month in visiting the schools in Nashville, Chattanooga, Macon, While in Andersonville and Memphis. Atlanta he deliverd the dedication address to the "Stoors school -----the first school house ever built for colored children in Georgia, and also assisted, in the ordination of Rev. E.A. Ware, who was for so many years at the head of that school board.

Two years later Mr. Williams was appointed superintendent of missions by the American Home Missionary Society with southern and eastern Michigan for his field. In this work he continued ten years. He has been quite successful in raising money and has helped over 70 churches to raise money to pay off their debts. He also raised the greater part of the money for the present Congregational church in this city. In 1878 he attempted to raise the endowment, for a professorship in the Oberlin Theological seminary and about eighteen months secured some \$19,000.

In 1880 he accepted an appointment as agent for Olivet college, in which work he is still engaged. In 1887 he succeded in raising a subscription of \$100,000 for the college. Mr. Williams was a member of the first school loard and assisted in organizing the union schools of this city. He also served fourteen years on the board of trustees of Oberlin college and for over thirty has been one of the trustee of Olivet college.

It was he who first called attention to the site of the Maple Hill cemetery and led to its purchase and tasteful platting.

He had four children Alice Thompson who died in infancy, Edith Burr who died in her twentieth year, and Sarah and Herbert who still survive.

# Query:

Bad Fire at Brookfield Eight Business Places Burned

At about 10 oclock Sunday night our neighboring village. Brookfield, was visited by a bad fire which wiped out nearly all of the business portion.

Eight buildings on the west side of the street were totally destroyed. Fire was first discovered in the rear of Rhubery's agricultural store. With no effective fire apparatus at hand the flames spread rapidly and soon enveloped the whole block. The buildings were of wood and iron and were occupied, starting from north as follows:

Dr. C.S. Sackett, office; C.W. Merkle, drugstore; Sherman Bros., groceries and hardware; F.H. Rhubery, agricultural implements; Wm. Burnett, barber shop; H. Moshier. blacksmith; Mr. Beardsley, residence; Ezekiel Kellog, over Dr. Sackett's office, lost all household goods. The Shermans who lived over their store barely escaped with their lives.

The total loss will approximate \$10,000 with an insurance of probably \$4,000.

Mr. Goff of this place owned one of the buildings but his loss is nearly covered by insurance. This is a bad blow to this new and hustling village. It is not yet known whether the buildings will be replaced.
