

This list has been compiled and is forwarded to you, under instructions contained in a Joint Resolution of the Legislature of Michigan, approved January 17, 1862. The delay in procuring returns from the Regiments in the field, together with a desire to add to the list the names of volunteers enlisting in Regiments which have been mustered into service during the fall months, necessarily deferred the completion of the record beyond the time originally contemplated.

Information concerning the residence of the volunteers whose names are given, as well as that in regard to their being married or unmarried, is based (with the exceptions hereafter noted,) upon special returns to this Department, verified by the commanding officers of companies.

The details of casualties are derived from the same special returns, and from the regular "Monthly Returns" of Regiments. Although noted on official authority, there may be occasional errors, in exceptional cases, especially in the record of deaths, as struggles on a march, or after an engagement, and disabled soldiers absent without the knowledge of their officers, are sometimes, under the right rules of the service, accounted for as deserters where no other information concerning them can be procured. These instances, however, are but rare.

The special returns which have been referred to as showing the residence of volunteers, are wanting in the cases of Company B, First Infantry; Companies A, B, C and D, Ninth Infantry; First, Fourth and Fifth Batteries; and Willet's Sharpshooters. The place of enlistment, as shown by the muster rolls, is given as the residence of the men in these companies.

Except in a very few instances, casualties reported since the 30th of September, have not been entered on these lists. It was necessary to adopt a uniform period at which the record should cease, and a later date could not safely be fixed.

These lists include the Infantry Regiments, from the First to the Twenty-Sixth inclusive; the Cavalry, from the First to the Sixth inclusive; the First Mechanics and Engineers; the two Michigan companies in the "Merrill Horse"; the Batteries, First to Ninth inclusive; all the Michigan Sharpshooters (six companies) now in active service; McDermott's Company in the Mulligan (Ill.) Regiment; and the "Stanton Guard," enlisted to guard rebel prisoners at Mackinac—now disbanded. The First Regiment of Three Months' volunteers was mustered out of service before these books were contemplated, and left no record of the residence of those connected with it. The Twenty-Seventh and Twenty-Eighth Infantry, Seventh, Eighth and Ninth Cavalry, First Sharpshooters, and the Tenth and Eleventh Batteries, yet incomplete and remaining in the State, together with the Recruits which have joined Regiments in the field since July 1st, 1862, will be included, should the present system continue, in future lists similar in character to this.

Companies from this State, numbering in the aggregate over 1,200 men, who joined Regiments of other States during the year 1861, are not included in these lists, the organizations to which they are attached not being embraced in the records of this Department, and having no official connection therewith.

The entire number of names which have been classified under the Resolution of the Legislature, and which are now sent in separate lists to the several counties in the State, is 36,150. The men in each company and regiment are classed together.

It can hardly be necessary to impress upon the county officers who are made the custodians of these books, the importance of their preservation. This is not only due to the brave men whose names are enrolled in them, but should be a matter of pride on the part of the county. Fifty years hence, the public records will contain no more interesting memorials of the present age than are herewith entrusted to your safe-keeping.

That a professional photograph was taken of her in Buffalo which appears to be close to that time -- posing the question, by family or the institution?

That Mother remained at the Lotus Home in Buffalo, New York until October 14, 1800, just 6 days after her 5th birthday, when the children of the Buffalo Home were transferred to Point Loma, California, where the Lotus Home had been moved.

That she could remember the trip West on a train with a private nurse and sleeping in a "**Dr. Denton**" sleeper.

That it was shortly after her arrival at Point Loma that her name was changed to **Cora Mercer** by directress **Katherine Tingley**.

That her altered name and birthplace were used even on the legal document of her Marriage Certificate in 1918.

That there is a degree of mystery surrounding it all.....

Question: How did Mother get from Bridgeport, CN to Buffalo, NY ?

Was she orphaned in Bridgeport and brought to Buffalo, as suggested by the wounded soldier scenario? Did she have relatives in either state? Please indulge me some speculation based on the info at hand.

Yes, it could have been as simple as the story told Mother -- that both of her parents were killed in an accident, and that she, being orphaned, was put in an orphan home for "destitute and homeless" children. The encyclopedia confirms that Mrs. Tingley "established relief forwounded soldiers and for orphaned children".

Therefore, the deduction would be that, although enrollment costs were high for Point Loma - being a "sort of theosophical colony" with academy and such, that the orphanage itself was a charitable service not requiring fee (an impossibility for most orphans), a prospect that could indicate that money was not necessarily a factor in Mother's placement there.

So, why doubt the simplicity of the explanation? My answer to this is another question. Why were Mother's name and birthplace changed, altered - for all practical purposes falsified and hidden from her? Could it have been merely a custom of their society to give a new identity to its followers and/or orphans, as is that of some Mideastern religions today - as demonstrated in boxing champ Muhammad Ali, who was born Cassius Clay, and L.A. Lakers star Lew Alcindor, who chose to become Kareem Abdul-Jabbar?

If that were not the case, however, the alternatives are few - barring it being simply a personal notion of **Mrs. Tingley** - and seem to lean toward protecting a family name from the stigma of an illegitimate birth. And while there is the possibility that there were no other living relatives (although Mother's memories seemed to imply otherwise) - if there were, why didn't they choose to care for her themselves; or if too poor, to at least be openly involved in her life?

The most logical reason, again, might have been an effort to "save face" - reputation being of extreme importance in past years. Or, of course, money. If not the lack of, not wishing to share the wealth.

The unexplained attentiveness and helpfulness of the **Bonn** family to Mother over the years may have raised some of these questions. But if that was a sense of obligation or "family", it was not made known.

So, back to square one.....

It must have been quite a "comedown" to leave all this behind and move to Michigan. For a while they tried to keep it alive with playing in the orchestra and having stringed instrument practice at our house, and Mother playing organ at church.

After the family expanded beyond the first three kids they had to give it up, and life became a drudge for both of them. But we were a family for 23 years.

Mother had an incredible attitude about accepting responsibility. She never shirked, ever, and this strength came from her philosophy

which was unquestioning and never verbalized. I have always been envious of her for that because it makes life so much easier.

Also she was full of "down-to-earth" hard sayings, such as "A stitch in time saves nine", "Haste makes waste", "Never say can't" - and on, and on, and on. As a child I got so tired of hearing them because she was always right.

When Mother named me **Elizabeth Mae** she didn't know it was her name also. It had to be a psychic thing - buried in the subconscious.

She always kept the photo of herself and one of me, each taken when we were about three years old, side by side on her dresser all the while I was growing up. I always hoped I would have them someday, and I'm so happy now to be able to share them.

Dear Ole' Michigan.... I'm transported back to my childhood and our summer vacations at the lake. The various men in the family had pooled their energy and talent into building a summer cottage on the shore of Wall Lake, and we all took turns having vacations there.

It was so beautiful and so very special - I loved being there. I can almost smell the air and hear the birds singing.

Or we'd all picnic at Pine Lake - Aunt Margaret, Mother, Dad and Grandpa looking snappy in their bow ties, Grandma and sister Ida, Grandpa's relative **Uncle Fred Tirell** and wife - **Mason, Frances**, and myself. In

those days people dressed up to go to a picnic - nice.....

I've had a problem - difficulty extracting myself from the cozy, warm covers on a cold morning. Even as a child, when Winter would roll around I'd like to be rolled up in a cocoon until Spring.

Mother always had a terrible time getting me up in the morning. And when I was grown up I took and loved night jobs.

But I loved the snow when I was a kid. I recently enjoyed an article called "Great Snows", and was able to relive some days of my childhood.

My Snow Sculpture was a result of a "great snow" - of 1939.....It had snowed all day and into the night and next morning - one of those warm, fluffy snows with large flakes building up 4-5-6 inches. And then about 9:00 in the morning the sun started to come out. So I had to go out and check the conditions, because every Christmas vacation I always built something. One year it was a slide, and another year a skating practice rink, and another time a fort - complete with piles of snowball ammunition. I tested the snow with a small ball and it was wonderful how it built into a large ball. By the time I rolled it halfway to the front yard it was too big for me to push, so John helped me roll the balls.

They became very large - the Santa in the sleigh was one ball ! Each pair of reindeer were a single ball. By the time the balls got that big it took John and Alice and myself to

push them. I did the carving with a butcher knife from the kitchen. When it was done it just didn't look right without some kind of color. So I had the kids help me "dye" Santa sort of red with some wet, red crepe paper, and for the reindeer we took muddy slush from the gutter and smeared it on them.

Well, the project attracted some attention, and the local newspaper sent a reporter out to interview me. They put a little story in the paper - which I have somewhere in my archives. I couldn't have done it without the kids' help, and I made that clear to the reporter, and they were mentioned in the article. (I don't think John ever knew that.) It was quite an experience.

Our home was plain and utilitarian like many of the homes you see in the Midwest. What was special was what was inside. That is where the memories are, and seeing a picture of it brings them back for a brief moment - a picture of our humble home and to the left our 2 story barn that was full of all kinds of interesting things - including our ducks. Mother and I always put things out for the birds in the wintertime.

When I was a child growing up all the relatives were within walking distance and all got together at a huge table for Thanksgiving. It was nice and very warm.

I read a tribute to "Meadowlawn Farm" by Carol and shed some tears for my own home that once was. It leaves me brokenhearted to this day. It's so old it's probably been torn down by now.

Andrew P. Green

Green. ----At his residence on Prairie street, Thursday morning, April 28, 1892, of nephritis of the kidneys, Mr. **Andrew P. Green**, aged 53 years.

In the death of Mr. Green, Charlotte loses one of her best citizens and his family a most exemplary husband and father. Sorrow over his death is general and wide-spread, and the family have the deepest sympathy of everyone. Although Mr. Green's health had been feeble for a number of years, his death seemed sudden as he was on the streets until within a week of his death. The remains were viewed by a large number of friends Saturday afternoon and the funeral, which was held at the Congregational church on Sunday morning, under the auspices of the Knights Templar and G. A. R., **Rev. H. S. Roblee** preaching the funeral discourse, and it was one of the largest attended that has ever occurred in this city. The following sketch of Mr. Green which appeared in the Tribune of September 25, 1888, will be read with interest at this time:

Andrew Perry Green was born November 7, 1840, in Madison, Lake county, Ohio. His parents were **Amos M. Green** and **Sarah Lockwood Green**. His early home was on the banks of Lake Erie where he could see passing vessels at all hours of the day. Many happy days

of his boyhood were spent in playing with his brothers in the water and on the sandy beach of the lake. Andrew and his brother Philip, now **Dr. P. I. Green**, of Vermontville, were always together. They began to do work for other people when very young, husking corn, riding horses to plow out corn, and gathering chestnuts to buy boots, etc., poverty being the constant companion of the family. Yet there was never lack of food or bed. The necessities were provided by all being at the wheel. The old adage was often repeated --"He who eats must work." When eleven years of age, a revival in religion found Andrew among the eight boys converted, and at the age of thirteen he joined the Baptist church. As the family grew older the few acres of land seemed inadequate to their increasing needs and in 1853 the home by the lake was left forever and a farm of 100 acres purchased and located in Vermontville, Michigan. There was no building on this place save an old log house which, with its leaky roof, initiated the family into the Methodist custom of sprinkling and pouring which was not entirely pleasing to a Baptist family, and a new log house was built in the woods. The summers and falls were spent in hard labor, interspersed with hunting and fishing. In the winter, three months were passed in the old log school house on the hill where Andrew gained his first instruction in the three R's -- reading, 'riting and 'rithmetic. In 1856 with his brother Philip, he began going to school at Olivet college. Together they had saved \$33, and by boarding (-----was cut off the article)

this amount was made to meet the extra expenses of their new life. In the winter, of '59 Andrew was a pupil of Philip in the Hovey district in Benton, Andrew chopping wood to pay for his board. The following fall found both the boys at Olivet and the next winter Andrew taught the Hovey school, earning \$60, all but \$5 of which was given to his father to build a barn. In 1860 the exciting campaign was the all absorbing topic; the cloud of war was lowering and during the winter while teaching in his own district he, with other boys, was seriously considering the questions before the country. School closed and the young schoolmaster, eager to go deeper into knowledge, decided to go to Albion college. A gentleman by the name of Sprague, who owned a scholarship, kindly offered it to him and this with \$50 of his own earning offered excellent opportunities. School began but for him it was of short duration. **Abraham Lincoln** called for 75,000 soldiers. Fort Sumpter had fallen. All was excitement and after five weeks he enlisted at Marshall in the 1st. Michigan Infantry under **Captain Devillo Hubbard**. An accident on the cars, in which he nearly lost his life, sent him to be cared for by loving parents, who up to this time had not knowledge of his enlistment. On August 5, 1861, he again enlisted in Co. H. 6th Michigan Infantry, going to Baltimore, Fortress Monroe, Ship Island, New Orleans, battle of Baton Rouge, Storming of Port Hudson and Banks' Red River campaign. He was commissioned first lieutenant in 10th colored heavy artillery. In May, 1865, his father died and, resigning his position, he

came home to care for his mother and sisters and work the farm. On January 1, 1866, he married **Lydia A. Sprague** and moved into the old log house where his mother died about two years after. Three children were born to Mr. and Mrs. Green -----**Jennie, Myron and Walter**. Mr. Green is one of those father who know how to keep close to the hearts of his children and is one of the men which **Frances Willard** says has strayed into this generation to show us the possibilities of the coming man in the home. Close application to farming, combined with the economy learned in early life, brought financial success to Mr. Green. He was often elected to responsible offices in the township; was school inspector, justice of the peace, supervisor for six years, and chairman of the board of supervisors for two years. In 1878 he was elected to the office of register of deeds and moved to this city, where he has since lived. He was re-elected in 1880. He was elected superintendent of the M. E. Sabbath school in 1879, which position he held for years but was finally compelled to resign because of poor health. He was a member of the school board in this city for six years, during five of which he was director, declining to take the office longer. In 1882 he formed a partnership in the hardware business with **A. M. Barber** and **George Foreman**. In 1887 failing health compelled him to sell his interest and he went to Dakota in hopes that a change of climate might afford relief. While Mr. Green has been in poor health for years, caused from malarial disease contracted in the swamps of Louisiana, he has never

applied for a pension but believes that a soldiers are entitled to consideration and that Uncle Sam will soon pass a general pension law. Mr. Green has always been a republican. He is a member of and adjutant in the G. A. R. and also a member of Charlotte Commandery Knights Templar in which he holds the office of prelate.

King-----At her home in Carmel, on Thursday, April 7, 1892, of erysipelas, **Mrs. Esther King**, widow of the late **J. F. King**, aged about sixty years.

Mrs. King had been confined to her chair, unable to walk, for eleven years, and was a very patient sufferer. The funeral was held Saturday, from the house, **Rev. H. S. Roblee** officiating.

Potterville

Emily A. McKenney was born in Windsor, Eaton county, Mich., February 17, 1851, was married to **William H. Vanauken** May 1, 1875, and died at her home in Potterville March 25, 1892. Mrs. Vanauken had been a great sufferer for the last few years of her life, and though her death was not entirely unexpected, it was sudden. She was converted to the christian faith in early life and was an earnest and active worker in church, Sabbath School and the temperance cause. The funeral, by her pastor, **Rev. Smith**, assisted by **Rev. Appleton**, was held from the home, on Saturday, and was largely attended. The husband, two daughters, **Alice and May**, and a large circle of relatives and friends are left to mourn her loss.





THREE SUDDEN DEATHS IN FAMILY

Maria Horton and Lucy Bennett were Aunts of Will Boyer. All Die Few Hours Apart.

Boyer Sustained Fractured Skull in Nose Dive Down Stairs: Mrs. Horton Burned to Death.

Three sudden deaths, within a few hours apart, occurred in the well known Boyer family the first of the week. **Will Boyer**, 57, who occupied the rear rooms over the Carr Monument Works on Lawrence Ave., fell down stairs shortly after midnight Saturday and was dead when his front apartment neighbor, **Jas. Van Ornum**, stepped in Monday morning to see how **Boyer** was feeling. **Boyer** had died some time during the night from a fractured skull sustained at the time of his fall. The same morning **Boyer's** aunt, **Mrs. Maria Horton**, 79, of Sunfield, who lived alone since her widowhood was burned to death. She was partially dressed to go to the funeral of her sister when her clothing, in some manner, caught fire. **Mrs. Horton** ran out of the house calling for help and then dashed back in the house. She was dead from the burns by the time the fire department arrived. **Fire Chief R. N. Wiggins** said **Mrs. Horton** had carefully arranged her best clothing the night before and was in the act of dressing

when a spark from one of the two stoves must have contacted her.

Boyer Gets Double Indemnity

Because he was killed accidentally **Will Boyer's** family, consisting of a widow and two children, living at 107 Foote street, will receive \$2500; \$2000 from the Gleaners and \$500 from an accident policy. **Mrs. Bennett** recently received her first old age assistance check and was extremely happy because of her future accurity. Her burial expenses will be paid from a fund, set apart, by the state agency for persons receiving this type of accurity. **Mrs. Bennett's** funeral was Wednesday; **Mr. Boyer's** funeral was held at the Cheney funeral home on Thursday, and **Mrs. Horton** will be buried on Friday. **Mrs. Horton's** home was not seriously damaged from the flames, according to **Chief Wiggins**.

LETTER FROM OUR VOLUNTEERS.

Camp of the 12th Mich. Inf.
Pittsburg, Tenn., April 23d, 1862

Friend Saunders: ----In my last, I stated that we were to be attached to Gen. Hurlburt's division, but the programme was changed and we are now attached to Logan's Brigade of Gen. McClelland's division. I hope we have a much better general than we had before. I have serious reasons for believing that Gen. Prentiss is a traitor. The rebels have got him now, and I hope they will keep him until the war is over, when he should be tried by a court martial. Two days before the fight, when the rebel forces were concentrating in our front, Gen. Sherman's pickets were attacked by the rebel cavalry, several killed and several taken prisoners. This took place so near some of our pickets that they could hear the words of command given by the combatants, and thereupon Gen. Prentiss ordered them in, and we were left all night without pickets.

If we could have known that the rebels were there, as we ought to have known it, we could have entrenched ourselves in twenty-four hours so as to have been impregnable. We were encamped in the woods and could have made a solid log-heap along our front in a very few hours. If Gen. Prentiss is not a traitor, he is certainly a very bad General. I have waited a long time before making any strictures on

his conduct, but the more I scan it over, the more I am convinced that he is a black-hearted traitor. Rebel spies in our camps have been abundant, many of whom have been captured. I can have no doubt but that they went back and forth with his knowledge and permission. After the battle, when our men took the matter into their own hands, they found no trouble in arresting a plenty of them.

But enough of the past--- let us look forward with hope to the future. Everything now indicates the intention of a speedy advance on the enemy. Gen. Pope has arrived with his army, roads are being repaired, bridges built over streams and sloughs to facilitate the movement of heavy artillery, and a general rigor of discipline being adopted in all the camps, to keep skulking cowards in their proper places.

Our Reg't is at present wholly unfit for duty, not having a hundred effective fighting men in it. The prevailing difficulty is diarrhea. The doctors find themselves wholly unable to check it, and nature's acclimating process goes on in spite of them. If medical slops are a nuisance any where, they are doubly so in the army. The old tin cup is passed around and every man compelled to take a spoonful, irrespective of his ailments; the principle being to do something and not let the sick die without having something done for them. And this I believe is usually satisfactory to nine-tenths of mankind.

I feel quite impossible to get a correct list of the soldiers in this Regiment from Eaton County, but I am acquainted with nearly all of the them, and none are dangerously ill

at present. For the benefit of our friends in the county I would say that our proper address is as follows: 12th Reg't Mich. Inf. Co. -----, Army of West Tennessee, Via. St. Louis, Missouri. And we would be heartily glad to receive communications from one and all. Do write and let us know that we are not entirely forgotten.

W. H. Bailey, a private in Comp. D. 3d Mich. Inf., writes to us, from before Yorktown, acknowledging the regular receipt of the *Republican*, and giving items and incidents that would be interesting had they not been anticipated by telegraphic reports. He speaks of much hard labor being expended on the fortifications, the men working directly in range of the rebels' guns; of a shell weighing near 100 lbs. being thrown into the camp; and the whole letter is written in a cheerful and hopeful spirit. He says that "Near the camp is a steam saw mill, which was abandoned on the approach of our army. It was evident that it had but just been abandoned, for the water was warm in the boiler when we reached it. An engineer, fireman, and sawyers, were found in a moment, in Comp. I, of our regiment, and were placed in the mill, which was soon as busily employed as ever, sawing lumber for the building of hospitals, officers' quarters, etc. It stands in plain view of the rebel camps and tauntingly puffs away, as busily as when working for them. There is some considerable sickness in our

regiment, but none seriously ill. It is thought that the ball will open soon, then once more we try the mettle of the southern chivalry."

Old Co-op photos may have family ties to Scottville area residents.

A routine office cleaning at a Great Lakes Energy service center has led to a discovery that could benefit some Scottville and Ludington area families.

Jami Cutter, supervisor of the Co-op's Remittance Center in Scottville, was creating more space in the office by disposing of old records when she discovered some files that warranted keeping. They contained employment applications dating back to 1941, when the Scottville facility was believed to be seeking workers for its new diesel generating plant. Included with them were the applicants' photos.

Recognizing that the photos may be treasures for family members still living in the area, Cutter arranged to have the names published in this issue of *Country Lines* in hopes that it will lead to finding new homes for this Co-op memorabilia.

The job seekers included information on their applications that is no longer asked for today, such as marital status, how many children they had, race, etc. The applicants were born during the period from 1882 to 1918, most from the Scottville and Ludington areas, as well as one from Iowa. Some photos also include the applicants' families.
