

## Hamlin Township History

#### By Mary Jean Baker

Hamlin was, for a time, part of Bellevue and later part of Eaton Township.

March 20, 1841, it was "set off and organized into a township by the name of Tyler." It was evidently name fo **Vice-president John Tyler**.

Nine years later, Eaton Rapids had grown up its north boundry line and petitioned to have the two united, which happened.

Another nineteen years later, March 26, 1869, the township was again detached and given the name of Hamlin after one of its early settlers, **Samuel Hamlin**.

# First Settler in Section One Of Hamlin Township

#### By Mary Jean Baker

The first pioneer to settle in Section One of the southeastern part of the county, now known as Hamlin Township, was John Montgomery, better known as Colonel John.

John Montgomery was born in Ireland, March 22, 1804, coming later to New York. John married Amanda Rorabeck, on February 17, 1828. He had his own farm in New York when he came to Michigan on March 2, 1831 by foot. He walked all the way through Canada and back again reaching home the last day of March that year.

In 1835, he had cleared his land on his farm in New York, and improved it and was able to sell the farm for \$2,150. A **Mr. Boyden** came with **Montgomery** into Eaton County from Jackson County. **Montgomery** found land that he liked, so he purchased 400 acres of burr oak plains land.

His brother, **Robert Montgomery** and **Mr. J. Shepherd** cut a road for twenty miles to reach **Montgomery's** land. They built a cabin in three days. **Willis Bush** also came and located a farm on Section 36 of Eaton Rapids Townshi.

**Mr. John Montgomery** began to dabble in politics and became a county commissioner. He worked hard and successfully to get a bridge built at Eaton Rapids. He later was a Supervisor for several years and in 1849 elected Representative to the Legislature. He served in the Civil War and was commissioned by **Governor Barry** as a Brigadier General.

**Montgomery** built a stone house from rock he extricated from the Grand River. It was transported by oxcarts to the building site. The cope stone over the main entrance bears the following:

John Montgomery June the 26, 1848 John Clark Architect

This house is one of the outstanding landmarks in the state. It is located on East Plains Road.

For those interested, there is a lot more written about the **Montgomery Family** in "The Only Eaton Rapids on Earth" by W. Scott Munn.

### **Old Clinton Trail**

At the intersection of Clinton Trail and M-50, between sections 21 and 22 in Hamlin Township, a tablet has been sunk in a huge boulder, which reads:

#### **Clinton Trail**

An Indian path later used by the pioneer settlers of Michigan and marked by Eaton County Federation of Women's Clubs, 1937.

Commencing at this point in Hamlin Township, M-50 is the revised "Old Clinton Trail".

The distance between the points where **John Montogomery** entered Hamlin Township and the Clinton Trail is between six and eight miles. The trail was completed first, and had **Mr. Montgomery** chosen to make his pilgrimage by a more southern route, he and his companions could have been relieved of the laborious task of opening a new road for those twenty miles.

## **Other Hamlin Township Pioneers**

Daniel W. Gould owned several hundred acres of land in Hamlin, located between State Street and Grand River north and south and Forest Street and Smithville Road east and west, later the Miller's Dairy Farm no. 5.

Samuel Hamlin settled on Section 9, Hamlin Township immediately south of the Hamlin Cemetery.

Mr. Morse - associated with Morse Creek, sometimes referred to as the Hobart Drain, in section 26 of Hamlin Township. It got its name from Mr. Morse. Its course is nortwest and passes between Rose Hill and Oakwood Cemeteries and empties into Spring Brook not far from the Michigan Central Railroad Bridge.

**Mr. Morse** manufactured various kinds of chairs for which it is said he had guite a market.

# Perrine Brothers - Reuben, David, Solomon C. and George.

**Reuben** became a land owner in 1835, settling in section one of Hamlin township and in 1836 on a parcel of land in section seven, Onondaga township, now the **V.F.W. National Home**.

That parcel of land, southeast portion of Section two, Hamlin township (site of the dam) was acquired from the Government by J. Ford in 1836, later owned by George Foote to C.C. Darling and then to Solomon C. and David Perrine in 1850 and to William Smith in 1887.

**Solomon** and **David** owned the land on either side of the dam, while **Reuben** and **David** secured the water rights.

In the early days, dams were built of logs with board chutes. This dam was constructed of stone and without a doubt was built by **George Perrine**.

The **Perrine's** were one of the finest pioneer families in the locality.

## **Reynolds Family** -

**Steven** and his wife came from Canandaigua County, New York in 1835 to Hamlin Township. They secured a tract of government land in section 36. He was the first man to settle in that part of the township.

They were parents of a large family. Five of the boys remained in the locality. **William** was a farmer, **Isaac** was in mercantile business, **Refus H**. had a boot and shoe business and loved to hunt and trap, and **B**. **Franklin** was a carpenter. **Steven H.** followed mining in the West for several years.

**Isaac** was a leader in business and sponsored the building of the **"Red Ribbon Hall"** in Eaton Rapids.

Also, early settlers in Hamlin township.

#### **Oakwood Cemetery**

Oakwood Cemetry is located just outside the city edge on Spicerville Highway, to the south of Rose Hill in Eaton Rapids, was formerly known as **"King Cemetery."** It was purchased from **Rufus King**, a supervisor who owned the farm south and across the highway.

Hamlin township supervises **Oakwood Cemetery**. The two cemeteries are separated by a ravine, which **Morse Creek** winds its way to **Spring Brook**.

Albert M. Barber, who is now living in the city of Charlotte, is a native of Eaton county, a member of one of its old and honored families, and has personally been a prominent and successful business man, as will be revealed in his He was born in brief sketch Vermontville, this county, May 14, 1846, and is a son of Edward H. and Laura E. (Root) Barber, both of whom were born in the state of Vermont, the respective families having early been founded in The parents were New England. numbered among the early pioneers of Eaton county, where they took up their residence in 1837, which year marked the admission of the state to the Union. The father secured large tracts of government land, having owned at one time fully two thousand acres, while he reclaimed much land to cultivation, thus aiding in ushering in the era of development and progress. He was of that sturdy type of which the true pioneer must ever be, having the rugged honesty and virile strength which the mountains of his native state seem to beget, --- "The mountains still are free; they hurl oppression back; they keep the boon of liberty." Edward H. Barber wielded much influence in the material and civic affairs of the county in the early days, and here he continued to reside until his death, wich occurred in 1865. His widow long survived him, being summoned to the life eternal April 26, 1891, at the venerable age of eighty years. He had been previously married, and the children of the first union were four in number and of the second, five. The older children were born in Vermont, where the first wife died, but all those of the second marriage were born after the removal of the family to Eaton county, Michigan. Albert M. Barber was reared to manhood in this county, in whose schools he secured his educational training. As a youth he was

employed for some time as clerk in the general store in Vermontville, where he was made the first station agent of the Michigan Central Railroad after its line had been completed through the town. He was employed as mercantile salesman about four years, after which he was for a time partner in a general store in his native town. Finally he became associated with his brother, Marshall F., in the purchase of a hardware and agricultural implement business in Vermontville. In 1882 he disposed of his interests in this enterprise and removed to Charlotte, where he was identified with the same line of business until the spring of 1904, the firm title having been in turn: Barber, Green & Company, Barber & Merritt, and Barber & Spencer. From the time of attaining his majority Mr. Barber has given an unswerving support to the Republican party, and he has held various local offices of public trust. He was city treasurer of Charlotte for two years, and served one year as mayor, giving a most business-like and satisfactory administration of the municipal government. He is affiliated with the Masonic fraternity, the Independent Order of the Odd Fellows, the Benevolent & Protective Order of Elks, and the Knights of Pythias, being held in high regard in both the business and social circles of his home city, where he has very considerable capitalistic interests. Mrs. Barber is a member of the Congregational church. December 24, 1872, Mr. Barber was united in marriage to Miss Ella Harroun, of Barry county, a daughter of Seth Harroun, who came to Michigan from the state of New York. Mr. and Mrs. Barber became the parents of three children, the eldest, Frederick H., having died in early childhood. Bess L., who is a graduate of the University of Michigan, is now the wife of Horace A. Hamilton, of Charlotte. C. Royal, who was graduated in the high schooll and who was a student in the University of Michigan for two years, is now a traveling salesman for a Detroit business house.

Warren J. Williams. Too much praise can scarely be given to those who after years of toil at last rest in the full fruition of their hopes of fortune and secure from want remain in their pleasant home, blessed by the love and devotion of their children. Such may be said of the gentleman above named, who by his industry and perseverance has been rewarded as the career of such honorable and successful men deserve.

The subject of this biographical sketch was born in the town of Batavia, Genesee County, N.Y., February 18, 1823. He was the son of Jacob and Christiana (Barrett) Williams, natives of England and Oneida County, N.Y., respectively. He lived on the homestead in Genesee County until twenty-one years old. He then worked out at odd jobs for a time before coming West. His father said to him the day he was twenty-one years old: "Now you are of age and must look out for yourself and earn your own living. If you get in any scrape you will bear the shame yourself. You have never done anything wrong and I hope you never will." Our subject was very much affected by his father's stern advice and felt as if he had not a friend in the world.

Thinking the West afforded a better opening for the energies of a young man he came to Barry County in 1854, settling in Prairieville Township, puchasing eighty acres of fertile and productive land partially improved, there being a log house upon the place. He cleared the farm and lived there until 1887 when he removed to Hastings and puchased a fine home on the corner of Grand and Broadway Streets where he now lives. While living on the farm he purchased one hundred acres more of land and on this place he built a house costing \$4,000, fine and substantial barns and carried on general farming, setting out fruit trees, etc. He also purchased a place at Petoskey, in Emmet County, where he built a summer resort at which he spends about four months each year.

The subject of this sketch led to the hymeneal alter **Miss Ann Backus**, of Genesee County, N.Y., the daughter of **J.M. and Sarah** (Sutton) Backus, in 1847. The father and mother of Mrs. Williams were natives of New York. The father was a farmer and came West in 1875, settling at Prairie-ville, Barry County, where he lived a retired life until his death in 1878. The mother survived her husband but one week when she, too, passed to the land beyond. This couple reared nine children, five of whom are now living --- Columbus, Harvey, Mrs. Ann Williams, Nettie and Harriet (Mrs. Durkey).

Jacob Williams was a soldier in the War of 1812, enlisting as a drummer boy. He was a consistent member of the Presbyterian Church, his wife being a member of the same church. They were the parents of six children ----Warren J. George W., Samuel, John B., Lewis, Mary (Mrs.Barrett), all of whom reside in this county. The father was a Republican in politics. Our subject and his wife were blessed by the birth of one child, Harvey W. who married Frances Mareau. They became the parents of three children, one son and two daughters: Belle died in infancy; Hart died aged seventeen years; he was a promising youth in who the parents and grandparents took great pride. The only living child, Hattie, is residing with her parents in Prairieville. Mr. Williams' adherence is given to the Republican party; he is looked upon with respect by his fellow-men as an honorable citizen and kindly man, while the lovable disposition and pleasing manners of his wife win many friends.

Deceased was born in New Hampshire, June 21, 1807. She was first married to Stephen Woodbury, removing to Bellevue, Michigan, in 1838. Six children were born to them, two of which survive her, Charles Woodbury, of Ainger, and George E. Woodbury. of this city. Her first husband having died, she married Samuel Clark. Two children were born to them. Albert and Edwin, both of which survive her and now reside in Olivet. Since her husband's death she has made her home with her son George. Friends will meet at the residence

today (Wednesday) at 11 o'clock, where after a short service they will proceed to the Ainger M.P. church, where **Elder Sloan** will take charge of the services, after which the remains will be laid to rest in the Spaulding cemetery. Mrs. Clark was a good, true, noble, christian woman, possessing one of the most beautiful characters and was loved by all who knew her. She leaves a large

circle of friends to mourn their loss.

Hauser ---- At the home of P.H. Green on Lovett street in this city on Monday, May 14, 1893. Elizabeth Hauser, aged \_\_\_(?) years.

The remains were taken to Onondaga this morning for burial.

**Hite** ---- In Charlotte on Monday, June 11, 1894 (?), of strangulated hernia, **John Hite** aged about seventy four years.

Deceased worked at the Baird house a portion of the forenoon, but not feeling well left for his room in the Woodbury block, where after suffering excruciating agony for several hours and being unable to make anyone hear him he was found toward evening in a very nervous condition. Drs. Snell, Newark and Weaver were called and at his earnest solicitation he was given choloroform. He died while under its effects and although the drug may have hastened death there was no possible chance to do anything for him. The hernia was eighteen inches in circumference and ten inches long and could not possibly have been put in place. An inquest was held by Esq. Nichols, the jury deciding that Mr. Hite's death resulted from

natural causes. He was a veteran of the civil war and got his quarterly pension check on the morning of his death. Funeral from the M.E. church this morning at 11:30, **Rev. E.G. Lewis** officiating.

Garber ---- At his home on Pearl street, on Wednesday, Oct. 26, 18 (?) of old age. Rev. Jacob Garber, aged 98 yers, 9 months and 12 days.

Only once has the Tribune announced the death of so aged a person. Mrs. Wise of Chester, although Mr. Davis and Mrs. Robb were nearly as old. Mr. Garber was a puny child when usheded into this world. The doctors recommended tobacco for him and thus at the early age of nine years he contracted this habit. He never used it excessively, a pound lasting him two months. At an early age he joined the U.B. church and was a devoted member of that organization throughout his very long lifetime although he was possessed of so genuine a Christian spirit that he could work with any denomination in his Master's vineyard. The story of his early struggles have been told in our columns. He was a man who cared nothing for riches, yet he never came to want, and no doubt many years were added to his life because of the peace of mind which he enjoyed in a work for humanity. The writer well remembers the earnest plea for right, noble living which Uncle Garber gave in his annual sermon delivered last January at the Lutheran church in this city. He thought then that it would be his last public message and so it was. For the last eight months his health has gradually given way until the end came peacefully and victoriously last Thursday. There is food for thought in the lives of such men as Rev. Garber. They preach a constant lesson of obedience to universal law. At the age of 25 he married Miss Catharine Bretz who died sixteen years ago. He leaves three children, Samuel Garber, of this city with who he has lived for several years, Gideon Garber, of Windsor, and Mrs. Rebecca Spitler, of Bloomville, Ohio. The funeral was held from the U.B. church on Saturday, Rev. S. Ferguson, assisted by Rev. Titus and Presiding Elder Hamp, officiating.

**Goodrich** ---- On Monday, April 23, 1894, **Mr. Ruel Goodrich**, aged 89 years, 1 month and 17 days.

Mr. Goodrich was a native of New York where he was born March 6, 1805. In his early years he taught school but principally through life has been engaged in farming. He settled in Walton forty years ago but for the past twenty-five has lived in this city. Mr. G. was an exceptionally intelligent and well informed old gentleman and could repeat any number of the choice poems of Scott, Burns, Dryden, Pope, etc. He was a staunch republican since 1848 and always held to the Universalist faith that all mankind are brothers, children of the selfsame God. Mr. G. was in his usual health until the day of his death. For the past six months he has been living when his daughter, Mrs. J.D. Butler. On Monday Mr. and Mrs. Butler had an engagement to go to Kalamo and Mr. Andrew Goodrich was called to stay with his father during their absence. The old gentleman was around as usual and about five o'clock Andrew was called home, his father urging him to go and attend to some business matter. An hour and a half later Mr. Goodrich was found dead in the chicken park where he had gone to feed the fowls. There was no evidence of any struggle and it is certain that he died very suddenly. Mr. Goodrich leaves several sons and daughters some of whom are themselves approaching old age. Of these, Andrew, Descon, Perry and Mrs. Brusa Butler live in this city and Mrs. Rosalie Walfrum in Grand Ledge. Mrs. Goodrich preceded her husband to the unknown country about five months. The funeral will be held from J.D. Butler's today, aat 2 o'clock, Rev. E.G. Lewis conducting the services, Esq. Webber impaneled a jury yesterday morning, as follows: Solomon Fisher, B.C. Peters, F.M. Overmeyer, F.M. Hoekstrop, Thomas Donovan and Charles Welch. Dr. P.D. Patterson gave the expert testimony and the finding was that the deceased came to his death from natural causes i.e. from heart failure incident to organic heart disease and extreme old age.

**Hoffner** ---- At the home of his son, **Andrew Hoffner** of Eaton Rapids, on Tursday, April 26, 1894, of Id age, **Jacob Hoffner** aged 89 years and 7 days.

Mr. Hoffner was born at Frankfort on the Main, Germany, April 19, 1805. He received a liberal education for his day and was a great reader and well posted on current events. He came to America in 1846 (?) settling first in Rochester, N.Y. He there carried on the trade of a wagonmaker and was noted for good conscientious work. He was twice married and leaves five living children all good citizens. Upon the death of his second wife in 1870 he came (January 1871) to live with his son in Eaton. During his residence here of nearly a quarter of a century he has made many friends who will miss his genial smiles and hearty greetings. The funeral took place Sunday, **Rev. Niles** officiating. Interment at the Eaton cemetery. **Peter Hoffner**, of Shortsville, N.Y., **Mrs. Mary Severance** of Hobart, Indiana, and **Mr. and Mrs. Edwin Eligh** of Lake View, Michigan, relatives of the deceased, attended the funeral.

## Autobiography of Howard A. Mikesell

Typed as written Continued from Quest #55

I had been elected to Council in 1933 and 1935. In 1937 I was elected Mayor and my first unpleasant task was to meet our police and service men in the village garage on a Saturday morning. I advised them that we did not have the money to pay them but if they would stay with us we would get the funds. They agreed and we did get the necessary money to pay them. Some of the men to-day (1966) who are

still on the village pay-roll remember that meeting.

The village owed The Toledo Edison Co. several thousand dollars for street lighting and we replaced the large light builbs with much smaller ones and effected a several hundred dollars savings. We pared expenses in every way possible and gradually paid up all old bills.

Ottawa Hills up to this time had been dependent on the city of Toledo Fire Department for its fire protection. We secured bids for a new fire truck and purchased a new American LaFrance fire truck. This enabled the villagers to secure greatly reduced fire insurance rates.

We then needed a building to house the fire truck as well as the fire men. One member of council suggested sending the plans we had drawn to Washington (it was in the days of Roosevelt's give-away program). We had a business men's council (2 bankers and 5 company officers). The plans were sent and we received notice from the Federal government that they would give the village \$38,000. None of us believed in the "give-away' program and we proceeded to build the same building for less than \$20,000. It was an outstanding example of how the Federal Government even to this day is hood-winking the people, by their "give away" program.

Robert Hadley a Vice President of the Toledo Machine and Tool Company, made the village first radio for the police Department. It cost the village nothing and had a range that permitted the police car anywhere in the village to be reached from the town hall. It was an excellent example of the interest the members of council took in village affairs.

During my second term as Mayor we realized that the village should be properly zoned to protect property values. We engaged the services of Philip Lindsay Small of Cleveland as he had zoned Shaker Heights in Cleveland. He spent two days with members of council considering the problem. We were told that in an exclusive residential incorporated village, it was necessay to provide one section or area for commercial and one for apartments. So today the southwest corner of Richard Road and Bancroft Street is the only commercial area in the village. Apartments are allowed only on Bancroft St. west to the village line and a limited area on Hillandale and Evergreen. We thus protected owners of undesirable encroachments.

Dr. Bruce Brockway, a long time resident in the village came to my home one evening and cave me a report on how the mosquito problem had been solved in the Panama canal zone. He said if it can be done there it can be done in the area about Ottaw Hills. Mosquitoes were indeed a real menace. Council considered the problem and then purchased a tank truck, and spray equipment. We started spraying in the low lands and all mosquito breeding places in and about the village. Indian Road was being paved at that time and dirt was secured and greatly needed to fill the low spots in the village where water accumulated. While we were not able to secure all the dirt needed we were able to effect a noticeable reduction in the mosquito population.

John Biggers became interested and with the help of his attorney Don Melhorn we presented to the State Legislature a proposal that districts be established in Ohio to control the mosquito menace. We made two trips to Columbus and appeared before the Legislative Committee and explaining the program we succeded in having such a bill passed: Petitions were then circulated requesting the establishing of the TOLEDO AREA SANITARY DISTRICT and by securing the signatures of 500 free holders it was not necessary to put it to a vote. Judge O'Connor approved it and the TOLEDO AREA SANITARY DISTRICT was established Sept. 27, 1945. At a small cost to the taxpapers the area now covering 90 square miles no longer suffers as it did thanks to Dr. Brockway. His son Bruce is today in charge of the work and continues to improve control by draining marshland, filling low lands and spraying with the crew of workers. I have been on the board of directors ever since its inception.

Otto Hartman followed me as Mayor in 19\_\_\_\_ and during his terms all village debts were paid. When I retired the Council gave me a beautiful Revere silver bowl.

Several years ago I started painting in oils solely for a hobby. I took lessons from several local artists and one summer Luella and I drove East. While I was with John Carlson the well known artist. Luella visited her friend Mrs. Lovett in Boston. Mr. Carlson had his studio in Gloucester and was most patient with his student from Toledo. It has been a pleasant hobby and I feel amply repaid in the satisfaction of creating. I have probably painted at least 100 pictures, some just good and some not so good. I had a one man show at the ART MUSEUM and have had several citations. I have sold some and given some to my friends but always fear doing this as they might not care for them. The present day trend of abstract printing in my

opinion is simply an attempt to satisfy the amateur who tries to satisfy himself with his work and refuses to attempt to improve his work. It seems to be the general trend today in all work.

George Vradenburg became intrested in the National Junior Achievement organization and asked me to assist in starting a Toledo Chapter. It's purpose is to teach our high school students the American business method of free enterprise. Groups of boys and girls from the Junior and Senior classes form a company, elect their officers and decide on the product they will make and sell. Records are kept of costs and sales of the products made are sold by those in the sales department. I spoke before joint meetings of Juniors and Seniors at Central Catholic, Scott, Libbey and Woodward High Schools and secured their participation. Today Junior Achievement of Northwestern Ohio has a building of its own at 231 Huron St. and for years has by actual small business groups taught hundreds of Toledo youths the fundementals of American business.

I was appointed a few years ago to the Board of Directors of the Toledo Humane Society but since I was still active in the company and out of the city often I resigned.

On my retirement I was again appointed and was on the building committee for the new HUMANITY HOUSE which was recently dedicated.

In 1941 the TOLEDO SMALL BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION was founded and I was asked to help and was on its first Board of Directors.

I joined the TOLEDO ROTARY CLUB in 1943. On two previous occasions I had been invited but declined because of my company obligations. Floyd Crandall, a friend, finally told me if I wanted to be a Rotarian I had better accept or I would not be asked again. I accepted and have never regretted it.

I never could understand how I was ever offered the Presidency of the TOLEDO ORCHESTRA ASSOCIATION unless they were finding it difficult to secure a President. I am not musically inclined and I think they were most fortunate that I declined.

In 1945 I was elected President of the TOLEDO MUNICIPAL LEAGUE and in this position was the subject of several very severe and critical editorials in the Toledo Blade and by Paul Block in particular. The League criticized the proposal to increase the police and firemen's pay without the necessary funds to meet the added costs. The League also criticized the Toledo Publicity and Efficiency Commission for failing to fulfill its purpose by not conducting proper government investigations of city affairs and releasing reports that are so necessary for good government. Members of the Commission were mostly political appointees.

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## Query: My Dunham Puzzle:

(I know this is not the standard format for a query, but it is hard to show the overall puzzle without giving details).

What is the relationship between my maternal great-grandparents, Albert Senecca Dunham and Amelia R. Dunham ? Family tradition says they were cousins, but I haven't been able to find out how. Albert b. 30 Aug 1837 in Ontario (now Monroe) County, NY, d 11 Jun 1901 in Cooper, Kalamazoo County, MI.

Amelia b. 26 Oct 1848 possibly in Plainwell, Allegan County, MI, d. 9 Jul 1867 probably in Cooper. They married 25 Dec. 1865 in Plainwell and are buried in the West Cooper Cemetery. Their daughter, **Sophia Amelia Dunham**, my grandmother, b. 30 Nov 1866 never had a chance to know her mother, Amelia, so the family history I need didn't get passed on.

Albert's father was **Seneca Dunham** and his grandfather was **Edward Dunham** (1753-1844) a Revolutionary War Pensioner b. in Great Nine Partners, Duchess County, NY, d. in Henrietta, Monroe County, NY.

Who was his father ? Both Edward and Seneca owned property in Barre, Orleans County, NY and Henrietta, Ontario (now Monroe) County, NY before Seneca went to Michigan. Edward married twice. I am from the second wife, **Mary (Ridley)/Dannak/Dannals/Daniels**. I am in touch with a cousin from the first wife who has been looking for 30 years for that first wife and family.

Amelia's father was Hartwell Dunham. His Death certificate says his father was David Dunham and his mother -----Purson. Was that Parson, Pearson, Person, Pierson or really Purson? Usually we're looking for a surname, not a first name. the 1850 Federal census shows a David Dunham in Eaton County with a son Hartwell.

Who was David's father? Is he the **David Dunham** who died 17 Nov 1865 age 91 and is buried in Gun Plains with his wife Sarah, the David Dunham I seek?

I have discovered Dunham to be Danham to Dunnum.

After Amelia's death, Albert married Sarah Montgomery and after her death Jennie Winner.

Interestingly, I found no mention of any Dunhams in the *Pioneer History of Eaton County, Michigan 1833-1866* compiled by Daniel Strange, but John Montgomery, page 27 and page 38 is recognized as an early settler of Eaton County. His brother, **Rober**t, pages 44-5 is also listed as an early settler and as the father of Alonzo, Almeron, Clifford, Sarah, Fred and Frank. Alonzo lived next door to Seneca in Cooper. I know nothing about Jennie Winner except her marriage to Albert for which I have the family announcement. Is there anyone who has done research on **Dunham** or who would like to help me?
