

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The Past and Present of Eaton County, Michigan

Personal and Genealogical (As written -- published about 1915?) By The Michigan Historical Publishing Association Lansing, Michigan

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Osgar H. Barber, who is now living retired in the attractive little village of Dimondale, is an honored veteran of the war of the Rebellion and has been a resident of Eaton county since 1869. having here improved two farms, one of which he still owns. Mr. Barber was born in Wood county, Ohio, September 4, 1846, and is the son of Orson H. and Harriet (Higley) Barber, both of who were born and reared in the state of New York, where their marriage was solemnized and where they continued to reside until their removal to Ohio, first settling in Wood county, where they remained until 1849, when they removed to Williams county, that state, where they passed the remainder of their lives. The subject of this sketch was reared in Williams county. Ohio, where he grew to maturity on the homestead farm, in the meanwhile availing himself of the advantages of the common schools. He was but sixteen years of age at the inception of the civil war, but was among those loyal lads who tendered their services in defense of the Union in response to President Lincoln's first call for volunteers. In September, 1861, he enlisted as a private in Company E. Sixty-eighth Ohio Volunteer Infantry, which forthwith proceeded to the front, while its history, during a long and valiant service, is the military record of Mr. Barber, for he continued with his command until victory crowned the Union arms and the war ended. He took part in many important battles and in innumerable minor engagements, and was ever found at the post of duty. After the close of the war Mr. Barber, who had been mustered out in Louisville, Kentucky, in July, 1865, returned to his home in Ohio, and he continued resident of the Buckeye state until 1869, when he came to Eaton county and purchased forty acres of wild land, in Windsor township. He cleared and improved this farm, of which he eventually disposed, after which he purchased a tract of eighty acres of wild land in section 22, same township, developing this into one of the fine farms of the county. He still owns this homestead, and also his attractive residence property in Dimondale, where he has

lived retired since 1899, enjoying the reward of past labors. He has gained independence and prosperity through his own efforts and has ever commanded the confidence and esteem of his fellow men, being a loyal and public-spirited citizen. In politics he is a stanch Republican and he is identified with the Grand Army of the Republic. In 1867 Mr. Barber was united in marriage to Miss Tenie Amsbaugh, daughter of Michael Amsbaugh, who continued a resident of Ohio until his death, having been a farmer by vocation. Mr. and Mrs. Barber have two children: Cora, who is the wife of C. Ellis Fry, of Dimondale; and William Herman, who remains at the parental home.

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Aaron Bark was one of the honored pioneers of Eaton county, where he made his life count for good in all its relation, commanding the confidence and high regard of his fellow men and being a valued and influential citizen of his community. He died on his fine homestead farm, in section 25, Sunfield township, October 13, 1903, and his widow still remains on the farm, the same being endeared to her through the associations and memories of the past. Mr. Bark was born in North Royalton township, Cuyahoga county, Ohio, May 15, 1828, being a son of Francis and Lucina (Granger) Bark, both natives of New York state, where the former was born November 18, 1779, and the latter March 12, 1804. Both died in Ohio, -- the father at the age of eighty and the mother at the age of eighty-seven years. Francis was sixteen years of age at the time of his parents' removal from New York to Ohio, and he walked the entire distance, while the other members of the family rode in a wagon drawn by a yoke of oxen. He became a pioneer farmer of Cuyahoga county, and also worked at the shoemaker's trade. Cleveland was a small village at the time of the arrival of the Bark family in the county. and at one time he knew every man in the town. A few years before his death he left the farm, passing the closing years of his life in Cleveland. Of the nine children of Francis Bark eight attained maturity and four are still living. Thomas died in the state of Ohio and his only child, Burton, died in Cuba, having been in service as a soldier in the Spanish-American war; Granger resides in Cleveland, Ohio; Aaron, subject of this memoir, was the next in order of birth; Almira became the wife of Kelly Bosworth, an early settler of Chester township, this county, where she died:

Maria is the wife of Charles Robinson, of Cleveland, Ohio; Nancy Ann is a resident of the same city, being the widow of Edmond Towsley; Eliza is the wife of William Edgetant, of Cleveland; Charles died many years ago; and the ninth child died in infancy. Aaron Bark was reared to the invigorating discipline of the farm, and received a common school education. He continued to reside in Cuyahoga county, Ohio, about two years after his marriage and then, in 1853, came with his family to Eaton county, Michigan, making the trip from Cleveland to Detroit by boat, and from the latter city proceeding by the Michigan Central Railroad to Jackson, and thence by stage to Charlotte, the stage having been driven by Elisha Shepherd, who still resides in Charlotte. From Charlotte he and his family drove through to the land which he had secured, in Roxand township. In crossing the Thornapple river the water ran into the box of the wagon, and finally the wagon broke down, compelling them to leave their goods in the forest. Mr. Bark and his brother-in-law swam across the Little Thornapple river and then constructed a raft from hog troughs, utilizing this primitive arrangement to transport Mrs. Bark across the stream, the parents of Mrs. Bark having come to the county at the same time. Mr. Bark purchased ninety acres of heavily timbered land, in Roxand township, erecting a log house and stable on the place and eventually reclaiming the greater portion of the land. He later sold the property and purchased the homestead of one hundred and sixty acres where his widow now resides. This land was still covered with the native timber and no improvements had been made. He erected a "side-hill shanty," which continued to be the family home until he completed the erection of the present commodious frame residence, in which he continued to live until he was summoned from the scene of this mortal life. He made the best of improvements on this farm, clearing the land and developing one of the valuable places of this part of the county. He endured the vicissitudes common to the pioneer epoch, but won a success worthy the name, while his faithful and cherished wife ever stood by his side, aiding and encouraging him. The home life was ideal in its nature, and to Mrs. Bark there comes a measure of consolation and recompense in the gracious memories of the long years of her happy wedded life. In political matters Mr. Bark was found a stanch supporter of the principles and policies of the Republican

party, and he was called upon to serve in various offices of local trust, having served thirty-one years as justice of the peace and having been highway commissioner several years. He was a member of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows and of the Grange. The village of Shaytown is located on a portion of his farm, nine acres of the property having been sold by him for the platting of the village. He and his wife celebrated their golden wedding in 1901, and the occasion was made a most delightful social event. Mr. Bark was married February 2, 1851, the lady of his choice having been Miss Julia L. Bosworth, who was born in Cuyahoga county, Ohio, December 14, 1831, being the daughter of Luther and Lucy (Sprague) Bosworth, father having likewise been a pioneer of Eaton county, where he resided until his death. Mrs. Bark is a half-sister of Kelly Bosworth, of Charlotte, concerning whom individual mention is made on other pages of this work. Mr. and Mrs. Bark became the parents of seven children, all save two of whom died in infancy. Diana is the wife of J.F. Ives, a successful farmer of Sunfield township; and Libbie is the wife of Albert McWhorter. who likewise is a farmer of Roxand township. Since the death of her husband Mrs. Bark has rented her farm, though she still resides in the old homestead. Her circle of friends is wide and she is one of the noble pioneer women of the county.

The Portrait and Biographical Album of Barry and Eaton County, Michigan (Published by Chapman Brothers in 1891)

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John M. Sayre. For many years this gentleman has been one of the factors in the progress of Eaton County, having grown to manhood here and received his education in the schools that afforded very good opportunities for all who were studiously inclined. When ready to adopt a vocation he chose to follow farming and among the agriculturalists of Hamlin township he has been earnestly pursuing his work as one among the best. His farm is a goodly tract of land which by means of intelligent cultivation produces excellent crops, and his home is supplied with every comfort and the many conveniences which belong to modern farm life.

Mr. Sayre was born in Warren County, Pa., December 22, 1836, and is a son of Nathan and Eliza E. (Kikendall) Sayre. That couple were born in the Emprie state and after living there and in Pennsylvania some years removed to Michigan early in the '40s. Here their son John pursued his studies and took his part in home duties until he had reached man's estate. In 1861 his loyalty led him to enlist in the Twelfth United States Infantry and being mustered in at Fort Hamilton he was sent from Washington to Fairfax Court House, thence to Alexandria, and afterward to Fortress Monroe. Subsequently he was at York Landing, White House Landing and finally in front of Richmond, where he was wounded and taken prisoner. His injury resulted in the loss of an eye, and his captivity of about a month was spent at Belle Isle. After being parolled he was went back to Fortress Monroe to a receiving ship. From that point he went to Philadelphia, where the hospital was found to be overcrowded, and he was therefore sent to Chester, where he remained until discharged, January 16, 1863.

The marriage of Mr. Sayre and Miss Eliza Jane Bates was solemnized May 4, 1863, at the bride's home in Eaton County. She was born November 17, 1846, received a good common school education and the housewifely training which was common during her girlhood. The record of the children born of this union is as follows: Clarissa S., now the wife of Charles Armstrong, of Eaton County, was born May 17, 1864; John N., August 14, 1868; Eliza E., wife of John A. Kikendall, of Eaton County, November 4, 1871; William H. A., March 19,

THIS INDENTURE, Made and entered into this day of January, 1917, by and between **Warren Davis**, of Charlotte, Michigan, party of the first part, and **H. Larabee** of Eaton County, Michigan, party of the second part,

WITNESSETH:

First party has agreed to lease and to farm let and does hereby lease and farm let, and second party has agreed to take and does hereby take the following described land situated in Eaton County, Michigan, to-wit:

The West half of the Southeast quarter and the Southwest quarter of the Northeast quarter of Section Seven, and the Northwest quarter of the Northeast quarter of Section Eighteen, all in Township Number two, North, of Range, five, West, Michigan.

for the term of one year commencing on the first day of March, 1917, and ending on the first day of March, 1918; and in consideration thereof the party of the second part hereby convenants and agrees to and with the party of the first part that he will occupy, till and in all respects cultivate the premises above mentioned during the term aforesaid in a husbandlike manner; and that he will deliver to the party of the first part, his heirs, executors or administrators, or to his, her or their order, the hereinafter designated shares of all crops produced on said farm and premises aforesaid of every name, kind and description, same to be divided on the premises and delivered either on said premises or at such point in Charlotte, Michigan, and second party

elects, in a reasonable time after such crops have been gathered and harvested, to wit: one half thereof.

It is distinctly understood and agreed by and between the parties herto that the wheat now growing onsaid farm and supposed to be about fifteen acres in quantity is reserved by first party, with the right to permit said wheat to mature and the right to enter upon said premises, cut, thresh and remove said wheat there-from in proper season.

First party contemplates leaving on said farm certain cattle, hogs, sheep and poultry thereon; second party shall place on said farm an amount equal in quantity and value to the cattle, hogs, sheep and poultry left thereon by first party. The wool from all of said sheep and the increase from the cattle, hogs, sheep and poultry shall belong one half to each of the parties hereto. One half of the eggs, sold by the whole of said poultry, and one half of all the butter, sold from all the cows on said farm, shall belong to each of the parties hereto. Should cattle, hogs, sheep or poultry be marketed during the term of this lease second party shall deliver to the first party's home at Charlotte, Michigan, his, first party's share of the butter and eggs aforesaid.

Second party is to furnish all teams and tools necessary to do the work and to do all the work required for the proper farming of said farm and marketing of the products thereof. Second party shall furnish all the labor and pay one half of the thresh bill, first party to pay the other half of said bill for threshing machine. Second party shall shear all the sheep, pay half of shearing and furnish one half twine therefor: and he shall furnish one half twine used on the premises. All Manure, now or hereafter accumulated, during the term hereof, shall be drawn out to the fields twice each year. Second party shall promptly cut all thistles and weeds of every name and nature, growing on the premises, during the term hereof.

First party shall pay all taxes against the land, but second party shall do work in repairing fences on said premises to the amount of the road tax assessed against said premises.

The teams, belonging, to second party, necessary to do the work on the place are to be fed out of the undivided hay and grain belonging to the parties hereto.

First party contemplates leaving hay and grain on said premises when second party enters and second party is to furnish an equal amount. Each of the parties hereto is to furnish one half of all seed necessary to be sown on the premises and second party is to do or cause to be done all the necessary work and labor in and about the cultivation of said premises. Each party is to half one half of all potatoes grown on said premises, second party to deliver first party's half to his home in Charlotte, Michigan. Each party is to have half of the fruit grown on said premises, second party to deliver first party's share at his home in Charlotte.

The party of the second part shall keep the buildings and fences at all times in good repair and that he will not sublet said premises no any portion thereof nor assign nor transfer this lease to any person whatso ever without the written assent of the party of the first part, his heirs, executors, administrators or assigns.

The Birthplace of Vermont

James Breakenridge's farm adjoined the 20 mile boundary line between Bennington and the Colony of New York. Colonel Seth Warner lived just to the North of this Breakenridge farm, almost at the old covered bridge still in use in North Bennington. (Bennington Historical Marker). This neighborhood was called the "Irish Corner".

The Bennington settlers claimed their lands under New Hampshire Grants. New York settlers claimed their lands included this same land. After years of peaceable possession his farm was claimed by New York land speculators. A Sheriff and over 300 men came from Albany to evict him from his homestead.

Aided by men from Bennington a brave defense was made without bloodshed. In February 1774 a New York Proclamation offered a reward for the apprehension of members of the "Bennington Mob" Ethan Allen, Seth Warner, Remember Baker, Robert Cochran, Peleg Sunderland, Silvanus Brown, James Breakenridge, and John Smith. 50 Pounds were offered for the capture and securing of any of them in goal in Albany. This sometimes referred to as the New York Riot Act. The resolving of the disagreement of this boundary dispute proved to be the declaration of the independence of the state of Vermont, July 19, 1771

The site of the James Breakenridge farm is referred to as "The Birthplace of Vermont". A Bennington Historical Marker states:

"Near this site stood the homestead of Lt. James Breakenridge.

The home of four generations was destroyed by fire in 1889".

James Breakenridge is Cleone Smith Miller's (E.C.G.S. Member) 5G Grandfather. Cleone has some spoons that have been passed down for generations marked "From Mrs. Breakenridge."

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Potter ---- Mrs. W.W. Potter passed quietly to rest, June __(?), 1899, after an illness of five months. Her maiden name was Deliah H. Bennett. She was born in Housefield, Jefferson Co., N.Y., June 23, 1824. Had she lived four days longer, she would have been just 75 years of age. In August 1848 she and Walter W. Potter were joined in marriage and for over half a century they have journeyd life's pathway together. Her last illiness began in January of the present year, by an attack of la grippe and

but a few times was she able to rise from her bed. The funeral service was conducted at the home Thursday the 23rd, by **Clifford G. Howell** of Lansing. Interment at the Munger cemetery.

Leiter ---- Fred E. Leiter, Jr., of Chicago, died in that city on Sunday morning, after an illness of a few days, aged 38 years. Mr. Leiter is a son of Ex-Postmaster F.E. Leiter of this city and was never married. He was born in Charlotte, January 25, 1861. For the past twenty years he has resided in Chicago. The funeral was held from the Congregational church at 10:00 July 4, Rev. W.B. Williams officiating. Those from a distance who were in attendance were Mr. and Mrs. Will Leiter of Chicago, Mrs. Geo. M. Ely of Olivet, Miss Sally Jennings, Mrs. Hattie Hayde and Miss Alice Porter of Chicago. The latter was to have been his bride next Tuesday, his birthday.

Rogers ---- Mr. Marcus L. Rogers, of this city, died on Tuesday, June 6, 1899, aged 56 years 7 months and 8 days. He was the third white child born in Sunfield township, and grew to manhood in that section. In 1861 he enlisted in the U.S. Army and was in the service over three years. He was twice wounded and was one of four brothers who fought for their country. A more unassuming, quiet, honest and courageous man never lived. His patience during his illness was remarkable. His death resulted from cancer of stomach which prevented him from retaining food, and he ate very little for a month before his decease. Mr. Rogers leaves a widow, formerly Miss Georgia Lemmon, to whom he was married December 25, 1871.

Ely ----George N. Ely of Olivet died yesterday morning at Alma where he was receiving treatment. Mr. Ely is the son of Hon. E. N. Ely of Olivet, graduated from Olivet College in the 70's and was for some time cashier of the Merchants' National bank of this city. He was possessed of excellent attainments and had a host of friends.

Green ---- Mrs. Roxana Green died at her home in Roxand township, Sunday, June 4, 1899, aged 74 years, 1 month and 23 days. Roxana Beals was born April 12, 1825, in Lamoli Co., Vermont. September 2, 1847, she was married to Charles Green of New Haven, Connecticut. Soon after they removed to Huron county, Ohio. In 1863, she with husband and children came to Eaton county, Michigan, where

she has since resided. She was mother of seven children, four of whom with her aged companion survive her and all reside in this county. She was a faithful wife and a loving mother. The funeral was held on Tuesday from the Maxson church. Interment in Potterville cemetery. Mrs. Green's life was such that feared not the approach of the death messenger, but was ready and waiting.

Harmon ---- Mr. John Chauncey Harmon died at the home of his daughter, Mr. J. B. King, near Howard City, on Tuesday, June 13, 1899, aged 81 years and 6 months. Mr. Harmon was born at Marlborough, Massachusetts, December 19, 1818. He settled in Charlotte in 1866, and was in the milling business here for several years. Since removing to Howard City he has suffered a stroke of paralysis and for the past five years he has been helpless and unable to talk in consequence of such affliction. His mental faculties were, however, retained unto the last. Mr. Harmon leaves a widow, one daughter and four sons, all well known to many of Charlotte's citizens. The funeral was held on Tuesday and was attended by S. W. Harmon of this city and O. C. Loomis of Chester, relatives of the deceased.

Treat ---- David Treat, formerly of West Windsor, well known in Potterville and surrounding country, was found dead in his bed at his home in Wexford Co., Tuesday morning. He has been in poor health for a couple of years. His remains were brought here Wednesday night. The funeral was held at the school house at West Windsor, Thursday afternoon, conducted by H. H. VanAuken. The remains were interred in this cemetery. Deceased leaves a wife and two daughters, one living at Ann Arbor, the other at Battle creek.

Welch ---- Mrs. Mary Welch died at the home of her nephew, Mr. W. L. Lepard, on Thursday, June 8, 1899, aged 69 years, 11 months and 20 days. Mrs. Welch lived in this city nearly a third of a century, but for the past two years had made her home at Lake Odessa. She came to Charlotte for a visit about ten days prior to her death, which resulted from heart disease. She was ill not to exceed twenty minutes yet died peacefully. Her husband died about ten years ago and she left no children. Numerous relatives from a distance and a large number of Charlotte friends attended the funeral which was held on Sunday from the M.E. church.

Martin ---- Mrs. Carolina Martin, nee ---Hammond was born in the town of Solon. New York, October 7m 1722, and died at the home of her son, Frank, in Walton, June 10, aged 76 years, 8 months and 3 days. Carolina Hammond was married to Ralph Martin in 1842 after which they moved from Solon to Belvidere, III., and thence to Michigan, where she has since resided. Of this union nine children were born, of which four survive. To know Grandma Martin was to be her friend, for she attracted all by her amiable nature, she was a kind and true friend, and affectionate mother and a tender and loving wife. The funeral was held from the residence on Monday at 3:00 p.m., Rev. M.J. Weaver officating. Interment at Bosworth cemetery.

Alspaugh ---- John Alspaugh of Eaton died Monday, July 10, of heart disease. Funeral tomorrow at 11:00 o'clock at the Hoffner church, Rev. Burge officiating. Mr. Alspaugh was an old and highly esteemed citizen of Eaton county. Physically he was a very giant and he was just as large in other ways, always kind and courteous and pleasant, he was universally esteemed. He had been in poor health for several years.

Bowers ---- Oscar Bowers died at the soldiers' home in Milwaukee, Monday, July 3, 1899, aged 58 years and 28 days. Mr. Bowers was born at Ludleyville, Tompkins county, New York, June 5, 1841. He enlisted at Ithaca, N.Y. in the 32nd Infantry at the beginning of the war and served his country 3 years and 6 months in the army. came to Michigan immediately after the close of the war, settling in Charlotte where in 1866, he united in marriage with Caroline Cooper, who passed on before in 1872. Two daughters were born to them Mrs. Nellie C. Church of this city, and Mrs. Edith M. Brown of Blufton, Indiana. The remains were brought to Charlotte and the funeral held at the home of Mrs. Emma Church. Rev. McAlpine officiating, interment at Ells' cemetery.

Boyer --- Died, at her home in Roxand, June 19th, Mrs. Elizabeth Boyer, widow of the late Peter Boyer, aged 70 years and 4 months. Mrs. Boyer was the daughter of Daniel Walts, and was born at West Theresa, N.Y. She and her husband came to Michigan in 1849, and bought 80 acres of land from the government which was very heavily timbered. They cleared

it and occupied it up to the time of their deaths. She was the last original owner and occupant of land bought directly from the government in this township, and perhaps of Eaton county. She with her husband came to Detroit from Clayton, N.Y., by schooner, and from Detroit drove across the country to their home in the woods. To them were born eight children, six of them are living, Mrs. O. G. Cran, Mrs. F. A. Whelpley, Mrs. G. Loucks, D. W., Asa and Cleon Boyer, and all living in the township of Roxand.

Cox ---- Mrs. Amelia Cox, wife of Merritt Cox, of Eaton, died of heart trouble and dropsy on Monday, July 17, 1899, aged 42 years. Funeral from the Hoffner church at 1:00 p.m. today. Rev. Geo. Barge officiating. Interment at Maple Hill.

Listen To Me; Sight Your Sources!

Charlotte, MI is the county seat of Eaton County, MI; a very rural community. No large industry; mostly farms and subdivisions. My ancestors who settled in this area between 1850 and 1880 came here because of the timber and rich soil. I have been fortunate to live here and have access to the vital records at the courthouse. I have been able to locate many family records there.

My goal for this spring was to file an OGS application for "Ohio Early Settlers" for the Balsar Motter family. Simple enough task. I just had to fill out the application and organize all my documents I had collected and mail in. I got a speedy response from one of the team members listing my weak areas of documentation. I did not have documentation for my great grandfather, Guy Shance, who had married a Motter, of his date of birth or date of death in the application. How could I have missed this?

I know I had something. I had a date. I must have forgotten to copy and include in the package. I went immediately to his folder. I had census records but nothing for his birth or death. Where did I get the date from? Nothing in my field notes. It must have been on his headstone. I drove over to Potterville to the Benton

Cemetery to take a picture of his stone. After quite a search, I found it. To my surprise, only the years were there; 1878-1964, not the complete dates.

Well! Guy lived in Eaton County all his life. His birth and death will be recorded at the courthouse. A quick drive over to Charlotte will take care of this problem and I will be on my way. The courthouse had no records for Guy. Now I am getting a little nervous. I tell myself, he died in 1964. He could have easily died in a Lansing hospital. Right?

I went on-line to the Ingham County Clerk's web site. Very easy to use and with my credit card, I e-mailed my request. Reply - no record found. I am in panic mode!

I knew he lived in Potterville area all his life. His family was there. Where did he die? I went to the Grand Ledge Library to look for an obit in the Charlotte paper. They didn't have it on microfilm but did have the Grand Ledge Independent. I began my search with the dates closest to what I had. I really didn't plan on finding anything because I was so sure it would be in the Charlotte paper. The 2nd page for August 12, 1964 - a local man, Guy Shance, has died this past Thursday. Thursday, so what date was that?

Finally I almost have a date; but I don't know what day August 12 is on. The obit says he lived in Grand Ledge, died at the University Hospital in Ann Arbor and Peters and Murray Funeral Home handled the arrangements.

I stopped at the funeral home and Mrs. Murray was so kind to make a copy of the record for me. Now I could write to Washtenaw County for his death certificate.

My assumptions of Guy Shance could have prevented me from finding anything. Can you list my mistakes?

- 1. Double check your documentation before mailing your application to a lineage society. Make sure you have proved each generation.
- 2. I had no documentation in my field notes of where I got my date of birth or death from for Guy.
- 3. I assumed he lived and died in Potterville. Don't make assumptions; be

open minded and willing to check other possibilities.

4. Make field notes of grave locations in the cemetery during your first visit. It save time on the next.

5. I was so sure he died in Eaton
County and family used Burkhead
Funeral Home in Charlotte; I could have
missed his obit altogether and never got
his funeral records.

6. Sight your sources in your records and research notes.

From the annual report of the post-master general we find that the receipts of the Charlotte post office for the year ending March 31, 1887, was \$10, 567. This was a larger sum than was earned at Marquette, Coldwater, Manistee, Ionia, Ypsilanti, Big Rapids, Marshall, Hillsdale or Pontiac. Only fourteen post offices in the state transacted a larger business than ours.

WHAT YOU DIDN'T KNOW ABOUT EATON RAPIDS By Mary Jean Baker

Eaton Rapids is an easy city to fall in love with and is the "only Eaton Rapids on Earth".

The city was plotted in 1838, organized as a village in 1859, incorporated in 1871 and chartered as a city in 1881.

Throughout the past century and more, there have been many changes (and yet the same) in the city of Eaton Rapids. Many of the early examples of Greek, Carp[enter-Gothic, Italianate and Victorian homes have been preserved. Most of these homes are on double lots with large backyards. A Historic Study, during 1973, was formed with an adoption of a city policy to make an effort to guard and maintain the four historic districts to prevent demolition and deterioration. Evidence of these well- preserved homes can be seen in Eaton Rapids yet today.

The junction of Spring Brook and the Grand River provided water power for the first sawmill, grist and carding mills in Eaton Rapids.

Amos and Pierpont Spicer, C.C. Darling and Samuel Hamlin formed the mill company. They

dug a channel, put in water gates, put up a frame in 1837 and called their place the Old Red Mill. The first millers were Patrick Gallery and his son James. It operated from January 1838 for 44 years.

A wool carding mill was built by the mill company in 1844. They operated it until 1880 and sold it to **Samuel Horner** from Yorkshire, England. He was a professional spinner and his wife from Scotland was an expert weaver of paisley shawls. The carding mill grew into Eaton Rapids' largest employer and became world renown.

Later the **Davidson Woolen Mill** and several smaller woolen industries made Eaton Rapids known as "The Wool Town". Wool and ice cream became the city's best products.

Eaton Rapids' society life was lead by Mrs. G.H. Lincoln, who was the widow of Mr. Lincoln. He was prominently connected with the Standard Oil Company previous to his death in 1894.

A mineral spa was another boom to Eaton Rapids when the wool ear closed. The buildings were adopted for a paper mill.

The first lumber brought in from the Spicerville sawmill in the summer of 1838 was for Amos Spicer's son-in-law, Benjamin Knight, who built a general store on the corner of present Main and East Night Streets. There were only three slab shanties in the area at that time.

In the late 1840's Walt Gorton, owned a sawmill at the corner of Main & State Streets. By 1864 it was owned by McIntosh & Gorton Gristmill. James Strawn purchased the site and erected one of the oldest brick buildings for a blacksmith and carriage shop with a paint shop on the It became Harry Winter's upper level. Blacksmith Shop, L.T. White's Island City Dye Manufacturing Plant, The Whipple Harrow Co. Selby's 1880-1883 and Evaporator. The True Mfg. Co. owned the 1889-1899. building in 1900. Thomas B. True sold in 1926 to Brownells who manufactured automatic dump boxes and bread wrapping machines. Next orders were Abrams & Burt, who installed a flour mill. In 1932 Foote & Custer built a gas station at this site, followed by others, including the Majik Market.

This was but one business that has changed hands and business endeavors throughout time...

THE COMING OF ICE CREAM

In 1896 Dennis and Mary Edith Miller cranked out their first batch of ice cream giving Eaton Rapids another title, "Ice Cream Capitol of the World".

Eighty-four years later, Kinney Dairies, Inc. of Bay City purchased the Miller Ice Cream name, equipment and distributing rights to continue to make the ice cream. All the retail stores were sold, also the nine farms and the power plant at Smithville.

Another operation at Smithville, the egg crating factory, was owned by **L.J. Smith Family**. A fire leveled the family saw mill and farm buildings.

Other important business were the Green Bay Food Co. who purchased the Heifitz Pickle Co. They put up cans of cauliflower, onions, peppers, kraut and cucumber pickles which were rated thrid largest in the country next to Vlasic and Heinz.

J.B. Hendee, Attorney-at-law. Helped C.T. Fairfield in publishing the Eaton Rapids Journal

for the first tow years after coming to Michigan. **Mr. Hendee** was one of the youngest members of the Eaton County Bar.

L.C. VanGorden for **T.H. Hinchman & Sons** - Traveling salesman. He was popular with his fellow traveling men.

J. Sunmer Hamlin - Mass. Mutal Life Ins. Co., formally a district school teacher.

First National Bank, est. 1877 Officers in 1895 were President, A.J. Browne, V.P. A.C. Dutton, Cashier F.H. DeGolia, assistant cashier, A.Osborn.

L.A. Bentley - Dealer in boots, shoes & rubber goods. He also served as city treasurer two years and president of the City Council.

C.T. Hartson - Furniture dealer & undertaker. Previously owned a harness business and was Mayor in Eaton Rapids.

Frank J. Brainerd - Drug Store and chancellor commander of the Knights of Pythias.

S.A. Whitehead - Groveries, crockery, glassware and lamps. Compared to the old-time grocery with limited and illy-assorted stock, this establishment was a model of completness and excellence. Was once the postmaster at E.R. under Harrison's administration.

I.N. Reynolds - Dealer in grain,wool, seeds, beans,etc. He ws an active businessman who lived in Eaton County since 1836. He was president of the village before E.R. was incorporated a city.

Mrs. H.R. Derby - Millinery, widow of Dr. W. Derby. She opened a millinery business in 1884 and has one of the neatest and most popular places in the city.

W.B. Garrison - Bazaar - he has lived in E.R. since 1886, coming from Fowler, Mich. He is a progressive merchant and well and favorably known. He also conducts a millinery store managed by his daughter, Miss Alice Garrison.

F.R. LaFever - Manufacturer of Furniture who also is a retail dealer in stoves. Born in 1857 in E.R. and has held several positions of public honor and trust.

T.M. Bissell Plow Company - Was one of the most important industries in E.R. Mr. Bissell was known as the Father of the chilled plow. His company manufactured over 40 sizes and styles of hand or walking plows, made of wood and steel beams, chilled and steel mould boards, plain and slipped nose shares, and morre. Officers of the company were: William Smith, Pres.; C.T. Fairfield, V.P.; A.D. Gallery, Secretary and manager, F.H. DeGolia, Treasurer.

Pettit, Minnie & Co. - General hardware, stoves, etc. Est. 1892 and consisted of the estate of Geo. C. Pettit, H.C. Minnie and M.P. Bromeling.

William Smith - Manufacturer and dealer in Lumber, also controls the Smith Bicycle Stand, which is meeting with the approval of the practical men of the bicycle dealers. He once served as mayor of Eaton Rapids.

L. D. Jenne - Agricultural Implements, Carriages, Wagons, etc. He carried fa full and complet stock of the best and latest improved goods from the best known manufacturers in the county. At one time Mr. Jenne was employed by the State of Michigan and the U.S. Government, was treasurer to the township of Sault Ste. Marie for two years and was on the Eaton Rapids City Council.

S.Horner & Sons - Eaton Rpaids Woolen Mills. It was one of the principal industries in Eaton Rapids. The mill was lighted and operated by electricity from the private plant owned by S. Horner & Sons, which also furnished the power for lighting the city.

Webster, Cobb & Co. - Dealers in Lumber. H.P. Webster was also a member of the Board of Education.

Hale & McKinney - Dealers in Staple and Fancy Groceries. Both were merchants of good standing. In addition to operatin two stores in the city, they ran their wagons throughout the neighboring country.
